

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Arms: cut pipe-cleaner in half and bend each half into half again. Legs: bend a whole pipe-cleaner in half and then bend into the shape of legs. The leftover half pipe-cleaner is cut into half again and bent. This bit of the pipecleaner will attach the legs and arms onto the head (wooden bead). Press the wooden bead over the pipe-cleaner and bend the ends over so the head is attached.







Wind different wool over the pipe-cleaners as clothes. At the start, leave the first piece of the wool hanging over and when finished winding the wool knot the ends together. That way the wool won't rewind and fall off.





Cover the back and top of the wooden bead with some glue and attach wool as hair.


The objectives are:

TOP FIVE UPPER BODY STRETCHES

Stretching is a great way to keep your body limber as it increases your flexibility and range of movement. Stretching should not be painful. It is okay to feel some discomfort but aim for a 'good' stretch. Hold your stretch for 15-30 seconds and repeat two to three times. Let's look at some upper limb stretches you can do.

Neck Stretch

Start Position: Sit upright in a chair. Place one of your hands under your thigh (this is the side of your neck you are about to stretch).

Action: Tilt your head slightly forwards and away from the side being stretched. Use your other hand to further increase your stretch by pushing down on your head.



Start position: Sit upright in a chair.

Action: Tuck your chin in (ie give yourself a double chin) and hold. Make sure you keep your


eyes level and don't tilt your head downwards.



runk stretch

Starting position: Stand with your feet more than shoulder width apart and bend your knees slightly. Bend forwards at your hips and place your hands on the wall, with your head looking down to the floor.

Action: Push your torso down towards the floor, while still keeping your hands on the wall.



Start position: Hands either side of a doorframe, relaxed shoulders.

Action: Walk your feet inwards until you can feel a stretch in the front of your chest



Forearm stretch

Start position: Either standing or sitting with your shoulders relaxed and your elbow and wrist bent with your palm facing away from your body.

Action: Slowly straighten your elbow and pull your fingers down and back with your free hand.

NB: To stretch the other side of your forearm, just reverse your hand position so that your hand is facing towards your body.

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


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On The Beat

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Wakefield Volunteer Fire Brigade

Many of us take pride in our houses and the property that surrounds them.

We are now beginning to experience the effects of the driest months of the year. During this time the fire risk is high and the speed that fire can spread is faster. A few moments now thinking about how you can best protect your assets in case of fire can make a big difference to possible outcomes.

Within the town boundaries most people know their street number. In the rural sector where rural rapid numbers are used this is not always the case. Make sure you know the number of your property and that it can clearly be seen from the road.

Cut back vegetation where needed, this will help the emergency services locate you faster. Look at your driveway and ask yourself, could emergency vehicles make access through it? It needs to be clear of trees to a distance of at least four metres wide and high. If it is not then it could stop fire engines from getting to the job and slowing response time as a lot more hose has to be run.

Think about the amount of vegetation around buildings. It is recommended that you limit or clear vegetation within ten metres of buildings by mowing or spraying as this reduces fuel loading and the potential of fire spreading. It is also a good idea to check that tree branches are clear of power lines. If they are not, contact your power company for advice on what to do.

Remember if you see smoke call 111. A number of years ago a brigade was called to a house fire at 7pm at night. The house was totalled. It turned out people had seen smoke at 8am in the morning and thought someone was having a bit of a burn. Unfortunately it was the house burning. It was only discovered when the owner returned 11 hours later.

We are happy to respond and find it is a false alarm, it is far better than arriving too late to an actual fire.

The Way We Were

A New Post Office for Wakefield

Prepared for the Waimea South Historical Society by Roger Batt

On Monday January 18th 104 years ago, the newly built Post Office at Wakefield was officially opened by the Minister of Public Works, the Hon R. McKenzie. As part of the ceremony he was presented by Mrs E. Hodgson with a gold key, appropriately inscribed, with which to "do the honours" that had been made for the occasion by Messrs Brown and Kerr.

Where is that key now?

This abridged account of the one and a half hour ceremony is taken from The Colonist.

OPENED BY HON R. McKENZIE.

Children were presented with savings bank books and Wakefield was en fete yesterday afternoon, the occasion being the opening of the new post office, which is situated in the main street, opposite Messrs Hodgson and Sons' store. Strings of bunting were hung across the street and flags were flying from numerous private dwellings, the township generally bearing a gay and festive appearance.

The attendance of the public was not as large as was anticipated, although it was thoroughly representative of Wakefield and the surrounding districts. This was mainly due to the fact that farmers are at present busy harvesting and Monday from the point of view of townspeople is an awkward day to visit the country, there being only one train out in the early morning and no return train in the evening.

Another factor which probably militated against the attendance was the threatening weather. Shortly before three o'clock, the hour set down for the function, a slight drizzling rain commenced, and continued while the formal opening ceremony was being carried out. As soon as this was over an adjournment was made to the Oddfellows' Hall, where the remainder of the programme arranged by the Wakefield Progressive Association (under whose auspices the function was held) was carried out.

At three o'clock the school children assembled in front of the new building and the proceedings commenced. Upon a dais, specially erected for the occasion, were seated the Hon. R. McKenzie (Minister of Public Works), Mr P. Best (Chairman of the Waimea County Council), Mr T. Bell (representing the Richmond Borough Council), Mr E. V. Senn (Chief Postmaster), Mr W. E. Chisholm (Telegraph Engineer), Mr E. Hodgson (President of the Wakefield Progressive Association), Mr E. S. Hoult, Rev O. R. Hewlett, Mesdames McKenzie, Pearless, Hodgson, Longton and others. Mr W. N. Franklyn occupied the Chair.

Before the speeches were made Mrs McKenzie was presented with a beautiful bouquet by Joan Pearless, and the Wakefield Brass Band played a selection.

Mr James Bruce (Secretary of the Wakefield Progressive Association), in asking Mr W. N. Franklyn to preside, expressed his pleasure at seeing so many present. The opening of a new post office was an important function, and they had in Mr McKenzie an important man to do it. (Applause). He regretted that the weather was wet for the opening and it would not be inappropriate to call it a "christening ... Mr Franklyn, in introducing the Hon R. McKenzie said that although the weather might not be pleasant for those present, he was sure the farmers would be delighted with the rain which was very welcome.

The arrangements for the function were made by the Wakefield Progressive Association... He extended a very cordial welcome to Mr and Mrs McKenzie, for whom they all had a personal liking, and asked Mrs Hodgson, wife of Mr E. Hodgson, President of the Association, to hand the former the gold key, with which to open the doors of the new post office. "It was appropriate," he said, "that Mrs Hodgson should do this, as she was a granddaughter of the father of Wakefield, Mr Edward Baigent"...Mrs Hodgson, on behalf of the residents, then presented Mr McKenzie with a gold key. ... which bore the following inscription: "Presented to the Hon R. McKenzie on the occasion of his opening the Wakefield post office." The key was manufactured at the establishment of Messrs Brown and Kerr, and the workmanship reflects the highest credit on the firm.

The Hon. Mr McKenzie, who was received with loud applause, expressed his pleasure at being amongst them on the occasion of the opening of the new post office. If the weather was unfavourable to them, it was of great advantage to the Nelson district. Mr McKenzie then read an interesting history of the post office at Wakefield and of the town-

ship ...

The new building, which is of wood, is a combined office and postmaster's residence. The office comprises a vestibule, a public office, a telephone bureau, a private box lobby, a mail room, a telephone room, and a store, also a storeroom in the tower. The residence portion, which has a private side entrance, comprises a sitting room, two bedrooms, a bathroom, a kitchen, a scullery, and a pantry. A washhouse and other conveniences are provided in an outbuilding. The contractor for the erection of the building was Mr J. K. Johnston.





Continuing, Mr McKenzie said the building was a very handsome country post office, and compared not unfavourably with post offices in other parts of the Dominion. The name of Wakefield was historical in this country, and few had done more for the British race in New Zealand than the late Captain Wakefield: If the present progress was maintained electric trams would, in the future - perhaps not in his time - be running to Nelson. He congratulated the people on living in one of the most favoured spots in the Dominion. There was no place he had seen in the whole of the country to compare with the Waimea Valley... He thanked the people for their handsome memento of the occasion, which was one he would always treasure...

Cheers were then given for the Minister and Mrs McKenzie... who then declared the new post office open and invited the public to inspect the new building.

An adjournment was then made to the Oddfellows' Hall, where Mrs McKenzie presented each child with a savings bank book and one shilling. Those who already had an account at the post office were handed a shilling to deposit...

The Rev. O. R. Hewlett followed, and addressed his remarks mainly to the children. He urged them to be thrifty - at the same time he did not want to see them become money loving and money grubbing. He was proud that Mr McKenzie was their member ... Town and Country Talk

KENNEL COUGH - NOW KNOWN AS CANINE COUGH

What is it?

Kennel Cough is a general name given to a group of infectious agents which cause a cough or sneeze in dogs. Commonly it is a harsh, bark-like cough than can persist for 2-3 weeks. It can be fatal in young or old dogs but more often is just unpleasant for the dog and owner!

Is it contagious?

Yes!! It is usually passed between dogs by droplets coughed or sneezed directly or onto contaminated surfaces and is highly infectious. Boarding kennels are a higher risk area because the exposure to a bigger population of dogs in an enclosed area increases the chances of infection. Most kennels will not accept dogs unless they are vaccinated. Dog shows and grooming parlours are other potential risk places. Occasionally we will see outbreaks in groups of farm or pig dogs. However we also see Kennel Cough in dogs that have only been to the park, beach or around the block. Hence the name change to Canine Cough as it is certainly not just a disease picked up at kennels.



How can I protect my dog?

The two most common causes of Canine Cough can be vaccinated against. There are up to five other infective agents which can cause Canine Cough but these infections are less common. The routine Parvo vaccination provides protection against the main viral cause of Canine Cough. A separate vaccine is given to protect against the usual bacterial cause:

Canigen KC is a vaccine given by injection under the skin usually at the same time as your dog's other vaccinations such as parvo. Two injections three weeks apart are required followed by annual boosters.

Nobivac KC is a single dose of vaccine given up the nose. It takes three days to take effect so is often used for an urgent unplanned visit to boarding kennels or in an outbreak. It is more likely to cause side effects of mild sneezing/coughing after use. Annual boosters are required.

What can I do if my dog gets infected?

Often the cause is viral so antibiotics won't help. However, we do sometimes prescribe antibiotics to prevent secondary infection or in case bacteria are present. Sometimes anti-inflammatory medication can help. Other than that, it is usually a case of waiting it out. Ideally affected dogs should be confined at home for at least three weeks to prevent spread.

RYEGRASS STAGGERS

We are again seeing cases of Ryegrass Staggers on farms. This is a disease caused by toxins produced by a fungus present in some types of Ryegrass. The symptoms are tremors, jerky movements and staggering. It affects cows, sheep, deer and horses, and alpaca are particularly susceptible.

Affected animals are in danger of accidents such as getting caught in fences or falling into streams. They may also eat less and not drink enough. There is no specific antidote – the main treatment is getting affected animals off the ryegrass pasture and onto some other type of feed or safe ryegrass.

There are many other causes of staggering, tremors and abnormal behavior – if you are not sure, it is best to get the vet out – sooner rather than later!



LAMB VACCINE

Please note that Lamb Vaccine or PK Antitet (for pulpy kidney and tetanus) will not be available next season. Replacement lambs should be vaccinated twice now with 5 in 1 then a booster within a year. Pregnant ewes/hoggets usually have their annual booster 3-4 weeks before lambing. This protects their lambs from birth, through tailing until about three months of age.

A Matter of Accounts

ACCIDENT COMPENSATION CORPORATION [ACC]

If you work as a sole trader, in a partnership, or have withholding or schedular payments deducted from your earnings instead of PAYE tax, you are considered a self-employed person for ACC purposes. Self-employed individuals are required to pay for annual personal injury cover from ACC. ACC provides personal injury cover for all self-employed people as soon as you start self-employment.

Self Employment Cover Options

You automatically get ACC CoverPlus, but have the option of choosing ACC CoverPlus Extra. The three options available are:

- ACC CoverPlus: automatically provides personal injury cover for self-employed people, with access to the full range of medical treatment, rehabilitation benefits, and lost earnings compensation, if you are injured. The compensation you get under ACC CoverPlus may be minimal if you are newly self-employed or self-employed part-time.
- 2. ACC CoverPlus Extra: Similar to ACC CoverPlus but you can negotiate an agreed amount of lost earnings compensation which provides greater flexibility and certainty for self-employed people if you are injured and unable to work. Note: Not all self-employed part time people are eligible for ACC CoverPlus Extra [see the website].
- 3. ACC Workplace Safety Discounts: ACC recognises good workplace health and safety systems, and rewards you when you improve safety through our Workplace Safety Discount programme. You get training and support to improve safety, as well as a 10% discount on your levies. [Check out the website for more details].



What do I have to pay?

Payments to ACC for personal injury cover are called levies. The levy you pay when self-employed is calculated based on:

- Classification Unit this takes into account the type of work you do by grouping together business activities with a similar risk of work-related injury and allocates a rate based on that risk
- Liable Earnings your levies each year are estimated using your income from the previous year. Your liable earnings
 are the part of your income from self-employment upon which ACC levies are payable. Liable earnings are based on
 earnings from 'personal exertion' including:
 - o salary and wages
 - o shareholder-employee salaries
 - o salaries to partners in a partnership
 - o salary or wages to owners in a look-through company (LTC)
 - o active income from a look-through company
 - income from self employment



The levies include:

- The Work Levy (including the residual portion) for work-related injury cover through the cover products ACC CoverPlus and ACC CoverPlus Extra.
- The Earners' Levy (covers the cost for non-work injuries for self-employed people this levy is automatically deducted through PAYE for employees.)
- · Health and Safety in Employment Levy

When do I pay?

Inland Revenue processes your IR3 tax return and sends your liable earnings details and business industry code to ACC. Invoices are then sent and your ACC invoice pack will include a summary

of your account balance and a tax invoice for the year. Invoices are payable on normal business terms with penalties applied for non-payment. In your first year you will receive two invoices, one for levies for the past year and one for the next year.

How do I make a claim?

The medical practitioner who treats you will submit your ACC claim. Delaying treatment delays your claim being submitted, and may make your injury worse. The sooner we receive your claim the quicker we can help you. ACC can help with your treatment costs, travel and medical bills, expenses and lost earnings while you recover. After your claim is accepted, we work with you to determine what support you need.

A FIRST FOR NELSON - STARTING HERE IN WAKEFIELD!

DEMENTIA: a collection of symptoms resulting from failure of the brain. The result is the loss of ability to think, reason and remember. People with dementia have lost control over their lives.

The end of January saw the beginning of an exciting new venture for Wakefield. Barbie Reay, who was for ten years the Manager of Wakefield Rest Home, is now offering a much needed service for carers of dementia sufferers while at the same time catering for people with dementia in a warm and friendly way.

Each Wednesday, people will be picked up at their own homes and taken to Barbie's home in Higgins Road for a day of homecare. This will involve being cared for from 10am - 4pm in a safe, attractive setting, a farmlet, where all sorts of activities will be offered. Examples could be working in Barbie's warm homely kitchen to make vegetable soup after collecting the vegetables from the garden and preparing them; cutting up fruit to make jam with; revising old skills such as sanding and painting wooden articles; flower arranging; newspaper reading. The aim is to provide meaningful activities with successful outcomes, so that often there would be something to take home to share with the family and take pride in. Meaningful activities allow dementia sufferers to regain some control and help limit any unacceptable behaviours. Barbie will try to tailor activities to individual's needs and interests as much as possible.

Barbie has many great ideas which she wants to share with the people she cares for. Like the writing of Life Books which will record reminiscences of earlier life and feelings, and be a record of experiences they will share with her while in day care.

She says,

"My aim is to provide a relaxing, homely environment which encourages laughter and the sharing of experiences and past memories, and reduces anxiety."



Carers can be secure in the knowledge that Barbie is a qualified Enrolled Nurse and Diversional Therapist, and has always had a heart for the elderly. She has been involved in care since training at Nelson Hospital, and always wanted to make life fun for them.

Numbers cared for would be restricted to three. The programme is funded by the Nelson Marlborough District Health Board for one day a week throughout the year and persons need to be 65 years or older to qualify.

This Home Share service for dementia sufferers is part of the Enliven programme, run by Presbyterian Support Nelson. It will be the first of other similar programmes for the Nelson Area and the hope is that others may follow in due course as the need is there. Volunteers and additional hosts are welcomed if you feel you would like to offer such a service in the future.

Wakefield Feathers Trophy



Stallone is the worlds foremost authority on structural security and he agrees to take on one last job, to break out of an ultra-secret high tech facility called "The Tomb". Deceived and wrongly imprisoned, Sylvester must now recruit fellow inmate Arnold Schwarzenegger to help devise a daring and nearly impossible escape plan from the most protected and fortified prison ever built. These guys are always great viewing with great action scenes and some funny lines thrown in. Worth a watch.

Runner Runner

This one I don't know too much about, stars Gemma Arterton, Ben Affleck and Justin Timberlake. Running 1hr 31min, this is a suspense, mystery, drama. Timberlake is a Princeton college student who pays for his fees by online gambling, but bottoms out and travels to Costa Rica to confront an online mastermind, whom he believe swindled him. This mastermind sees a kindred spirit and brings him on board and then things get incredibly dangerous as the stakes get higher and higher. 
