It was a fantastic event, culminating in their celebration of Geoff Shearer's Gold Star award. Geoff has spent an impressive 25 years volunteering with the New Zealand Fire Service and this award is generally the pinnacle of achievement for most brigade members, an award few ever receive.

After joining the brigade, a firefighter's first recognition is their three year certificate. After five years' service, they receive a silver medal. Thereafter, for every two years' service they receive a silver bar that accompanies their silver medal. After twenty five years of service they receive the gold star medal and a gold bar is awarded for every two years that they serve from then on.

The official honours are much appreciated by brigade members, but they are actually a small reward for all the hours of training put in every week, every month, every year, at all times of day and night, in fair weather and foul. The true reward for every brigade member is the great satisfaction they feel when they have been able to help a member of the public.

Town and Country Talk

RAT BAIT!

It's that time of year when rats and mice start migrating into buildings to get out of the rain and seek warmth. Many people lay poisonous baits so unfortunately it is also the time of year when we see an increase in rat bait poisoning in dogs and sometimes cats.

It is important to use a proper bait station which is pet-proof. It is also important to store unused bait in a secure place. We often see accidental poisoning cases where bait has fallen off a shelf in the shed and pets eat it before their owners notice.

Most baits act by stopping blood from clotting, so the animal bleeds to death. Symptoms vary depending on where the bleeding is occurring:

- blood in the urine or faeces
- rapid breathing or a cough due to bleeding in the lungs
- lameness when there is bleeding into joints.
- lethargy or poor exercise tolerance when there is internal bleeding
- pale/white gums due to blood loss

Symptoms are not seen immediately. They will only appear when sufficient blood loss has occurred - this usually takes a few days. If you suspect your pet has eaten bait, it is important to treat with an emetic to induce vomiting ASAP - preferably within 3-4 hours of ingestion. If it is longer than this, vomiting won't help and treatment must be started instead. This is a three week course of antidote followed by a blood test. Sometimes hospitalisation and a blood transfusion are necessary i.e. treatment is long and expensive!

Secondary poisoning from eating dead rats and mice is unusual as the number of rodents required to cause illness is large compared with direct ingestion of bait.

PREGNANCY DIAGNOSIS IN SHEEP

One of our vets Danny spends most of his winter ultrasound scanning sheep. Why? Because he can identify dry ewes and those carrying single, twin or triplet lambs.

So why is this useful? Early detection of dry ewes means they can be culled at a premium price and feed is saved for pregnant stock. Pregnant ewes can be grazed according to their requirements, reducing birthing problems in singles and sleepy sickness in twins.


When twin-bearing ewes are grazed well, their lambs are born heavier which improves their survival rate. On good feed the lambs' growth rates are better. Twin-bearing ewes will be in better condition at weaning and more likely to produce twins the following year. Replacements can be selected from twin lambs and this increases the chances of future twins and increased lambing percentages.

Putting a dollar value on the benefit of scanning is difficult as there are many variables to consider, but generally there is a significant cost:benefit ratio and this explains why virtually without exception everybody who tries scanning continues to do so year after year.

Ewes are best scanned 80-90 days after the ram is introduced to the ewes. Variation from this date reduces the accuracy. If you are interested in having your ewes scanned or would like more information, phone our Richmond clinic on 544 1200.



First up, did you change your batteries in your smoke alarms? If you did, well done, you may just have saved your families lives. If you haven't please do so now.

Well the wet weather has been here and gone for now but we will still get more heavy rain before autumn and winter is over so have you checked that your house gutters and other water outlets like drain grills are not blocked up with leaves and small twigs? Often over the autumn and winter periods the brigade will get called out for internal flooding. We have very little control over this but when we arrive sometimes it is a simple matter of kicking aside leaves from a grill or getting up on a ladder to remove leaves from a gutter. At times with very heavy rain the gutter on the road kerb gets blocked up with leaves and twigs so to reduce the chance of water coming onto your property can you also please check this and keep it free of debris.

Do you have a fire hydrant outside your house or near your house? If you do can you please help us by checking that the yellow lid can be seen. If it is hard to see due to the long grass or dirt on top of the lid can you please clear it for us. In an emergency fire call time is critical and if we have trouble finding the nearest fire hydrant it may mean the difference between saving people inside the house and total loss of life and house.

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A Matter of Accounts

LOOKING FORWARD - CASHFLOW & FORECASTING

One of the key areas of forecasting involves the forecast of cash in and out. A cash flow forecast is an estimate of when you expect to receive cash and likewise when you expect to pay your creditors and other commitments. Being able to show how much money will flow in and out of your business, and when, is a critical part of your financial plan.

It is important to make sure you have a plan that projects your cash flow for the upcoming year so you know what resources you may need, and when you need them. The lack of planning and control of cash resources is the reason often given for the failure of many small businesses.

How often should I prepare a financial forecast?

This will often depend on the circumstances of your business, whether incoming and outgoing cash fluctuates a lot, and where your business is positioned in the business life cycle. If you are planning to start a business, you should prepare an annual forecast, but you should be constantly reviewing it and updating it, monthly or even weekly as necessary.

Growth can often be one of the most dangerous times for any business. If you are planning on growing your business in the next financial year, you need to consider the resources required and the timing of when the resources will be needed - especially cash. An effective forecast should start from a basis of the worst case scenario. It is better to have pleasant surprises rather than nasty shocks.

A cashflow forecast measures the timing of receipts and payments and predicts the cash position for the future. A business can be making profits but have cashflow problems due to poor management of: customer payments, supplier payments, stock, work in progress, capital commitments, loan repayments etc.

When preparing a cashflow forecast, you start with the opening bank balance, plus the incoming receipts, minus the outgoing payments, which gives you the closing bank balance.

For the incoming receipts, you look at how much you are likely to sell, and you need to predict how long customers will take to pay. You can base this on previous trading history rather than your trading terms as not all customers pay on time. If you're expecting significant business growth over the coming year, you should consider how guickly new customers will pay. Will they pay as quickly as your current clientele?

For the outgoings, you need to look at when money will go out of the bank for your one off purchases as well as your regular commitments. With growth in sales comes growth in purchases, so you need to question whether this will cause your business to reach any credit limits with its suppliers.

There are many advantages of an effective cashflow forecast:

 The cashflow forecast puts you in a position of knowing well beforehand what your cash position will be, given your predictions. This allows you to plan for action to manage a positive or negative balance. For example, you can plan when to purchase assets, borrow funds, or manage payments.

Cash inflow > cash outflow = POSITIVE cash flow

Cash inflow L cash outflow = NEGATIVE cash flow.

Surgery hours: Wednesday

Parents and caregivers are reminded that scheduled childhood immunisations are free and their effects are cumulative - the more children in a community who are immunised, the wider the benefits for all. Please call the health centre if you would like to check your child's immunisation status.

The nursing team are offering free cardiovascular risk assessments to men aged 45-70 and women aged 55-70 who have not had a check in the last five years. Maori, Pacific Island and Asian patients are reminded that these checks begin at 35 (men) and 45 (women) and are an excellent way to stay informed about your health and your lifestyle choices. Everyone should take advantage of these free assessments, not only those with a family history of cardiovascular illnesses.

Health centre staff may ask you questions about your alcohol consumption and smoking status as part of many programmes aiming for better health outcomes in the future. This information is collected nationwide from all these programmes and assists the Ministry of Health to plan for future screening and budgets.



In Recognition of...

ASSOCIATIONS RECOGNISE A WAKEFIELD MAN

During late April and early May, Colin Gibbs has been awarded **TWO LIFE MEMBERSHIPS** from organisations for recognitions of his outstanding contributions to them. These have come about with the support of wife and family who help whenever/wherever possible.

Although Colin comes from a family involved with dog trials, he has made a large contribution to the sport for over 60 years in his own right. He has been involved with every South Island Championship in the Marlborough/Nelson Region since 1952 at Max's property in Brightwater. This has included burning himself while stoking the water coppers for caterers through to last year where he jointly helped raise a considerable profit for the Province as Sponsorship Co-ordinator.

Some of these involvements include setting up courses at Delaware Bay, Course releasers, Deputy Marshall, Course Marshall, Office Assistant - twice, Trial President, and Sponsorship. Colin is one who helps out at working bees and running of trials wherever/whenever the time or circumstance arises and helped release sheep at every Club in the Province over the years.

His contribution to the Waimea Club has been enormous where he has held office of President or Secretary for over 25 years and the challenges or responsibility that go with these. He's continued the providing of equipment and sheep, and pre working thereof, for trials and at Nelson and Motueka Shows - something that has happened for over 50 years.

He served as Marlborough/Nelson Councillor for six years and played a major role updating NZ bylaws and on several occasions travelled to meetings throughout NZ to represent Marlborough/Nelson even though he didn't enter a dog at the Championship. That's his dedication to the sport. Although Colin has only competed in one South Island final, [Levels 1979], he has been a regular placegetter at Central Provincial Championships, the major one being the double heading win at Maruia. He has represented Marlborough/Nelson at Tux Yarding Challenge in Levin and handydog event at Mystery Creek where along with Jim Allen they won the North v South event.

Colin is one that has a wealth of knowledge and material that members of the Marlborough/Nelson Asociation and further afield draw on for help right down to borrowing a stopwatch at the recent Champs, after the Judge of event two dropped his watch in a cup of tea. This shows the stature of the small club to now have six current LIFE MEMBERS on the Marlborough Nelson Association.

The second came from Nelson A and P Association at its recent AGM.

Colin came onto the A&P Committee in about 1970. He'd been helping with both dog trials and shearing. The late John Moore, Chief Steward of Shearing, pushed him into the committee. His Dad was also on Committee. In those days they had a portable shearing platform and pens either set up on 44 gallon drums or later set on long TNL trailers so they could shift into the ring in front of the stands to hold the finals. That was a huge effort but a great spectacle.

In those days there was a variety of ring attractions and people sat in the stands. Now they have a permanent stand which Colin helped build. Sheep for shearing was, and still is, a challenge to find at that time of year. For many years they came from Hugh Challies and sometimes Rupert Martin at Transport Nelson Farm.

A&P shows have been a family interest involvement. Colin's grandfather, Albert, was president in 1933, father Phil in 1963 and Colin did two years 1979 & 1980. Throughout the years they have helped and sometimes provided materials for stockyards, sheep shed, shearing pavilion, fencing and grazing on the grounds.

When Colin came onto the committee, Richmond Park was run by a joint planning committee with Jockey, Trotting and A&P Association. A&P was the poorer relation but owned most of the land, approx 100 acres. It has survived but present times find committee members hard to find as there are so many varied/diverse activities, sports and work commitments that make up life in the fast lane. Diversity of products now produced from our land are not an easy commodity to display or compete against each other at a single designated weekend.

When pushed into Junior Vice President, Dick Sowman was President and they had a very outward going promotion group which Colin got involved on along with Pat Dobbin and others. With their increased show publicity and innovative ideas the A&P gained large increase in participation and revenue which followed on for a number of years. Like any activity the success of an event is getting people through the gate. It's not just side show alley but a chance to see livestock young and mature, horse jumping and static displays, perhaps latest cars or technology innovations. It's a chance for young to experience animals close at hand or older people to greet old friends.

Dog trials have been part of the Gibbs' family life and these competitions have continued at NELSON SHOW through their involvement and material provision. Types of events have varied over the years but always a challenge of man and dog verse sheep to win the coveted Governor General Sir Bernard Ferguson shepherds crook which was donated in 1962. Both Phil and Colin have won this several times. Provision of, and "schooling of", the sheep for these trials has been a part of Colin's responsibility. He can remember "Kirbys Carriers" coming early Friday morning to collect sheep at about 6-00am. Nelson Show used to held on a Fridat/Saturday but changed to Saturday/ Sunday about 20 years ago.

These awards come on top of Colin's Life Membership to Waimea Dog Trial Club. Life Membership to South Island Shear Sports and Patron of local Smallbore Rifle Club from where he was a Nelson Representative.

In the coming months we will also individually profile these businesses, so we can all learn more about the families involved.


