



Following a medical emergency on Edward Street ast month, the two parties, along with the Wakefield Health Centre Committee, swiftly accelerated the discussion and agreed to proceed with the plan.

Focus Wakefield Committee members oted unanimously to purchase the new public defibrillator and it will be conveniently sited at Wakefield Four Square, benefitting from the security systems already in place to safeguard against vandalism.

Wakefield Health Centre Committee has generously undertaken to maintain the public defibrillator, and members Bob Croy and Eloise Fry were instrumental in cementing the plans.

Four Square owners Stu and Jacqui Hore have researched this subject and are delighted they can help with such an important tool for the community.

Thankfully, the Health Centre defibrillator was available although not required last month, but the new constant access defibrillator will be available around the clock, even when the Health Centre is closed. Every minute counts in such emergencies, as all involved will attest. The gentleman taken ill is now recovering and would like to thank everyone concerned who assisted.





# Wakefield School Staff Support a Better Plan

You may be aware that the Government has initiated an Investing in Educational Success plan. It is an initiative where schools are brought together in Communities of Learning and some teachers and principals are paid to 'mentor' other schools and teachers. Large amounts of money are paid to these selected staff; the initial offers are executive principals an additional \$40,000 a year, \$20,000 more for expert teachers and \$10,000 more for lead teachers. In a recent vote the staff of Wakefield School, along with 93% of primary school colleagues nationwide, reject these initiatives.

### "A Better Plan for Kids"

We are not interested in pay rises for teachers and principals who would be taken out of classrooms for up to two days a week 'mentoring' other schools. Collaboration and support for teachers in our own and other schools is already happening and could be strengthened without spending large amounts of money on a few staff.

#### \$359 million! How could this be better spent?

We feel the money could be better spent on:

- \* Smaller class sizes to ensure individualised learning. The introduction of a 1:15 ratio for five year olds is estimated to cost \$50 million a year.
- \* Better funding for children with special needs to support 20,000 more kids at an estimated \$180 million.
- \* Funding for teacher aides in classrooms so teachers can focus on teaching and learning.

# **Town and Country Talk**

#### **HAPPY HOLIAYS!** by Brenda Halliwell

As we all prepare for Christmas holidays, making arrangements for pet care over the summer and holiday period is an important consideration.

Here are a few things to think about.....

 Vaccinations for respiratory viruses in cats, and parvovirus plus kennel cough in dogs must be up to date in order to stay in boarding facilities. Call us for advice if you're not sure.

Leave contact numbers for your vet as well as your mobile phone number with your pet carer.

Beware of novel objects which could be swallowed by your pets such as Christmas tinsel, strings from the roast, kebab sticks from the barbecue, fish hooks, chocolate and potentially obstructive food such as chop bones, corn cobs and peach stones.

 Heatstroke is common over summer particularly in larger dogs. NEVER leave dogs in the car on a hot day, even in the shade with windows down. Offer frequent drinks/stops on journeys. Restrict exercise to cooler parts of the day. Limit the length of walks especially for young energetic dogs, old dogs and dogs with medical problems. Provide shade for dog kennels and rabbit/guinea pig cages.

Clipping long haired pets can prevent problems such as overheating, soiling, skin infections and grass seed problems. We often clip the underside/belly of long haired cats, and advise clipping under ears and around the feet of long haired dogs. Some long haired dogs which aren't traditionally clipped (eg Border Collies) are much more comfortable and active, even if they do look a bit odd!

Check your dog's paws, ears, 'armpits' and groin daily for grass seeds. It may seem a hassle to do this but it can be an expensive, time-consuming and painful process to find grass seeds once they are inside your dog!

Warm weather accelerates development of flea eggs and larvae so regular treatment is important. We have many options available so pop into the clinic for advice on what's best for you and your pet.

# How do I know if my sheep are flyblown?

Yes it's summer and the flies are back! Affected animals can be seen nibbling their wool, stamping their feet and twitching their tails before becoming depressed. Dark patches may also been seen on white fleeces.

Maggots can be difficult to find amongst wool on sheep. So if you see symptoms, the wool should be systematically parted and checked especially in the commonly affected areas:

- around the tail end
- on the back line

• on the belly where feet touch when the sheep lies down and around the pizzle in males between the ears of rams after fighting and head bashing



Treatment Clip wool around the affected area to about 5mm and destroy the clippings. Apply Cyrex Liquid to the area. Do not use flyspray. Sheep that are sick/toxic due to flystrike may also need more intensive treatment including antibiotic and pain relief medications.

### Prevention

There are a number of available products which come under many names and with a variety of application methods. Some products treat lice as well. Meat withholding periods must be considered if treated lambs are being sent to the works. So read the instructions before use!

### STOP THE WATER WORKS! HOW TO TRAIN YOUR PELVIC FLOOR MUSCLES FOR WOMEN AND MEN by Kate West, Physiotherapist

Do you avoid the trampoline? Do you have to cross your legs when you sneeze? The chances are you have weak pelvic floor muscles. Your pelvic floor muscles are vital for maintaining good bladder and bowel control. And the good news is that they can be retrained and strengthened so no more embarrassing leakage.

### WHERE ARE YOUR PELVIC FLOOR MUSCLES LOCATED?

Your pelvic floor muscles extend from your pubic bone in the front to your tailbone at the back (picture one). These muscles form the 'floor' of your pelvis

### WHAT DO YOUR PELVIC FLOOR MUSCLES DO?

These muscles support your bladder, bowel (and uterus or womb in females) and they help prevent leakage.

### HOW DO THEY GET WEAK?

Typical causes are:

- In pregnancy and childbirth the pelvic floor muscles are stretched to make room for the baby which can lead to weakness
- · After some prostate surgery
- · Persistent straining to empty the bladder or bowel
- Heavy lifting
- Chronic cough
- · Being overweight
- · Lack of general fitness

### HOW DO I KNOW IF THEY ARE WORKING PROPERLY?

Start by sitting in a chair and breathe calmly. Relax your bottom, stomach and leg muscles. Now imagine you are trying to stop the flow of urine or are holding in wind. Do this by gently squeezing and lifting up around your front and back passage. Remember don't hold your breath or tighten your bottom or leg muscles. You can do a self test to check you are using the correct muscles the next time you need to pass urine. Try and stop mid-flow and then restart. Please note that this is only a test and is not a way of training your pelvic floor muscles.

### TRAINING YOUR PELVIC FLOOR MUSCLES

The first thing to know is that with all strength training you need to persevere to see results. Training your pelvic floor muscles is no different. Start off small, and as you get stronger increase the time of your holds.

- Sit or lie down, relax your breathing and allow the rest of your body to relax
- Strongly squeeze and lift your pelvic floor muscles and hold for 3 10 seconds
- Relax for 3-5 seconds
- · Then repeat your squeeze and lift 8-12 times this counts as one set
- · Repeat this exercise so that you are doing 3 sets per day

Remember to make sure that you continue to breathe throughout this exercise and don't use your bottom and inner thigh muscles. You should see results within 4-12 weeks depending on your circumstances.

If you are pregnant, make sure you start doing these exercises now and continue to do after birth to reduce the chances of leakage (as one in three women suffer from urinary leakage after birth - NZ Continence Association).

If you are having difficulty finding or contracting your pelvic floor muscles then don't give up. Try the exercise in a different position such as lying on your back or on your side.

If this still doesn't work then please seek help from a qualified pelvic floor physiotherapist.



# Focus Wakefield

After more than two years of planning and consultation, the Focus Wakefield project for Beautification of the Village Green has finally received approval from the Tasman District Council.

The project has been planned to be implemented in several stages as follows: 1. Establishment of the planted area within the green and the planting


- of the new cedar tree (with the involvement of the School). 2. Organisation of litter bins, bike racks, tables, seating and drinking fountain (and a water feature \*\*).
- 3. Laying of brick paving at the end of the car park forming the additional planting area around the toilet and plant up. This would follow on well with the establishment of the bike racks (we may even combine these)
- 4. Construction of the raised beds in the central area.
- 5. Construction of the two raised beds by the main entrance to the Green followed closely by the central raised flower gardens.
- 6. Construction of the water feature\*\*.

We had hoped to commence Stage 1 this Spring 2014 but due to the timing of TDC's approval we are going to commence with Stage 2 (sourcing litter bins, bike racks, tables, seating and water fountain) in January/February 2015 and come back to Stage 1 in Autumn 2015.

#### We need:

- people to assist with construction and manufacturing of the bike racks, tables and seating
- donations of or towards these items (you or your business will be recognised with an appropriate plaque on or near the item)
- donations of raw products e.g. steel piping, wood, concrete furniture makers, woodworkers, engineers & manufacturers, pavers
- and bricklayers, and steel-workers
- we are also going to need general assistance and volunteers

\*\* note: a water fountain installation is included in the original design plan but TDC's approval of this aspect of the plan is still pending.





# The Way We Were

Uncle Dick's Story - Part II 24 April 1916 - 3 September 1917 Prepared for the Waimea South Historical Society by Roger Batt

It is towards the end of April 1916, Douglas William Batt has left the heat of the Egyptian desert for the western front. With "many Nelson boys" he is billeted out with a French farming family and "trying hard to learn French." He has seen "many wonderful places" and wants to go to Paris. What amazes him is the way that the people carry out their daily work with no heed to the fighting that is going on close at hand. His concern continues to be with his family at home. Karl is told to "...help Dad all he can as he is the only son he can now depend on."

By May 3rd he has received six letters and two parcels since Christmas. The big guns are "very noisy." In December he is due for ten days leave and has had to cable home for some money to enjoy it. (He hopes to get to England.) Asking after the Coles (a local family) he supposes the baby has grown a little. The cold has come and they have had several snowfalls. Christmas has been spent out of the trenches in a little French village and he has had a good time.

The Battle of the Somme had raged from 1st July to 18th November and he supposes that they "got a fright to see the casualty list of NZ boys" but that they were "spoken well of wherever we go." (This was the first and largest battle faced by NZ troops in WWI. Out of 15,000 men in the division, 2,000 were killed - 1 in 7, and 4 in 10 were wounded.) He hopes to be home for next Christmas and thinks the Germans have had enough.

By 18 January 1917, and with only one oblique reference to the carnage of the Somme, he was thinking of home. "No doubt the spring must be lovely over there I often wish this old war would end and I were home. I never want to see another day like that one." Then his thoughts turn to more familiar things: "You will soon be in the thick of the fruit picking...how I wish that I were there for the fruit. I haven't seen any decent apples since I left...I hope to be home by next Xmas if I am lucky."

On February 6th his letter includes thanks for the pound note that was sent to enable him to go on leave. Once more he focuses on the positive aspects of his situation. "I have had a wide experience out here more than money could buy and I shall never regret it. With America about to enter the war he reflects that he is "fed just as well as if there was no war on: meat, butter, vegetables, a meal of eggs and chips for a franc...I can get a hot bath and clean clothes within four miles of the firing line."

June 4th in France is "lovely and hot." He is near a "nice swimming hole. We spend a good deal of time in it although it is close to the trenches and we often have to run for our lives.'

Even in the midst of a great war he can see beauty among the carnage. "I was out motoring last night all around the front and it was a pretty sight to see all the different coloured lights and rockets going off and the big guns hammering all the time." But the risks he is taking daily and the uncertainty of his situation compared with those 12,000 miles away doesn't go unnoticed.

"Thelma tells me that old R.E. has a car. I think it is about time he came out hear, it is very hard to see what our boys put up with out hear and hundreds of them are loafing around there homes. And the worst of it is they will be thought just as much of as the ones that came out hear and died for there countrie.'

However, it is not in his nature to remain bitter or bemoan his situation for very long. In the same letter he adds: "Tell (Dad) I am having a great experience out hear and am very pleased that he made no fuss about me coming away.' (To be continued)

# **On The Beat**

#### Hi everyone,

With the end of the year fast approaching and work or social functions underway, I want to let everyone know of the change to the law on drinking alcohol and driving. These laws come into effect on the 1st of December 2014.

There is advertising currently running on this subject through national media outlets, so the more aware we make you the less chance that you will get caught out. Here is an extract which outlines the new levels and penalties:

#### DRINK DRIVE LAW CHANGE

The Government has introduced new legislation lowering the alcohol limit for drivers aged 20 and over from 1st December 2014. The breath alcohol limit lowers from 400mcg of alcohol per litre of breath to 250mcg of alcohol per litre of breath. The blood alcohol limit lowers from 80mg of alcohol per 100ml of blood (0.08) to 50mg of alcohol per 100ml of blood (0.05).

The big question for most people is how much can I drink and legally drive? The answer isn't straightforward. It will depend on your gender, your size, how much you have eaten, how tired you are and how your body deals with alcohol. We're all different!

Alcohol contributes to about 30 percent of fatal road crashes and even small amounts of alcohol affect your driving. The simplest solution is if you drink, don't drive. Make a plan before you go out to get a sober driver, a taxi or stay the night.

If you've had a big night you need to be aware that you could still be over the 250 limit the following morning. Make sure you get a good sleep and eat before you get back behind the wheel.

One thing you can guarantee over the coming months is that you are highly likely to be stopped and breath tested while driving. When you are stopped you will undergo a roadside breath screening test. If you register 250 or less you will be allowed to drive on. If you are over 250 you will be required to undergo an evidential breath test. This will usually be done at a police station or booze bus. If your result comes back between 251 and 400mcg you will receive a \$200 infringement fee and 50 demerit points. You will not be allowed to drive for 12 hours. If your test shows more than 400mcg you will face criminal charges.

The legal limit for drivers aged under 20 the alcohol limit remains zero.

My advice to all drivers is don't take a risk and don't stand by and let your mates drink and drive. We want everyone to get home safely.

That is the message everyone, enjoy the festive season, and drink alcohol in moderation and be aware of the above message.

We have a great community spirit in this area so let's keep it going, so keep the information coming to us.

Enjoy the rest of the year, be safe, drive safe.

# **A Matter of Accounts**

# PREPARING AND PROCESSING PAYROLL

In the last few editions of Window on Wakefield we have looked at different accounting software options, so now I would like to talk a little bit about payroll options.

When we start out in business or our business is small, we may only have one or two employees. When this is the case, it can be relatively simple to calculate how much to pay them each period and to keep a track of their holidays owed either manually or in a payroll book using the payroll tables provided by the Inland Revenue Department.

Others may do the same function using an Excel spreadsheet and/or the online PAYE calculators that are available on the IRD's website at www.ird.govt.nz and type "PAYE calculator" in the search field.

However, once you have a few employees, the prospect of trying to manage all of this including kiwisaver, student loan and other deductions, can seem a little daunting and you may start to think about other options.

You could outsource the job to someone else who does this type of thing on a more regular basis, like your Accountant for example, or a range of online providers. This service is often provided for a relatively low cost and means that you can leave that job to someone else.

You could also decide to purchase some payroll software and manage the payroll yourself. It is important if you do this that you obtain the relevant training, and make use of all the tools available to you including the IRD website mentioned above, and the Department of Labour website which I mention below as these tools can assist you to understand what you are and aren't legally allowed to do.

If you decide to purchase payroll software, there are a huge number of options available but some of the more common ones are:

- MYOB
- IMS
- SmartPayroll
- Crvstal
- Ace Payroll

Make sure you do your homework, research the products on the internet, speak to your Accountant and make sure you choose a package that works well for your situation, or your industry and can grow with you if you need it to.

There is often an upfront cost with payroll systems and then an annual charge, or you can pay a monthly subscription. Whichever payroll system you choose, they will usually provide annual updates when the tax rates change or there are other changes to the employment legislation. It is important you understand if these upgrade costs are included in the price you are paying or if they are additional.

At this time of the year you may also want to clarify leave entitlements or the legalities of paying out holiday pay in advance etc. A good place to look for this information is

# The Legacy: 100 Years Since the Great Christmas Truce

The enduring legacy of this truce has been positive and it's looked upon today as a wonderful example of humanity during a dreadfully dark hour of man's history. It has inspired many songs, paintings, literature, films and other art works - too numerous to list. But it's greatest legacy must surely be the message of Hope.

One soldier wrote: " My dear sister Janet. It is 2:00 in the morning and most of our men are asleep in their dugouts-yet I could not sleep myself before writing to you of the wonderful events of Christmas Eve. In truth, what happened seems almost like a fairy tale, and if I hadn't been through it myself, I would scarce believe it. Just imagine: While you and the family sang carols before the fire there in London, I did the same with enemy soldiers here on the battlefields of France!

Just yesterday morning-Christmas Eve Day-we had our first good freeze. Cold as we were, we welcomed it, because at least the mud froze solid. Everything was tinged white with frost, while a bright sun shone over all. Perfect Christmas weather. During the day, there was little shelling or rifle fire from either side. And as darkness fell on our Christmas Eve, the shooting stopped entirely. Our first complete silence in months! We hoped it might promise a peaceful holiday, but we didn't count on it. We'd been told the Germans might attack and try to catch us off guard. I went to the dugout to rest, and lying on my cot, I must have drifted asleep. All at once my friend John was shaking me awake, saying, "Come and see! See what the Germans are doing!"

I grabbed my rifle, stumbled out into the trench, and stuck my head cautiously above the sandbags. I never hope to see a stranger and more lovely sight. Clusters of tiny lights were shining all along the German line, left and right as far as the eye could see."What is it?" I asked in bewilderment, and John answered, "Christmas trees!" And so it was. The Germans had placed Christmas trees in front of their trenches, lit by candle or lantern like beacons of good will. And then we heard their voices raised in song. Stille nacht, heilige nacht . . . This carol may not yet be familiar to us in Britain, but John knew it and translated: "Silent night, holv night,"

I've never heard one lovelier-or more meaningful, in that quiet, clear night, its dark softened by a first-quarter moon. When the song finished, the men in our trenches applauded. Yes, British soldiers applauding Germans! Then one of our own men started singing, and we all joined in. The first Nowell, the angel did say . . . In truth, we sounded not nearly as good as the Germans, with their fine harmonies. But they responded with enthusiastic applause of their own and then began another. O Tannenbaum, Then we replied. O come all ye faithful . . But this time they joined in, singing in Latin. British and German harmonizing across No Man's Land!

I would have thought nothing could be more amazing-but what came next was more so. "English, come over!" we heard one of them shout. "You no shoot, we no shoot." There in the trenches, we looked at each other in bewilderment. Then one of us shouted iokingly. "You come over here." To our astonishment, we saw two figures rise from the trench, climb over their barbed wire, and advance unprotected across No Man's Land. One of them called, "Send officer to talk." I saw one of our men lift his rifle to the ready, and no doubt others did the same-but our captain called out, "Hold your fire." Then he climbed out and went to meet the Germans halfway. We heard them talking, and a few minutes later, the captain came back with a German cigar in his mouth!

In minutes more, there we were in No Man's Land, over a hundred soldiers and officers of each side, shaking hands with men we'd been trying to kill just hours earlier! Before long a bonfire was built, and around it we mingled-British khaki and German grey. I must say, the Germans were the better dressed, with fresh uniforms for the holiday. Only a couple of our men knew German, but more of the Germans knew English. I asked one of them why that was."Because many have worked in England!" he said. As it grew late, a few more songs were traded around the fire, and then all joined in for-I am not lying to you-"Auld Lang Syne." Then we parted with promises to meet again tomorrow, and even some talk of a football match.

I was just starting back to the trenches when an older German clutched my arm. "My God," he said, "why cannot we have peace and all go home?" I told him gently, "That you must ask your emperor." He looked at me then, searchingly. "Perhaps, my friend. But also we must ask our hearts." And so, dear sister, tell me, has there ever been such a Christmas Eve in all history? And what does it all mean, this impossible befriending of enemies? All nations say they want peace. Yet on this Christmas morning, I wonder if we want it quite enough. Your loving Brother, Tom." As we remember the sacrifices, the horrors of face to face combat, of mustard gas, we remember the irony that two Christian nations locked in combat, dug into their shared childhood and their shared worship - because Jesus came to bring Peace On Earth - and decided not to fight on this holy day of the King of Peace. If only the powers that be, would seek such peace every day - we would not need wars that bring fear, insecurity, and even a sort of insanity.

May this Peace of Christ be with you this Chrismas Day. I trust many will pause and worship the bringer of peace, and remember German's haunting words : "

Why cannot we have peace and all go home? - perhaps my friend, we also must ask our hearts!"




