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Focus Wakefield: The Beautification Project

The Beautification Project includes the following:

- 1. From Great Taste Cycleway entrance into top of Edward Street down to Wakefield Village entrance:
- tidying up overgrown areas/gardens and unappealing areas, painting, renewing, improving upon existing seating/tables and presentation of historical places
- creating new gardens and plantings, and hanging baskets
- providing adequate green space and facilities for picnic-ers and cyclists and general visitors to Wakefield including BBQ's, bike stands, access to water, shade, seating and tables, toilets, rubbish bins etc.
- 2. Improving and adding to signage in the Village for cycleway and general village orientation
- 3. Improving the appearance of and adding to signage and historical information plaques
- 4. Planning an event to celebrate the arrival of the Great Taste Cycleway to Wakefield. (This event was planned to take place on 17th March 2013 but has had to be postponed, as you will read elsewhere in this newspaper).

The project team is making steady progress and have a second meeting planned with TDC scheduled early February to discuss and review draft proposals, designs and ideas. TDC's buy in is crucial for this project given that in some cases we wish to improve areas which the TDC own, control or maintain. TDC's input is also extremely important to ensure our proposals are sustainable and can be maintained, where necessary, by existing contractors or within existing infrastructure.

Provided we get approval of our draft proposals from TDC, we will then have a period of consultation to talk through designs with affected parties and stakeholders (eg users, maintenance people/ contractors and, in particular, owners/operators of businesses and residents in Edward Street). Once we have sufficient certainty and support for the proposals to move beyond the "planning phase" to the "doing phase", we will, at that time, make specific requests for contributions and support from you.

If you wish, in the meantime, to express an interest or offer some form of contribution to the project, whether of time generally or of particular services (such as building, paving, light engineering, or landscaping) or of materials (such as paint, timber, sleepers or other landscaping materials, concrete or pavers) then please email us at focuswakefield@gmail.com or phone Diane on 541 9615.



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
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Cycle way official opening postponed

Focus Wakefield were planning an event for March 17th to celebrate the opening of the cycle way. We envisaged a celebration of all that Wakefield has to offer residents and visitors, and the event is still being planned.

Unfortunately, however, although the cycle way now reaches Wakefield, it has been decided to postpone the official opening until further planned works are completed.

Whilst it is possible to use the cycle way via Higgins Road to the top of Edward Street, approaching the village involves negotiating St John's Church corner.

This is acknowledged by The Great Taste Trail, TDC and Focus Wakefield as somewhat dangerous for casual cyclists.

The corner is considered dangerous because it is a narrow blind corner that climbs the hill and is used by heavy trucks and cars as well as cyclists and pedestrians (there is no footpath).

All road users are reminded to use this corner cautiously until the planned boardwalk is completed.

When works are underway and a completion date is announced Focus Wakefield will reschedule and publicise an official opening event.



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Health & Wellbeing

We all get injured at some point so what I thought would be fitting for my first article is to remind you all of what to do when you injure yourself. I'm sure you all have heard of the R.I.C.E principle? It's by the far the simplest and easiest way to minimise the extent of your injury, but can often be forgotten or you may even feel as though you don't need to do it as your injury isn't that bad? The first 24 hours is the most crucial time, and this is when you need to start to R.I.C.E. The reason for this is when you injure yourself you are not only injuring your muscles, tendons and ligaments, you also damage your blood vessels. When your blood vessels are damaged and your blood accumulates around the damaged tissue, then this compresses the surrounding structures and causes further damage (and pain). By using the R.I.C.E principle you minimise the damage to the tissues, and therefore you will reduce the time it takes for your body to heal.

So what does R.I.C.E stand for?

Rest


Ice

Compression

Elevation

So now we know what it stands for, what do I actually have to do and why?

Firstly, REST. Yes that pretty much sums it up; you need to stop what you are doing. You do this to prevent further insult to your injury as well as reducing the amount of blood flow to the damaged area. More bleeding = more swelling = more tissue damage = longer time to heal. ICE is used to constrict the blood vessels. This decreases the flow of blood to the damaged tissue, and therefore minimises the amount of swelling and further tissue damage. Ice can also help reduce pain. The general rule is to ice for 10 minutes every 1-2 hours initially and then reduce this over the following 24 hours. To get the best results from your ice treatment use either one of the following:-



- · Home-made ice cup by filling a Styrofoam cup three quarters full and then putting in the freezer
- · Purchased ice pad

Just remember that ice can burn you. So it's best not to directly apply to your skin, or if you do then keep the ice moving.

COMPRESSION limits and delays swelling. It can also give you a feeling of support which is good for pain. The best way to compress your injured tissue is either using a compression bandage, crepe bandage or sports tape. Make sure you don't wrap yourself up too tight. **ELEVATION** again reduces swelling, and can help with pain. If you can, try and raise your injured area above your heart eg for an ankle injury, prop your foot up on the sofa with some pillows whilst you lie down.

Hopefully this has refreshed a few memories to the advantages of using the R.I.C.E principle. It really does help. The other important things to know when you injury yourself is to avoid H.A.R.M. This might be a little less known, but means to AVOID:

Heat: hot baths, heat packs, hot water bottles etc - as this increases the blood flow to the injured area.

Alcohol: as this can mask the pain and possible severity of your injury. It also increases bleeding by dilating the blood vessels, so more bruising and more swelling.

Running: you can cause further insult to your injured area.

Massage: causes increased blood flow to the area and should be avoided until 72 hours after injury.

Hopefully this article has reminded you of what to do when you get injured, and enables you to get back on your feet sooner.

This article should be used as a guideline only and does not substitute seeking professional medical help. If you are in any doubt please seek medical advice from a physiotherapist or doctor.

Whooping Cough (Pertussis) Nelson Marlborough Epidemic - some facts:

- The Nelson Marlborough Whooping Cough Epidemic has been in progress for 18 months 1,138 cases notified
- In the last month, the largest number of cases reported is 18
- Anyone with a persistent or severe cough should see their doctor and stay away from Early Childhood Centre, School or other group settings until the doctor is sure it is not whooping cough
- 80% of infants who catch whooping cough get it from a parent, caregiver, or older brother
- One person with whooping cough on average will pass it to 17 other people
- It is important to get your baby immunised on time
- Whooping cough can lead to pneumonia
- Whooping cough can lead to encephalopathy (brain damage), convulsions and death

Whooping Cough vaccine (Boostrix)

- Is now available to all pregnant women between 28-38 weeks
- All children over 11 years
- It is included in the NZ National Immunisation Schedule

Immunisation Eligibility Extended

- · Eligibility for the funded National Immunisation Schedule has been extended up to their 18th birthday
- This is a good opportunity to ensure all children are up to date with their vaccinations

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Wakefield Volunteer Fire Brigade Report

Hi everyone ©

As the holiday period winds down and schools start back, we generally now only have the weekends to get out and about with friends and family and this can often be camping or meeting up at the reserves etc for a bbg and a bit of a get-together.

We're very lucky that we have beautiful countryside to get out and enjoy ourselves in and so after the recent tragedy with the fires in Australia and more recently in Christchurch and Waiheke, we thought this may be a good opportunity to give you a timely and important reminder about keeping ourselves, our property and our countryside safe and free from the ravages that can occur when we get careless.

Firstly we'd like to remind everyone that you can only light a fire in an outdoor area if you have a 'Fire Permit'. If you try to burn rubbish without one, as has been the case a couple of times recently..... We will come out with the Big Red Truck and put it out for you!

Permits to burn in the open are required in rural areas throughout the year within the region. Fire restrictions are in force all year round in Tasman District. Permits are generally needed for all outdoor fires except enclosed incinerators and barbecues. For permit enquiries or additional information contact: Principal Rural Fire Officer, Rural Fire Network, phone 03 544 2441 so please make sure you keep it legal and keep it safe ©

We can be fooled into thinking that if we've had a good downpour of rain, everything will become wet and won't burn but this really isn't the case especially with the wind that we get through Wakefield. The combination of wind, the sun's heat and the dry ground make perfect conditions for a vegetation fire which can be ignited by simple things like throwing a cigarette out of the car whilst your driving or leaving glass bottles behind after a picnic. The fire will start quickly and spread even faster. So please think smart and think about what you're doing. Remember that by the time someone spots the fire, calls it in and we get responded to the station, get our gear on and get out of the door there could be a time lapse of 5 to 8 minutes. Then we have to drive to and locate the source of the fire.....more time.....then we have to get the rural firefighters and the tankers out....more time....and while all this is happening the fire's growing and spreading!! You get the picture. We don't need to say anymore ~ please just take care.

Whilst we talk about fire safety, would a freight truck fit down your driveway? We often come across properties which are hard to access due to vegetation hanging over driveways and tracks. Our trucks need some space, so please next time you stroll to the mail box, have a look around and imagine that freight truck...... for those of you who live out in the wop-wops because obviously it takes longer for us to reach you in an emergency - so here are four main things that we would ask you to do:

- Keep the access way to your property clear for the fire crews to get the trucks through to you.
- 2. Cut back vegetation and trees close to the property as this will help create a fire-break.
- 3. Keep stacks of firewood away from your home.
- If you have a swimming pool or other water source close by that we can access, it would be really cool if you could have a sign showing where it is as this will save us heaps of time and we can start pumping water sooner.

There has been the odd comment about the amount of sirens through the village early in January - yes, we were rather busy.

The Way We Were

FELIX TANNER: Man of many parts – and Arks 1863-1919(?)

Every town has its share of freethinkers – some would call them eccentric individuals who live unconventional lives. They aren't afraid of new ideas or acting on them. Felix Tanner was one of these. He was not only ingenious but also supremely self-confident, skilful at self-promotion, public speaking and writing letters to the newspapers.

Felix got the idea for building barrel boats as future unsinkable lifeboats when the Tilikum visited New Plymouth in 1903. This was a modified cedar dugout canoe which was on a world tour. The "Ark" or barrel boat which he built in McPherson's yard in 1906 was the fourth in a series. Previous boats had come to unfortunate ends: wrecked on rocks or reefs during their maiden voyages.

This, the last of the line (shown in the accompanying photograph ready to have the bow and stern fitted), had a roomy cabin with four bunks. It was 14ft long, 9 ft 6ins in breadth and 6 ft deep. Made of white pine with hoops of galvanised steel, with an engine room and an oil engine, it was built in Wakefield, 18 miles from the port. Weighing two and a half tons, it was hauled to the sea by lorry and traction engine. This boat had a more successful life. It was sailed to Sumner and eventually reached Timaru where Felix later sold it to local fishermen.

Building boats was just one of Felix's many skills. He was influenced at an early age by seeing the great tightrope walker Charles Blondin in Australia. where he was born.

By 1875 he was a proficient tightrope artist himself and could jump from a balloon using a parachute. Stories of shipwrecked sailors on desert islands prompted him to turn fasting into a paying art form and experimenting with the theory that saltwater bathing could hydrate the body allowing unsalted water to keep a person alive by the process of osmosis. People would pay an entry fee to see a man fasting particularly for a time like 40 days which Felix accomplished more than once in the 1880's.

He worked as a diver for the New Plymouth Harbour Board and in 1910 made some serious money when he sold his rights to the "Wakefield Electric Propeller Governor" for \$50,000. In 1913 he invented a new type of davit in partnership with A.W. Robertson. On 2nd October 1915 the Colonist reported him as "the well known inventor" who had developed a shell specifically designed for destroying barbed wire entanglements in World War I.

While we can't claim Wakefield to be Felix Tanner's birthplace, we can all be touched by the life and achievements of this remarkable individual who once lived here.



Town and Country Talk

At this time of year, we often see outbreaks of parvovirus in dogs. Parvo is a nasty, debilitating and often fatal disease that is completely preventable. The virus is spread in dog faeces so wherever an affected dog has pooed, parvovirus will be present for several months even up to a year. Pups are most vulnerable and suffer more serious clinical disease but all ages of dogs are susceptible if not fully vaccinated.

Most dogs start vomiting, followed in a day or two by bloody diarrhea. Rapid deterioration and death occurs due to dehydration and bacterial infection. There is no specific treatment for parvo so treatment is aimed at rehydration using intravenous fluids, and antibiotics to control bacteria. We also use medications to stop vomiting, provide pain relief and electrolytes. Most pups will stay in an isolation area of the hospital for several days and require intensive nursing. Staff have to wear gowns and gloves and walk through a footbath to prevent spread of the virus. This is all very time-consuming and therefore costs a lot more than our routine patient care in hospital.

And aside from the individual patient, the next concern is other dogs at home which may or may not have been exposed to the virus. Visiting dogs can be affected and visiting people can spread the virus on their shoes. Kennels can be disinfected using virucidal cleaners but obviously the ground is harder to decontaminate!

VACCINATION is the easy way to avoid Parvovirus!!




Puppies require two or three doses, usually at 8 and 12 weeks old. Recent studies have shown not all pups have enough immunity after two doses so some have another one at 14-16 weeks of age. It is important to follow up with another booster one year later then a booster every 2-3 years is all that is necessary.

It is a lot cheaper to vaccinate than treat a dog with parvo.

On the subject of vaccinations, there are also two other vaccines available for dogs in our area: Leptoguard which protects against **Leptospirosis** - a disease caught from rats, and **Kennel Cough** vaccine which protects

against one of the causes of **Kennel Cough**. Both of these require two doses 3-4 weeks apart then annual boosters.

We always advise an annual health check even if vaccination is not required.



Affected sheep usually have drooping ears and swollen eyelids. They shake their heads and rub on fences resulting in sores and bleeding. These sores can become flystruck. Sheep are desperate to find shade and won't come out to eat or drink. They can die very quickly. Cows will have reddening and flaking skin on hairless and white skin areas. They are also desperate to find shade and are restless and itchy. Affected skin can be raw and painful.





Currently there is no cure for facial eczema so **prevention** is the best option.

Prevention is based on knowing when spores are multiplying – spore counts can be done on pasture samples or faecal samples. Don't wait to see clinical signs - by the time 5% of a flock shows clinical signs, up to 70% will have liver damage. And beware of relying on local rumours too!

The basis of all prevention is treatment with zinc salts and varies depending on the species, number of animals and type of farming. Talk to your vet to work out the best way to monitor and prevent facial eczema on your property.

Gourmet food on Whitby Road, for our feathered and four legged friends


One of our chooks died on Christmas Day. (I was so hot, I felt like keeling over too, didn't you?). So with poor Emily past help, I started to wonder if the remaining chooks diet could be improved. It seemed a trivial thing to contact the vet about, and I knew exactly who to ask anyway.

Debbie is the person you'll see most often at Wakefield Trading. So although she hasn't got as many years under her belt as owner Donald, she is the person to ask about speciality chook food. She mixes so many different feeds, I can't count them. But most of them are sat on the shelf waiting for you, just go in and tell her what you need or want, and she'll direct you to the right mix. Of course, Wakefield Trading sell literally sack loads of Weston's best selling stockfeed, because their price is right and that is what most people feed their hens. But it's nice to know the special recipes are there too, isn't it?

I used to think Wakefield Trading was all about chook supplies but horses, sheep, dogs, rabbits and guinea pigs are all well catered for. And since they opened their aviary last October, caged birds are particularly well served too. Not only do they have a wide selection of specialist seed feeds, they sell canaries (\$20 each) and bourkes (\$50 per pair). They will even loan you a cage to transport your new birds home.



Most of us will know that Wakefield Trading sell Phillips table potatoes as well as seed potatoes in winter. This summer they have also started stocking organic vegetable plants, and with three plants for \$9, it's not too late to grow your own this season. Of course, you can pick up all your potting mix, compost and fertilizers at the same time.





And when the weather does get colder, this winter they will be complementing their kindling sales with limited supplies of dry pine off cuts. At only \$45 per square metre, how much you buy is up to you. Their wood is locally sourced, as is the majority of their stock. Whether you're buying Wakefield Gotland wool to spin, tanned sheepskins, hay or wood shavings, Donald feels strongly about provenance

and stocks local products wherever possible. He believes local people should support local people and he personally rarely shops outside Wakefield. Imagine if we all tried to do that...
