Junior Rowing World Champs

My Name is Sean Ducray and recently I returned back from representing New Zealand at the Junior Rowing World Champs in Hamburg Germany.

In March I qualified to trial for the New Zealand Junior Rowing Team due to my results in the New Zealand National Champs. I then made the team after a week long trial at Lake Karapiro near Hamilton.

A few weeks later I arrived at Lake Karapiro and ready for the start of a three month training camp where I would live the life of a high performance athlete.

Every morning we started training at 6am and trained until 8am. Breakfast at 9. Then we would get on the school bus which would take us to St Peters School in Cambridge where we would study throughout the day until 2pm. The afternoon session then followed and we would head out to the water for around two hours or be in the gym lifting some tin.



Along the way we received nutritionist talks, High Performance Sport New Zealand lectures and also drug free sports talks as well as a full time physio sorting out our injuries. We would do this for five days a week and then train twice on Saturday morning, followed by rest on Sunday when we generally slept or explored the streets of Hamilton.

A few days before we left for Germany we received our gear and most importantly our row suits which we would wear when representing our country on race day in Hamburg. I remembered back to when I first started the sport and never imagined I would be where I am now. It showed me that if you really want something that bad, you will get it.

We then flew to Hamburg via Singapore and Frankfurt airport. In total we travelled for around 36 hours. It was great fun travelling on the plane as a team and everyone was more excited than tired when we arrived in Hamburg.

The International Racing was completely different to anything I have ever experienced. Everybody is so fast that you have to have a good race every race. There are no off strokes. Every stroke is as hard as you have ever pushed. All the crews are side by side from the start to the finish and only the crews that leave everything out there are successful. Also everybody else is much bigger than you. However that's probably where our training paid off and we were able to use our fitness against the stronger but less fit crews.

The final was one of the hardest races I have ever raced and I was proud of our effort as we couldn't have done anything more and the bronze medal was a great top off for an amazing trip.

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
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News from Wakefield School

Wisteria blooms, summer is here!



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


FLEAS!

Fleas are a subject that pet owners rarely want to think about. But unfortunately if you have pets, fleas are something that you can't ignore. All cats and dogs will get fleas from time to time - it's just a matter of whether we notice them!

The fleas that you may see on your pet are adult fleas and are only a small percentage of the total flea population. The rest of the flea population includes eggs, larvae and pupae which are well hidden throughout carpets, bedding and furniture and outside amongst vegetation.

So if you are seeing fleas on your pet, there is already a flea population in your house and/or garden. And once established it can take months to eradicate. The best way to protect your pet and your house from fleas is prevention. DON'T WAIT TO SEE FLEAS!

Fleas are often considered to be warm weather bugs but we have been seeing flea infestations all through winter. Therefore flea numbers are already high and will easily reach epidemic proportions by late summer/

NB The original flea collars, spot-on products and shampoos containing older drugs are not very safe and have been superseded by these newer products.

Thorough vacuuming of carpets, furniture and wooden floors will reduce flea numbers, as does frequent hot washing of pet bedding. But if you have an epidemic, an insecticidal bomb might be necessary!

SHEEP AND GOAT FOOT CARE

Footrot and associated conditions are common causes of lameness and can occur any time of year when regular rain and longer grass create a damp environment. Constantly wet feet have weakened skin and allow the entry of footrot bacteria. The

> result is weeping sores between the claws. This may spread into the hoof, creating abscesses and damaging the sole. Treatment involves cleaning the skin, trimming the hoof if necessary and applying ointment or spray. Running animals through foot baths may actually spread infection. Contact us for more advice if your stock are having footrot issues.

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PINK EYE

Pink eye is a warm weather disease that causes weepy, inflamed eyes. It is caused by specific bacteria that are easily transferred from animal to animal by flies or brushing up against common things like long grass. Pink eye can vary from mild irritation to painful eye ulceration and irreversible blindness which can develop as quickly as 2-3 days after the initial infection.

The minute you see any sign of eye irritation in your grazing animals, take a closer look, separate out these animals that have any problems and call the clinic. There are some effective medications for this condition that the clinic can provide to our regular clients.

POSTURE AND PREGNANCY

During pregnancy your body undergoes a range of changes and these changes make maintaining a good posture more of a challenge. Focussing on the following areas of your body will assist your posture and help reduce muscular pain associated with pregnancy.

Keep your chin level

Lift your chest up, keeping your shoulders back will also help this

Stretch your head upwards ie. stand tall

Keep your shoulders back, and your shoulder blades together and down

Tighten your abdominal muscles; think of sucking your belly button in

Tighten buttocks by squeezing them together

Prevent knees from locking straight; always have a slight bend in knees

Also remember to:

- Stand tall an upright posture encourages the body into a position where the spine follows its natural curve. This reduces the work required by the surrounding muscles and ligaments, minimising the likelihood of back pain.
- · Avoid standing for long periods
- Wear a good fitting and supportive bra

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The Way We Were

A Soldier's Story, From Wai-iti to Egypt - Part I October 1915 - March 1916

Prepared for the Waimea South Historical Society by Roger Batt

It was a little over a month after his 21st birthday that Rifleman Douglas William Batt of D Company, 2nd Battalion of the Trentham Regiment, No. 24/968 found himself on board Troopship No. 31 about to "cross the line" en-route to Egypt. It was 30th October, 1915.

With dark hair and brown eyes, standing 5 feet 5 inches tall and weighing 9 stone 7lbs, this third child from a family of six had voluntarily enlisted leaving his 59yr old father, two sisters and younger brothers to manage a small fruit farm at Wai-iti, two miles south of Wakefield. Valued for his work on the farm after leaving school at 14, he would later thank his father in a letter dated June 4th, 1917 for not "making a fuss about me coming away."

In this early letter, one of the 21 surviving and addressed like most of the others to his mother, Douglas William (or Uncle Dick as he was known to us) gives no hint of anxiety or even anticipation of the events which were to unfold for him. It is as if he is on a leisurely voyage to visit relatives overseas. He had no inkling of the horrors which as a field ambulance officer he was destined to face, but even when we know that he must have experienced scenes of indescribable carnage his letters home give no trace of that. There was, after all, little point in causing his mother and two sisters added anxiety which they could, unaided, easily conjure up. Reassurance as to his safety and well-being was what they needed.



Enjoying shipboard life with a "lively crowd of soldiers" and getting "as fat as a pig" he sent his best wishes to his younger 13 year old brother Carl who he suggested should "practice shooting with that gun of his for I think that he will be wanted before we have done."

By November 28th and after spending two days in Cairo he found himself in the desert quarding the railway, nine miles from Alexandria. He was "quite well and happy" but unimpressed by the squalor of the natives' lifestyle who lived and cooked in the streets. His time was spent in shooting swans or ducks and "wandering over the desert all day in chance of getting a shot at a nigger." His only real complaint seems to be the problem of getting tobacco. He wishes he could buy a better camera to take some good pictures but he is only drawing a shilling a day and "most of it goes on tobacco."

By December he is thinking of NZ. He asks for photos to remind him of home, is getting very fat with a double chin, is "as brown as copper" and is learning the natives language - but the flies are driving him mad. He hopes to be home by next Christmas and has proved himself a "dead shot" with a rifle. "I think that every shot I fire will account for a Bedouin or I will be very disappointed."

Mail deliveries are somewhat irregular. He gets 12 letters at once but only every three weeks. Sometimes, he says, one whole train is devoted to mail alone. January 1916 sees him in Alexandria. He has been in hospital for two weeks convalescing for an unspecified illness. When he is discharged he visits a fortune teller who tells him that he will be home for next Christmas. He is not going to get hurt but will cause great losses on the enemy. (One wonders how many times she told this story to those soldiers who wanted to believe it.)

In March he is asking again for photos of family to see if they have changed. He has enjoyed the sights of Cairo and Egypt - the pyramids and the old churches but he finds the heat a burden and misses the green fields of home. In a month, he says, he will be in France.

Nigel Patterson is our Deputy Chief Fire Officer and our Brigade Training Officer has a very big responsibility to ensure that we are all trained and up to date with the training schedule. Our training is very structured because the fire service has a computerised system that lets us know if we are overdue on training on the piece of equipment or knowledge basis theory before we become overdue. The training will ensure we have the knowledge and practical skills to operate the equipment effectively and safely. The system is like a warrant of fitness for your car, the computer reminds you before the warrant is due, not after it expires.

The other items that you can send off are knitted or crocheted clothing items, items for sewing, knitting and craft activities, bed linen, towels and personal hygiene items. All these items MUST be new. You can also put these into the boxes.







So instead they opted for a relatively small property that feels like it's out in the country!






