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



### FIREWORKS SEASON!!

With Guy Fawkes coming up in the next few weeks, it's a good time to remember how we can minimize stress in our anxious pets...

- · Make sure your pet is inside before it starts getting dark.
- Move your pet into a familiar room with the curtains drawn before the sun sets. This will prevent any flashes of light. Preferably stay in the room yourself to keep your pet company.
- Do not try to calm or fuss over them when they are agitated just be calm and relaxed yourself.
- Play some music, something with a regular beat, or turn on the TV.
   Again start this early before the firework noise starts.
- Sometimes engaging your pet in a game of some sort can take their mind off what is going on outside.
- Having another pet in the room that isn't fearful can help a scared pet relax
- Rescue Remedy and other homeopathic remedies may have a soothing effect on some pets. We stock a variety so pop in for more advice.
- DAP and Feliway are pheromones that come in a plug-in diffuser.
   Humans don't notice anything but the pheromones are like dog and cat 'feel-good factors' and can really help to relax pets. They need to be plugged in before the firework season for best effect.
- Thundershirts are a new approach to relieving anxiety in dogs. They
  apply gentle pressure over the torso which can have an amazing,
  calming effect. Pop into the clinic for more info.
- Conventional sedatives are not suitable for all pets and cannot be prescribed over the counter. A veterinary consultation is required.







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### DID YOU KNOW....

The NZ cattle tick doesn't just like cows! It is also happy to feed off your cat, dog, rabbit, sheep, deer, horses and even birds. It is the only species of tick in New Zealand that affects our domesticated animals and we have already been seeing them this season as the weather warms up.

Ticks appear from spring until autumn. Most of the life cycle is spent on pasture but there are four different life stages which feed on an animal host's blood for several days before developing to the next stage. A mature adult female can lay about 2000 eggs over a 2-3 week period. All stages can survive through winter


Large numbers of ticks can cause animals to become lethargic, dehydrated and off food due to anaemia. Hide damage occurs and young animals may die due to blood loss.

Until recently the NZ cattle tick was not known to carry any other diseases but it has been identified as a carrier of the blood-borne parasite theileria orientalis. This parasite causes anaemia in cattle. So far it is has only been identified in the upper North Island

Ticks survive best in rough pasture, especially areas of rushes. So tick populations can be influenced by keeping pasture short through good close grazing or topping. Pasture can also be sprayed with insecticide. Bayticol is a pour-on treatment for cattle and deer. It is best to develop a tick control programme to suit your farm system.

Ticks on cats and dogs are reasonably easy to control by using Frontline Plus. Broadline controls ticks on cats. And a new product called Nexgard is a monthly oral tablet that kills ticks on dogs.

Horses can be treated with Permoxin spray, mainly focusing on the legs, belly and face. Cattle pour-ons have been used but they are not designed for horses and can be irritant. Removing horses from affected pasture is another option.



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

# The Painful Shoulder - Part 2

Last month we looked at the anatomy of your shoulder joint and in particular the muscles that stabilise our shoulder - the rotator cuff and the scapula stabilisers. We also looked at how adopting a poor posture can influence these


muscles and can lead to shoulder pain. Following on from this here are a few exercises you can do to work on your posture and improve the strength of your scapula stabilisers.


### Scapula squeezes

Begin by bringing your shoulder blades together and slightly down. Hold this for 10 seconds and repeat 10 times.

### **Dart Exercise**

Lie on your stomach with your hands by your side. Squeeze your shoulder blades together and lift your hands and chest off the floor (palm upwards or downwards). Keep your neck relaxed and straight. Hold for 2-5 seconds repeat 10-12 times.





### Low rows with resistance band


Sit with the resistance band around your feet and your knees slightly bent. Slowly bend your arms until your elbows are bent to 90degrees. Continue to move your arms in the same direction and as you do this squeeze your shoulder blades together. Hold this for 2-5 seconds and slowly return to the start position. Do 2 sets of 10-12 repetitions.


### **Doorway stretch**

Stand in a doorway and rest your hands on either side of the door frame at shoulder height. Keep your hands in place and shuffle your feet forwards as you do this you will feel a stretch along the front of your chest. Hold this for 30 seconds and repeat

While I have given an example of the number of repetitions and sets you can do, please note that if you are experiencing pain then you need to stop immediately and seek the advice of your physiotherapist.

If you are suffering from shoulder pain then get it seen to. Shoulder injuries can take a while to recover from and the earlier you can

# World War One Remembered - While the Boys Were Away

Prepared for the Waimea South Historical Society by Roger Batt

### **Supporting the Troops From Home**

One day after the outbreak of war in August 1914, Annette, Lady Liverpool (the wife of NZ's Governor) made a plea to New Zealand's women: "At this moment of our Empire's needs I appeal to the women of New Zealand to assist me in trying to provide necessaries which may be required for ...the citizen army...My suggestion would be to start a fund in every centre under a small committee of ladies." She urged women to provide useful items for soldiers: shirts, underclothing, socks and darning kits (known as housewives and pronounced: hussifs).

Women across the country responded to her call enthusiastically. In Wellington the next day, a "little band" of women made 250 'hussifs', sewing into them "all sorts of hopes and fears", according to the Evening

In Nelson a fundraising event which involved both young and old alike was the selection of the Daffodil Above - Lady Liverpool (Auckland Queen. Different groups in the area selected their "Princesses" who became the focus of fundraising. The Libraries Sir George Grey Special Princess who raised the most money became "Queen". The first Daffodil Day was held in September Collections) 1915. Spring flowers were sold and displayed in competition, buttonholes were sold from door-to-door and Below - Wakefield's entry in the great following a procession up Trafalgar St of the Princesses with their followers, the Queen was crowned on the gala day held in Nelson on 2nd August Church Steps. The first Queen was Miss Rona Hamilton.

Sending parcels overseas became an important focus for the Lady Liverpool committees - especially at Christmas time. On 2nd August 1915 there was a monster fundraising Gala in Nelson to help raise money for the troops. Wakefield District's float was made to represent NZ's hospital ship The Maheno. It was built on the back of a Hodgson truck by Bill Newth and driven to Nelson to take part in the grand parade. Among those on board were Walter Douglas, Ralph Hodgson, Daisy Wratt and Cam Bird.

The event was a huge success with the takings exceeding four figures. Daffodil Day and the Lady Liverpool fundraising committees continued their valuable work throughout the course of the war.

A SPLENDID SUCCESS.

GROSS TAKINGS EXCEED £250


Once again the public have responded generously to the appeal for funds for our soldier boys." Daffodil Day on Saturday proved a great success and resulted in over £250 being raised for Christmas gifts for those who are fighting for us. The weather prospects were anything but promising at an early hour on Saturday morning, but fortunately the clouds cleared away and a typical spring day followed - in fact the conditions could not have been more perfect for an outdoor function. Flowers came to hand in abundance from town and country and many generous givers unselfishly stripped their gardens of their choicest and be flowers in order to assist the cause. Daffodils, naturally predominated, but there were basketloads of hyacinths, freesias, anemones and other beautiful spring blooms, besides arum lilies and other flowers. Never before has there been such a collection of flowers in Trafalgar street. Stalls were placed at intervals on the footpaths and business commenced at about 11 o'clock and continued steadily until between 5 and 6 o'clock, when the last of the blooms were cleared out

The features of the afternoon were the crowning of the Daffodil Queen, the procession of decorated bicycles, vehicles etc., and of children in floral costumes, and for the maypole dance. At a quarter to 3 the Daffodil Queen (Miss Rona Hamilton), who looked extremely handsome in an orange velvet robe, arrived at the foot of the Church Steps, with her retinue They made their progress in decorated motor cars, the Senior Cadets forming a guard of honour. Bishop Sadlier delivered a brief address appropriate to the occasion, and then called upon Miss Mona Baxter (Queen of the recent Carnival) to crown the Daffodil Queen. This ceremony having been gracefully performed, cheers were given for the newly-crowned Queen, for "Our boys at the front," and for "The King", after which the National Anthem

Headed by the 12th Regiment Band, a procession was formed of the Daffodil Queen and her retinue in motor cars, the competitors in the decorative competitions, Senior Cadets, the National Reserve Band, and the Motor Reserve, which proceeded to the Post Office and returned to the intersection of Trafalgar and Hardy streets, where the maypole dances were gone through by a number of little girls attired in costumes representing various flowers, under the able direction of Miss Anderson. The Bands then marched to the Empire Theatre, where the choice display of cut flowers, were auctioned by Mr. Alfred Gould... The weight the four sheep (for the weight-guessing competition) was 8541b. The nearest guess was that of Miss E. Hair who guessed 856lbs Other estimates ranged from 450lbs to 1301lbs.

# Wakefield Volunteer Fire Brigade

John Ross attended an officer's course held in Rotorua for three days this month which strengthens the brigades officers' ranks.

Twelve other volunteer fireman from around NZ also did the same course with John at Rotorua because of the world class training facility the NZ Fire Service has at their National Training Centre.

Over the last two months our call out rate has dropped which makes everyone in the brigade very happy, especially the early morning call outs. There is nothing worse than the 2:00 am PFA call out and it's a false alarm.

Private Fire Alarms (PFA) are a great fire safety tool but 95% of PFA call outs end up as false alarms or defective issues with the system but we must attend all PFA because it could fall into the 5% category. PFA systems are like your smoke detectors at home, you must check and service them regularly to get the best use from them.

I put this offer out last month to any local business in Wakefield who wanted extinguisher training but I did not get any takers so I will offer our free service again. The brigade wants to know if any of our local businesses in Wakefield would like to come to the station one evening and do some extinguisher training with their employees.

There will be about five minutes of theory to start with, making sure you have the right sort of extinguisher for your business and then do the practical training using the extinguisher in real situations. There will be no cost involved.

# **Wakefield School History - the 1950's**

# **Crying in the Cupboard**

Five year olds starting at Wakefield School nowadays are usually riding a tide of jubilation that comes from waving good bye to their preschool or kindy and celebrating their birthday with established friends. They have generally had a series of short visits to their reception homebase (classroom), and have got to know their new teacher and their new peers incrementally over the preceding weeks. There can sometimes be a few tears, and often new starters hold onto their mothers' legs at first. The teachers are used to it and the other kids accept it. No one minds and no one is reprimanded or ostracised because of a little emotion.

I imagine it was much like that for Xavier (9) and Ruby Gibbs (5) when they and their friends joined the school.

Sixty years ago, however, when their grandmother Caroline Gibbs started school, it was quite different. She recalls the horror of being put in a huge walk in cupboard if you cried, and having to stay there until you stopped, when Mrs Anicich would release you with a warning not to cry again.

It is pretty much the first thing Caroline mentions when she reminisces about her schooldays, and rightly so. Can you imagine how you would feel if your small child was treated that way today? I'd want to go and see their teacher.

Perhaps Caroline's parents felt the same, as a few years after she joined Wakefield School, both her parents became teachers there. Her father Don Hutcheson taught at the school until the mid-1960s and her mother Mary Hutcheson remained there until 1978.

Actually, Caroline's family has a long and broad history at Wakefield School. Her sisters Sylvia and Jo both attended, as did her husband Donald, his brother Colin and her father in law Phil.

Since Caroline and Donald remained in the village, both her sons Stuart and Bruce attended too. The Gibbs family were early settlers in Wakefield, so Xavier and Ruby are truly following in their families footsteps.

During Caroline's time at Wakefield School, weekly assemblies were held each Friday morning, as they are today. But every Monday morning pupils marched out to the flagpole to salute the flag, a practice no longer observed. Caroline says she hated school initially, and it is only when she recalls the 'Big Secret' from her school days that her face breaks in to a smile. Apparently "The big boys set fire to the summerhouses", which were built from punga and blazed hot and fast.

Another smile dawns on Caroline's face as she recalls the calf-club days of her childhood. They were a highlight of the academic calendar, when pupils brought their best calves to school to show them off and maybe win a prize. Her husband Donald certainly enjoyed the 1955 calf-club day, as depicted in Marion Stringer's book "150 Years of Wakefield Schooldays." Wakefield has grown and changed over the years, and if such an event was held now, possibly only a handful of pupils would have a calf to show.

A final memory of Caroline's causes me to pause. She tells me that during her time at Wakefield School, only boys were permitted to play down 'The Bank'. I wonder how current Wakefield schoolgirls would react if such chauvinistic principles were applied to them? Indeed, what would the boys say, for that matter?

When I share the anecdote with my six year old son he frowns and seems momentarily surprised that such rules existed, then sagely reminds me that when he started school, way back in 2013, the bank was sometimes out of bounds to everyone. "Things change all the time," he says, nonchalantly.

It seems Wakefield School has taught him an important life lesson already.

Tim Lloyd is a man with a reputation. Most people know him as a talented appliance repair man, who knows his way around washing machines, dryers, dishwashers, refrigerators, freezers, ovens, range hoods and waste disposals. His reputation for fixing appliances quickly and economically is well deserved, and his 20+ years experience make him the obvious choice when your appliance breaks down.

It is more than ten years since Tim and Amanda bought Antidote Appliance Repairs in Motueka. The couple had travelled extensively around NZ in 2001, and they initially settled in Auckland where Tim worked for Axial doing much the same job he'd done for Hoover in the UK. They remembered the Nelson Bays area fondly and didn't enjoy city living, so buying Antidote and moving to the Tasman area was the perfect solution to their dreams of a New Zealand lifestyle.

After settling in Wakefield and having their three daughters, Tim and Amanda became really connected to the community, and naturally Tim began to get more and more work around the village. His business was thriving in Motueka and growing in Wakefield, but logistically it was getting more and more difficult to service both areas. The nature of appliance repair means Tim's diary can change throughout the day, and trying to satisfy a woman with a wobbly washer in Wakefield followed by a man with a miserable machine in Motueka could be complicated.

"The problem," says Tim, "is that you never know for certain what the fault is until you get to the machine – so you can never tell exactly how long each job wil take. Until you get to the customer's house and examine the machine, you can only go off what they tell you over the phone. You could turn up to a job thinking it will only take ten minutes, and then find the fault is much bigger and more complicated than you first thought. As you can imagine, this makes it impossible to stick to times. I do my best to give customers a vague idea of when I can get there, say early morning, or late afternoon. Most people understand and are OK with that."

However, Tim didn't like to let anyone down, and the way Antidote Appliance Repairs had been growing over the past few years, it was sometimes hard to be in two places at the same time.

The obvious solution was to sell Antidote Appliance Repairs and say goodbye to the Motueka business, and focus on Wakefield. So that's what he did.

"We've had the business on the market for the past few years, "he says." I was already getting more and more work around the Wakefield area, so we decided to sell the Motueka business, and look towards just working around Wakefield. So while we were looking for a buyer for Antidote, I began to take on more and more work around Wakefield. It became too busy in the end, trying to service both areas."

And so, at the beginning of September, Tim and Amanda sold Antidote Appliance Repairs to an electrical firm in Motueka. Tim is no longer Mr Antidote - he is now Tim from Whiteware Solutions Ltd in Wakefield. Still living in Wakefield, as he has been for 11 years. But now his business will be focused around Wakefield too.

He has agreed to help the new owners of Antidote until Christmas, but he is still available to undertake Wakefield call outs for Whiteware Solutions during this period. You can also drop machines off at his house, 79 Treeton Place, meaning you don't have to wait around for him to turn up - and you can save yourself a callout charge too. (Just remember to call him first to let him know, and leave your name and phone number with the machine.) After Christmas, he will be entirely dedicated to Wakefield customers alone, and his logistical nightmare will be resolved.

# The Good News Comes to New Zealand by Rita Bell

About 30 Wakefield villagers gathered last week at St Johns Worship Centre to share one of those delish pot luck meals they seem to be good at putting together. Afterwards we watched the film Te Rongopai (The Good News) recounting the first 200 years of New Zealand's European settlement.

On Christmas Day of 1814 Samuel Marsden first preached the gospel on New Zealand soil with the protection and hospitality of his friend, Chief Ruatara. It was on his land at Oihi Bay that the historic service was held.

One of the interesting points the film made about early New Zealand, which is largely secular today, is the close involvement of the Anglican church, and to a lesser degree the Methodist and Catholic churches, in the spreading of Christianity, brokering peace between warring tribes and promoting literacy and farming methods among Maori, even to the drafting of the Treaty of Waitangi.


