## TDC Purchases Land for Wakefield Community

The Tasman District Council announced in December its purchase of a block of land for the future benefit of our community. The block, about 3ha, lies south of the village, bordered by the sports ground, State Highway 6, 88 Valley Stream and the Wai-iti River. It enfolds Baigent's Bush and connects already existing amenity and recreational spaces.

TDC Deputy Mayor, Tim King, confirmed the purchase to the Community Council and members of the Wakefield Landscape Group, formed in 2015 to support a project undertaken in the village by Victoria University landscape architecture students.

The opportunity to purchase the land came in 2016 when the Martin family put their farm along the Wai-iti River onto the market and offered this portion to the Council. After the Martins sold the farm negotiations continued with the new owners but were slowed by the need to resurvey boundaries.

With the purchase now confirmed Wakefield has gained a major asset for our entire community. Potential uses for the land include extending the sports grounds, camping, developing walkways to link with Faulkner Bush and Robson Reserve, development and protection of the existing Baigent's Bush Reserve, and a site for a future community centre.

## The Way We Were

#### ORIGINS OF WAIMEA SOUTH HISTORICAL SOCIETY INC

Prepared for the Waimea South Historical Society by Arnold Clar and Roger Batt

The society in which we live today often seems to place little value on the past - unlike our Maori brethren who always begin any public meeting with a recognition of "the people who have gone before." We ought to do the same. Knowing what hardships our pioneering forebears had to face and the fortitude necessary for them to forge a new society in a pristine wilderness far from their place of birth provides a touchstone by which to judge our present activities.

Wakefield in the District of Waimea South has a long history of events that have helped to mould the society we have today. Thirty-seven years ago a group of Wakefield locals felt the need to preserve photographs and information about their area before it was lost or forgotten. They formed an Incorporated Society and in the recent 175th birthday celebrations of Wakefield School the pictorial and written material they had gathered provided the necessary historical background to this event.

It was 7th May, 1981. A meeting was underway in the supper room of the Wakefield Public Hall of anyone interested in the formation of a Wakefield Historical Group. There were 21 people present and a further six apologies were received.

Mr Don Hutcheson took the chair and the meeting discussed the formation of an Incorporated Society and a proposed constitution. During the previous year a number of meetings had been held by those interested in researching and collating historical records of Wakefield — Spring Grove and the surrounding districts. This group was known as The Wakefield History Group. It was now felt the time had arrived to have wider powers and become an Incorporated Society.

After some discussion the name "Waimea South Historical Society Inc." was agreed upon. Again, after discussion, the subscription was to be set at no less than \$1.00. Other matters discussed were the size of the committee, the number of members needed to form a quorum and the number needed to change the rules.

Mrs E Bint was elected Chairperson after two other members nominated, declined. The Vice Chair was Mr M Earle. The Secretary was Mrs J McPherson, and the Treasurer, Mrs M Barton. A committee of three was elected – Mrs E Watson, Mrs N Courtney and Mrs M Stringer.

The subscription was finally set at \$5.00 and banking was to be with the Post Office Savings bank with a cheque account. Mr I McPherson was appointed auditor. Mrs Bint passed on the best wishes of the Nelson Historical Society who welcomed the new society and offered all assistance.

The society held its first Annual General Meeting on the 20th May, 1982. A review of the eight members' evenings and one committee meeting since May 1981 show a variety of valuable activities being discussed and progress reports given and further suggestions for research being made. By the July meeting the society had been accepted as an Incorporated Society.

Some of the main activities that took place during the first year were:



The main event however, during the first few months of the first year of the society, was the work being done to establish a museum at Painton House. M Earle was doing this and organising security, displays and insurance. The first photo display was held from 28th September to 4th October, 1981. This was regarded as a success but it was felt a more permanent sign was needed to advertise future displays. In April, 1982 M Earle reported that visitors from around the world were signing the Visitors Book.

To sum up the first year of the society, a quote from Betty Bint's first President's Report is significant.

"Among our members we have acquired a collection of historic photographs that would be the envy of any society of its kind. These of course have been made available by the people of Waimea South, and here lies our biggest and most valuable achievement - we have made the people of our area interested in history." The original photos were used extensively by Betty Bint in From River to Range published by the society in 1991 and later by Marion Stringer in her two books on local history: Just Another Row of Spuds (1999) and More Wakefield Spuds (2006). These three books have gathered together as much information as was available at the time and are the first references to go to if you are conducting research on pioneer families and local institutions in Waimea South. They are, even with their occasional errors in a pre-computer age, what academics call "definitive works."

There is a special reason why the photographs and other historical printed material is held in the Tasman Library's Research Room. On 23rd May, 1995, an agreement was drawn up between the Tasman District Council and the Waimea South Historical Society Inc. to ensure that this collection would be "kept together, maintained and protected in the future." Several key conditions to be observed were outlined: offering maximum free public access, encouraging historical and genealogical research, and encouraging the donation of further material.

Waimea South Historical meets once a month throughout the year except for January, June and December. Our financial membership is currently 28 - only seven more than attended that first meeting in 1981.

We would love that membership to grow because we live in a district rich in history: the oldest school and church in continuous use in New Zealand and prominent institutions which have become highly valued in their respective fields: the Cawthron Institute and the Nelson Centre of Musical Arts, to name just two.

What happened yesterday and before that is history. It may or may not affect us personally but, nevertheless, it has happened and once we begin delving into the past, like a can of worms once opened, we find ourselves surrounded by a host of wriggling questions which demand answers. That's why history can be endlessly fascinating. By knowing the past we can more fully understand the present and perhaps predict the future.

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## **A Matter of Accounts**

## The Here and Now - Breakeven

It can often be quite daunting initially to try and predict the financial future of your business. So, as a starting point, you should at least know what your breakeven point is.

In simple terms, breakeven is where total sales minus total costs equals zero. It is the point at which losses stop and the business starts to become financially viable and make profits.

You could use an online calculator to do this or set up a simple spreadsheet, or ask your Accountant to assist you with completing the analysis.

#### HOW TO CARRY OUT A BREAK-EVEN ANALYSIS

- 1. Separate your costs into the two types; fixed costs and variable costs.
- a. Fixed Costs or Overheads These are the costs which are payable even if your business doesn't sell anything eg rent, rates, advertising. These are generally the easiest numbers to find and are usually a total per year.
- b. Variable or Direct Costs these are the costs that only occur if a unit is made or a sale is made eg variable labour, raw materials or production costs. These are usually expressed as a variable cost per unit ie \$10 per unit.
- 2. Now work out what your gross margin per unit or contribution margin is. Gross margin per unit is the total selling price per unit minus the variable cost per unit.
- 3. Then, carry out the following calculation to find your break-even point Total Fixed Costs ÷ Contribution Margin = Sales Volume Required to Breakeven

#### **EXAMPLE:**

A window cleaner has fixed costs of \$15,000, and the business' variable costs average \$15 per job and the charge out rate is \$40 per job, so his contribution margin is \$25. To break even he needs to carry out:

\$15,000 ÷ \$25 (\$40 - \$15) = 600 jobs

For a more honest estimate of viability, the business owner should include their own salary into the fixed cost part of the equation.

To obtain a dollar break-even point, you can then multiply the number of units/jobs by your selling price per unit, and this will tell you what \$ sales you need to make for the year to breakeven ie  $\$40 \times 600$  units/jobs = \$24,000.

Finding the break-even point is one of the most useful processes an entrepreneur can undertake. It helps you answer questions such as:

- What volume of sales do I need to break even? This can then help you to set a sales benchmark.
- What profit can I expect from a particular volume of sales? This way you can estimate when the business will become profitable.
- What price should this product be sold at ie what impact does a small increase in selling price per unit have on the business?
- Should I undertake this advertising campaign? Once you know that you have "broken even" or covered your fixed costs, you can work out how many extra units you will need to sell/hours you will need to bill in order for the extra advertising to pay for itself ie in the example above, if the extra cost of advertising is \$1,000 and your contribution margin is \$25, you will need to sell an extra 40 units before you have covered the additional cost. If you think that is easily achievable, the advertising is probably worth doing.
- Should I consider expanding my business by putting on more staff or increasing production? As above with advertising, you need to work out how many extra units/hours you will sell to cover the extra costs to expand your business.


Once you know the breakeven point, you know what you need to sell in order to cover your costs so then you can measure your results against the breakeven point and also keep an eye on the overheads and make sure that they do not increase over time. If your overheads increase, your breakeven point will also be higher.

Obviously the aim isn't to break-even though, but to make a healthy profit. You can use the breakeven information to explore the effects of various changes to your business such as reducing fixed costs or

increasing the average sale price per unit sold. These factors along with sales volume combine to form some of the key drivers of business profitability.

## **Town and Country Talk**

As we enter the warmer summer months we also move into the high risk periods for several nasty diseases in our farm animals. Luckily many of these are preventable.

#### Facial Eczema

Facial eczema is caused by a fungal toxin in grass and results not only in skin disease but also liver damage and consequent ill-health/poor production. Animals can show no signs at the time of eating affected grass then die from liver failure several months later. There is no specific treatment for facial eczema so prevention options include drenching with zinc oxide, using zinc oxide boluses or adding zinc sulphate to the water supply. These should be started during February if not earlier. At the very least monitor spore counts from now until the end of May. Doing your own counts is easy, or you can have them done by us or the lab.

## **Internal Parasites - Drenching**

The pasture stages of worm lifecycles are driven by moisture and warmth and so worm control becomes particularly important over periods of warm, wet weather. Remember that "if you are growing grass then you are growing worms". How often you need to drench your stock depends on the product used, weather conditions, numbers of young versus adult animals and species of stock present on the property.



Barber's Pole Worm (Haemonchus contortus) usually appears from February onwards, especially after rain. Haemonchus is a blood sucker, so the symptoms are of blood loss rather than scouring as seen with other worms. Specific long acting drenches are best for coping with this as a lot of what appears to be resistance is actually reinfection. As pasture burdens can be high, reinfection can occur in a matter of days after using a short acting drench. If you wait to drench in response to an outbreak, you can still lose some lambs.

#### Clostridia

Clostridial diseases such as Tetanus, Pulpy Kidney and Blackleg result in sudden deaths often in young animals without any warning. Prevention by vaccination with '5 in 1' is simple and effective. The first vaccination should be given at lamb marking or weaning or at six weeks of age for calves. A second dose should be given four to six weeks later and a booster dose should be given annually.

#### **Flystrike**

Most flystrike problems are seen following warm and wet weather. Sheep are most commonly affected and are initially restless and itchy followed by wool discolouration and loss and even death in severe cases. Prevention is much better than cure and involves avoiding dags by tailing, crutching and good worm control, shearing prior to summer followed by treatment with protective sprays such as Cyrex every eight to ten weeks over summer.

#### Viral Pneumonia

This can occur at any time from now on. It is caused by a combination of pathogens and made worse by dusty conditions and close contact between lambs during yarding or when seeking shade under the same tree. You only have to look at the height from the ground of a lamb's mouth to realise how easily dust can be taken in to its lungs. Despite the name, Viral Pneumonia is rarely caused by a virus alone. Limiting yarding and avoiding dusty conditions will help. Dampening down of dusty yards will help considerably however this is not always practical.




