# TDC Purchases Land for Wakefield Community [reprinted article from January edition]

The Tasman District Council announced in December its purchase of a block of land for the future benefit of our community. The block, about 3ha, lies south of the village, bordered by the sports ground, State Highway 6, 88 Valley Stream and the Wai-iti River. It enfolds Baigent's Bush and connects already existing amenity and recreational spaces.

TDC Deputy Mayor, Tim King, confirmed the purchase to the Community Council and members of the Wakefield Landscape Group, formed in 2015 to support a project undertaken in the village by Victoria University landscape architecture students.

The opportunity to purchase the land came in 2016 when the Martin family put their farm along the Wai-iti River onto the market and offered this portion to the Council. After the Martins sold the farm negotiations continued with the new owners but were slowed by the need to resurvey boundaries.

With the purchase now confirmed Wakefield has gained a major asset for our entire community. Potential uses for the land include extending the sports grounds, camping, developing walkways to link with Faulkner Bush and Robson Reserve, development and protection of the existing Baigent's Bush Reserve, and a site for a future community centre.

Nelmac Mowing – The issue was raised of the poor mowing being done in Wakefield.


Christmas lights - Planning is underway to use solar lights in future.


Questions to Mayor and TDC CEO – From last meeting, we are still waiting for replies. This is a bit disappointing as we were told they would get back to us with answers shortly.

#### DO YOU HAVE A GROWTH MINDSET?


When I have a growth mindset, I know that my skills, knowledge and abilities can grow. So, if I am in situation where I am currently out of my depth - I know that if I put in time and effort (to find the knowledge or develop the skills or support I need), I will be able to handle the situation.

The opposite of a growth mindset is a fixed mindset – it says, "I can do what I can do, and can't do what I can't - and I can't change that." When I have a fixed mindset towards something, and I find myself out of my depth, I feel like I am drowning or stuck. This causes high levels of stress! That stress sticks around and it is only a matter of time before my body is not well.

A growth mindset helps us be flexible psychologically – which means we can adapt to challenges that we face in life – the twist and turns that inevitably come. We can reduce the stress they cause us. Growth mindset is one of the strongest protective factors against stress related illness.


People who have a fixed mindset often have an all or nothing approach to achievement - they might not be satisfied unless something is perfect, and they might not try something new unless they know they are able to do it. This approach robs us of the satisfaction of growing as we either feel bad for not attaining perfection or fail to try for fear of failing.

When we do fail, it can devastate us – "I'm so useless, I can't do it – and I'll never be able to". But a growth mindset turns it to can't yet... and that prompts us to learn from our mistakes and try again.



## Tips to help develop a growth mindset:

- Learn something new a new skill (it might be a sport, a hobby or how to relax!) or a new thinking pattern (such as deciding you will be kind to yourself over decisions you have made in the past you did the best with the resources you had at the time). I know someone who has determined to learn to ride a bike this year, she is 65! And another who has had a lifelong fear of water he is going to take swimming lessons how inspiring!!
- Make a new friend the difference between who you are today and who you will be in five years depends on the people you hang around with, and the books you read (or TED talks you watch). Make friends with someone with a growth mindset.
- Think of a challenge you are having at the moment in what way can you grow/change your mindset to adapt to this challenge rather than feel stuck with it.
- Make a goal of something you really want to do, that you can't now. Figure out the small steps needed to get there and take the first
  one.



# Wakefield Volunteer Fire Brigade

Good morning to you all, I hope you are all enjoying the hot summer we are having this year. These are the summers I used to know in the early 80's when I worked at Tapawera as a woodsman.

We had a very busy December for call outs especially in mid-December to the end of the year and the start of 2019 has been busy as well.

With the change over from the old NZ Fire Service to the new Fire & Emergency NZ a lot of emphasis is going into making communities more resilient. The old message that used to be sent out to the wider communities is that in a large event happening you need to be able to look after yourself and your family members for 2-3 days before help arrives.

The new message going out now is that you need to be able to look after you and your family, feed and water, for 10-14 days.

I was talking to a Kaikoura shop owner over the Christmas period and I asked him what were the first items people needed when the big quake happened and he replied; tinned food, water, bread and toilet paper were the items that sold out first. So please make sure you have enough of these items in your pantry, cupboards at home.

From all of us please be safe and take care of yourself and others.

# **Trapping Update - Wakefield Reserves**

After 20 months of keeping trap records I had been expecting some sort of pattern to emerge around the timing of peak predator population, distribution and density at local reserves. However I'm still waiting because results have been pretty much random with no particular month emerging as the best time to increase trapping effort.

With the recent acquisition of three DOC 200 traps (baited with eggs and/or meat based baits and best suited for catching stoats and weasels) I now have 22 traps spread between Faulkner Bush, Edward Baigent and Robsons Reserves, most being "Victor" tunnel type traps baited with peanut butter and monitored at least fortnightly.

Last spring catches dwindled to the extent that I wondered whether I was starting to win, however in December all locations produced larger numbers of rats than usual including Faulkner Bush where catches have consistently been lighter than at other locations.

Total predator numbers trapped to date are; Faulkner Bush 41, Robsons 105 and Edward Baigent 91.

January results are not included but, interestingly, rats are back at Edward Baigent Reserve despite the absence of freedom campers, and a line of traps at Faulkner Bush is currently dealing to a family of half-grown rats that look to have been in the process of establishing an unwelcome presence.

One of the new DOC 200 traps also dealt with the largest buck rat I've yet seen so hopefully he was the daddy rat and an emerging problem for resident birdlife has been nipped in the bud.

By way of an experiment I set two traps next to each other, one baited with peanut butter and the other with a meat based attractant.

The result was meat based = 2 rats, peanut butter = 0, an outcome which may be of interest to back yard trappers.

In light of the current dry weather and apparent upsurge in rat numbers at Edward Baigent Reserve, I'm about to try shifting traps closer to a water source at other locations to test whether this is a factor in their distribution.

Watch this space.

We love meeting new families, so come down and say hi, and see how awesome Playcentre is.



# **A Matter of Accounts**

# Looking Back - Reporting and Reviewing

At the least, most businesses will prepare financial reports [or have them prepared on their behalf] for their business annually in order to complete the income tax returns. This may consist of a number of reports such as:

## Profit & Loss Report [or Statement of Financial Performance]

This basically shows the income and expenses for the business for the period which may be annually, quarterly or monthly. If prepared for management purposes, it is often shown compared to budget and/or last year. If the report is prepared for tax purposes, it is generally just shown with comparative figures for last year. The purpose of this report is basically to show whether the business made a profit or loss for the period shown.

#### **Balance Sheet [or Statement of Financial Position]**

Unlike the Profit & Loss Report, the Balance Sheet is a summary of the financial balances at a set point in time ie the end of the year, quarter or month. It shows all assets of the business which forms one side of the equation. On the other side of the equation are the liabilities or monies owed to people and the equity, money that the owner has invested in the business. In simple terms, the assets must equal the total of the liabilities and equity.

#### **Fixed Asset Register**

Lists the assets of the business that are "not consumed" in the usual course of business and have a useful life of more than one year.

If you only look back at your results once a year, here are a few questions to ask yourself:

- How were your results against your target for this year?
- Are you happy with the results for this year?
- How accurate are the results for this year?
- · What can you learn from this year to improve next year's results?

As a minimum you should look at your results annually but it is definitely more valuable to review your progress on at least a quarterly basis. Twelve months can be a long time in business if there is something wrong and you wait that long to identify and fix it.

It can be difficult to find the time to consider these issues when you are busy running a business, but a small amount of time spent looking at this information now can pay big dividends to your results next year, but only if you analyse the information and use it to make your future decisions.

Here are a few 'key issues' you need to consider, and get control of:


Compare Results: Most businesses have lots of transactions happening and it can be difficult to keep track of it all. By having a budget ie something to compare actual results against, you have a regular procedure for checking income and costs are on track. You can see very quickly if margins are slipping, find out why and take corrective action.

You could also compare results against last year to identify trends or if you have the information available, benchmark against others in the industry or region.

Identify Over-spending: If you don't have something to compare against you may not find out until way after the financial year that you have over-spent on some items.

spending, sometimes thousands of dollars each month. Monitoring the differences between your actual figures and budgets/last year will help you to identify the cause of the variation so you can take corrective action before it becomes a major problem. It





# **Town and Country Talk**

## Tummy Upsets


It's an every day event in the vet clinic to see pets with vomiting and/or diarrhoea. Pets are just as vulnerable to tummy upsets as people are, in fact probably more vulnerable due to their often poor food choices! Often we don't know the cause but when the diet can include anything from pet food through to bones, plants, compost, dead animals and poo, it's not surprising the digestive system sometimes doesn't cope!

A couple of vomits is not a big deal but when it continues dehydration is the main concern.

If your pet is still bright and happy, try these steps first:

- Remove food for 6-8 hours and if vomiting ceases you can introduce small meals of chicken/fish and boiled rice for a few days or try a small amount of your pet's normal food.
- Offer frequent small amounts of water or electrolyte such as Vytrate, but withhold for a few hours if vomiting continues.

If vomiting/diarrhoea are frequent and/or persistent and/or your pet seems lethargic, call the clinic for a checkup.



There are many causes of vomiting and diarrhoea. Often our examination and the details you give us provide enough information to diagnose and treat your pet in one visit. Otherwise further tests such as blood samples, faecal samples, xray or ultrasound may be necessary.

#### Barber's Pole Worm (Haemonchus contortus)

Here's a bit more info on Barber's Pole which is common this time of year... Barber's Pole is a roundworm that sucks blood from the gut lining and causes blood loss, not scouring – what you will see is ill-thrift, lethargy and deaths.

It can seem to strike without warning, mostly in late summer and autumn, and usually after a spell of hot dry weather followed by some moisture. Sometimes a few heavy dews are enough to set off an 'outbreak' and irrigating paddocks will also have an effect.

Drenching is important but we don't want to use drenches unnecessarily - so what can you do?

- A faecal egg count (FEC) of lambs, even while still on their mum, can be a guide.
- If you are handling lambs, look for paleness of gums and eye membranes and/or 'bottle jaw'.
- If you do have lamb death/s, a post mortem is useful for identifying Barber's Pole worm in the gut.



- If you carried more lambs into winter than normal last season, contamination could be higher.
- Other things to consider include drenching history of hoggets and ewes over the last year, grazing history, feed levels and presence of wild goats.

For Barber's Pole we can use long-acting drenches throughout the summer and autumn to prevent reinfection. The best of these available contain Closantel eg Genesis Ultra. The downside of this is the long withholding period (56 days) which will interfere with sending lambs to the works.

Medium-acting drenches contain Moxidectin eg Exodus SE. These have a shorter withholding period (ten days) which gives more flexibility to send off lambs but more frequent drenching is required. Exodus 1% injection has a meat withholding period of 35 days.
