#### AF8 [Alpine Fault Magnitude 8]

We can't predict earthquakes, but we can prepare for them.

AF8 [Alpine Fault magnitude 8] is a programme of scientific modelling, response planning and community engagement designed to build our collective resilience to the next Alpine Fault earthquake.

It is a partnership of the six South Island Civil Defence Emergency Management (CDEM) Groups and leading Alpine Fault scientists, working together to better understand the impacts of a rupture for communities and infrastructure across the South Island, so we can all be better prepared for the next large Alpine Fault earthquake.

The Alpine Fault runs for over 800km up the spine of the South Island and is considered the region's largest natural hazard. However, without an Alpine Fault we wouldn't have a South Island or the beautiful landscape we are lucky enough to call home. The fault is part of the active boundary between the Pacific and Australian tectonic plates where they intersect on land.

The Southern Alps have been formed over millennia by upthrust from successive earthquakes on the Alpine Fault. It is estimated to move horizontally up to 10m at a time during an earthquake and GNS scientists calculate that the Southern Alps have been raised by 20km over the last 12 million years, it's only the effect of constant erosion that has kept the tallest peaks in the Alps from being over 4,000 metres high.

Scientific research from the southern end of the Alpine Fault has shown that it has an unusually regular history of producing large earthquakes. Over the last 8000 years, the Alpine Fault has ruptured 27 times, on average that's every 300 years.

The last significant quake on the Alpine Fault was in 1717. The next Alpine Fault earthquake is not a case of 'if' but 'when', and it is likely to occur within the lifetime of most of us, or our children and young people, for whom this is likely to have major short and long-term impacts.

On Wednesday 28th August from 7pm the Wakefield Volunteer Fire Brigade is hosting a community talk at the Wakefield Fire Station.














### Wakefield Community Council AGM

Chairmans Report for 2019 AGM by Stuart Watts, Chairman 2018-2019

I took over in November as Chairman on the retirement of Allan Wasley and thank him for the work he did. I would like to thank the members who supported me over the last seven months. I knew this position was going to put me out of my comfort zone, but I hope I did all the requirements of Chairman. I thank the Councillors of our riding for their attendance and their input, support and guidance during our discussions. In October we had a question and answer meeting with the Mayor and CEO. This was helpful but I would like them to have a bit more input into our affairs.

Some of the notable things that have happened over the time are:-

- 1. Land Purchase by the TDC next to the Baigents Reserve was finally completed. It was decided to have a community BBQ and walk around of the land in September.
- 2. Pigeon Valley Fire This was the biggest event to happen in Wakefield for a number of years, probably since the Pigeon Valley Bridge got washed away, with the whole village evacuated for a period of four to five days and Pigeon Valley for longer. It must be said that the authorities did a terrific job, especially the Fire Brigades from here and afar, the Police, Red Cross, Armed Forces, the helicopter pilots and all others involved in bringing everything under control. Also the Lion Clubs Zone 2 for putting on a free fun day for the families who were evacuated. A huge thank you to each and every one of you. Because of the fire the February edition of Window on Wakefield was late, so the Wakefield Community Council committee decided not to charge the advertisers in this edition.
- 3. In March the TDC produced a Footpath Priority List. After a full discussion it was decided that the footpath on Eighty Eight Valley Road, from just passed Genia Drive to Totara View Road was the highest priority for Wakefield. However, we felt that the first 100m of this was the most important and Pigeon Valley would be our second priority.

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- 4. ANZAC Day a very successful service with the army in attendance and fly over by an Air Force Orion. I thank the TDC for their cleaning and redoing the letters on the cenotaph also the painting of the bollards and chain replacement.
- 5. Information Booth had another panel finished.
- 6. Hall Maintenance Some chairs have been donated, the foyer carpet purchased and fitted, walls and ceiling painted. Main hall: new lights fitted, windows cleaned on the inside and air conditioning checked. Supper room and kitchen have new heaters. We thank Rose and Richard Shepard for their work as booking and maintenance officers.
- 7. Security cameras for the business area progressing slowly.

As this is my first and last part annual report I would thank the Secretary, and my committee for their understanding and all the other residents who came to our meetings and had input. I wish the incoming committee all the best and hope they can get more members, or I'm afraid for the village of Wakefield.

It has been another busy month at Playcentre and we have had a new family join us, so we would like to welcome Harry and his whanau to Wakefield Playcentre.





### Freedom Camping

## CONSENTED FACILITIES ARE THE ONLY LONG-TERM FREEDOM CAMPING SOLUTION

We may be entering the traditional low 'winter' tourist season, but freedom campers are still causing problems for the South Island's Tasman region.

West Coast-Tasman National List MP Maureen Pugh says simply providing more free-of-charge facilities is not the long-term answer as it is disadvantaging legitimate businesses who pay rates and taxes, employ local people, and who have to bear the compliance costs.

"Realistically, any camping facilities need regular servicing and maintenance" she contends.

"There are good reasons for rules like minimum distances between camp sites with fuel and gas involved, but we have huge numbers of campers moving around the region in unserviced vehicles, and I am sure I don't need to give details, but allowing them to simply 'park up' on roadsides is having quite obvious disastrous effects to health, safety and environment" Mrs Pugh says.

Maureen Pugh is also suspicious of some campers' vehicles

which bear the 'self-contained' sticker, after hearing reports of such labels being sold at a market for as little as ten cents each.


### **Wakefield School**

### 175 Years of German Settlement

#### Paul Bensemann Speaks on "The Filthy Hun" or 175 years of German Settlement

We had the good fortune this week to hear Paul Bensemann speak about Nelson's German settlers who first arrived in 1843 on the St Pauli. He illustrated his talk with historical and contemporary photographs of his family on a trip back to their roots in Hamburg.

Why did they emigrate? Paul believes that although there was a shortage of paid employment in the 1830's the main reason was the tension between the German states at this time. Unification under one political system did not come about until late January 1871 when Prussia under Bismarck defeated France after persuading all the German states to fight together against a common enemy. The Germans were also attracted by the stability of the British Empire at that time.

When the first emigrant ship the St Pauli arrived, however, they discovered to their dismay few signs of European settlement. Contrary to the expectations of some, there was no town or any kind of settlement. The land which they had purchased (obviously sight unseen) was either swampy or bush covered and so their first task was to clear it and drain the land before any cultivation could be achieved. Their diet at first was mainly native birds and eels – of which there were many. Mice and rats were also abundant and with a reliance on rice it was difficult to avoid contamination of this vital food source. For some time they lived on a diet of eels and native birds. Many were so disillusioned that over 50% of the first settlers left New Zealand for South Australia.

Cordt Bensemann who arrived with his family on the Skiold in September 1844 eventually built a house at Upper Moutere Village in 1850 and in 1857 after adding a two-storey wing it became a popular inn. It is now the oldest pub in New Zealand to be operating in its original building.

The strength and stamina of some of these German settlers became legendary. Paul recounted a pub fight in which it took several broken chairs and tables to subdue one of the brawlers

The role of women for the period was clear and conventional: to be child bearers and child minders, to organise the household and provide food for the men and to attend church regularly. Being a skilful seamstress was also an obvious attribute.

The First World War produced some unwarranted prejudice against German settlers. Julius B Lemmer, Principal of the Nelson School of Music, suffered from a campaign waged against him by the "NZ Truth" newspaper even though his son died fighting for the Allies in Gallipoli. An indication of the tone that paper adopted in discussing this issue can be seen in the extract below.







#### Nelson's German Musician - IS HIS LQYALTY UNDOUBTED?

#### The Minister of Education Asked to Act.

Lemmer is the principal of the Nelson School of Music, a purely British, or New Zealand affair, and in view of the prevailing and natural feeling the trustees of this institution are practically defying public opinion in keeping the individual in his present invidious position (and) are acting, not only unfairly to Herr Lemmer, but are outraging public sentiment. At all times, even in the teeth of a great temptation to court certain popularity, "Truth" has declined to become a party to hysterical outbursts against Germans residing in this country who are conforming to our laws, and comporting themselves as good citizens, but in the case of this man Lemmer, we are afraid that we must call on the Government to intervene and if the trustees of the Nelson School of Music will not dispense with its German principal, then the Government must force their hands. It is a very important matter for parents to reflect upon the fact that their children are being taught music by a German, who, even if naturalised, showed in 1914 that he had not forgotten the land of his birth. We refer, of course, to the fact that Lemmer left New Zealand in 1914, before the outbreak of war, and according to one version, intended going to London. However, he was in Germany practically the night war was declared by Great Britain against Lemmer's country and Lemmer's story is that he escaped from the land of his birth because of "HIS COCKNEY ACCENT."...

As a matter of fact we know that a very strong protest has been made against **Lemmer** by a Nelson resident, and in view of the charges, which if substantiated, would remove any doubt concerning Lemmer's loyalty, "Truth" suggests that the Minister should lose no time in calling for a substantiation of the charges, -which, if forthcoming, should land Herr Lemmer on Soames' Island. Furthermore, assertions have been made to "Truth" concerning Herr **Lemmer** which, if in any way true, proves that **Lemmer** is a dangerous individual. Germans everywhere are not being trusted, their word of honour is not accepted, and, generally, they are regarded AS HUMAN PARIAHS. (Abridged)

As the war progressed so did the anti-German sentiment but the board of the NSM remained loyal to their Principal. A vote for establishing a new board was resoundingly defeated. Lemmer worked for 45 years in Nelson, finally retiring in 1944.

There were a surprising number of those present who had family links to these first settlers from Germany, only distinguishable now by their surnames.

### **Town and Country Talk**

#### Arthritis – the number one cause of chronic pain in pets

Is your dog showing any of these symptoms?

- · Still keen to go for a run but really slow to get out of bed after
- · Hesitates to jump in or out of the car
- Slower going up or down stairs
- · Limping or stiffness, especially after resting
- Grumpy or tense when touched
- · Unexpected trembling/shivering
- · More restless at night, maybe even toileting inside

Is your cat showing any of these symptoms?

- Doing less, sleeping more (sometimes hard to tell with a cat!!)
- · Not getting up high e.g. on the bed or windowsill any more
- · Not grooming as much as they used to
- Grumpier than usual
- · Doesn't like being picked up
- · Toileting inside





This cold time of year is when stiff old joints can become painful. Often the symptoms above are mistaken for getting old and slowing down but many older pets are likely to be suffering from undiagnosed arthritis. Pets rarely whimper, whine or complain about arthritic pain – they often just do less - dogs will watch you go to the washing line rather than go with you and cats will stop jumping up to the windowsill or other favourite high spots.

What can I do to help? There is no cure but arthritic pain and inflammation can be minimised by managing your pet's weight, exercise and treatment including physiotherapy.

**Weight control** – one of the most important things you can do for an arthritic animal is maintain their optimum weight. Extra kilograms are just more load on struggling joints.

**Exercise management** – Short, frequent walks on flat, soft ground will help maintain muscle mass and strength without high impact on joints. Swimming is great if it's not too cold!

**Treatment options** – there are many! A warm, comfy, well-padded bed away from draughts can make a huge difference. Massage, gentle flexion/extension of arthritic joints, acupuncture, good nutrition such as Hills j/d, nutraceuticals such as 4cyte and Grand Flex are all helpful. And of course, we can give anti-inflammatory medication and pain relief – these can transform an old pet's life.
