Solar Heating Project Nears Its Target

Swimmers at the Wakefield School and Community Swimming Pool are already enjoying the benefits of our fundraising project to convert the pool heating from diesel to solar energy. Stage one has been completed, with three new heat pumps now warming the pool water, using power from the grid.



Stage two, the installation of solar panels generating electricity to drive the heat pumps, will happen in early December, this stage being brought forward because of the success of our fundraising.

Eight months ago we set out to raise \$120,000 for this project. We are within sight of our target, thanks to generous support from grants and donations from funding agencies, businesses and our community. Our latest success was the Wakefield School gala and the Pool Committee congratulates and thanks the Wakefield School PTA for their hard work in putting on a brilliant event, and to all the businesses and individuals who donated to the gala silent auction.

If you have donated to the solar energy project we appreciate your support and are grateful for it, with a special mention to our major supporters:



BIRDS IN OUR BUSH - The Grey Warbler (Geryone igata - Common Maori Name "Riroriro")

In Maori lore when a Warbler started singing in the spring it was time to plant the gardens. It also foretells rain and slightly changes its note and whistles more shrilly before rain. The Warbler is found within the bush and home gardens and is the second smallest bird in New Zealand – being of only 11cm (the smallest being the Rifleman). It is also only one of two birds in New Zealand that build enclosed nests; the other being the Chatham Island Warbler. Both sexes have brownish – grey upper parts tinged olive and whitish – grey under parts, set off with a tinge of yellow. You are more likely to hear their whistling than to see them. However if you look carefully you will see it flashing from one place to another after insects. It is the "best" friend of the Shining Cuckoo who lays their eggs in their nests as I described in my last month's article.



WAKEFIELD RECREATION PARK

The TDC have just started the first round of consultation on the Moutere-Waimea Ward Reserves plan. One example of a specific topic that they would like our input on is the use of space in the Wakefield Recreation Reserve. This reserve has recently increased in size, with Council's purchase of land between the existing sportsfields and Baigent Memorial Scenic Reserve. Staff have prepared an indicative concept plan showing a possible layout of the facilities and uses of this reserve (see map below). They are seeking feedback on both the proposed uses and layout for this area.

Please be safe over the Christmas period, drive carefully, think smart over the fire season and enjoy the break from work.

Christmas Trees

- Make sure your tree has lots of water treat your Christmas tree like your favourite pot plant. You should fill the water container every day. This will prevent the tree from drying out and make a healthier looking tree.
- Select a place in your house that is cool and away from busy areas, stairs and doors – especially doors leading outside.
- Secure the tree so it cannot be knocked over by children or pets.



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Christmas Tree Lights

- Remember your lights have been stored away in their box since last Christmas. Check the lights carefully before placing them on the tree. If any of the wires are frayed or broken, throw them out and buy a new set of lights.
- Make sure all the connections are tight and that the bulbs/cords are in good condition. Loose connections and frayed cords can cause a short circuit
- Test the lights before you place on the tree. Once installed, you should be able to turn the lights on and off without having to crawl under the tree.
- · Never leave the tree lights on overnight or when leaving the house.
- Never use candles near the Christmas tree or as tree decorations.
- If your tree becomes dry and starts shedding needles you should remove it from the house. Don't take the risk!
- Check that your artificial tree is made from flame resistant materials.
- Lights should never be used on artificial trees with metal frames.
- All tree ornaments should be flame resistant.

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Town and Country Talk

Getting Prepared for Summer!

As we all prepare for summertime holidays, barbecues and Christmas, remember to make arrangements for your pet/s if you are going away and watch out for our common summertime pet hazards:

- Are your pets' vaccinations up to date? Vaccinations for respiratory viruses in cats, and Parvovirus plus Canine Cough in dogs must be up to date in order to stay in boarding facilities. Call us for advice if you're not sure and don't leave it until the last minute!
- If you are going away leave contact numbers for your vet as well as your mobile phone number with your pet carer. Have a chat so it's clear what your expectations are for your pet if something goes wrong, especially if you are not able to be contacted.
- Beware of novel objects which could be swallowed by your pets such as Christmas tinsel, strings from the roast, kebab sticks from the barbecue, fish hooks and potentially obstructive food such as chop bones, corn cobs and peach stones.



- Most of us know that chocolate is poisonous for dogs. There is definitely more chocolate around at Christmas so remember to keep it out of reach of your dog. Remember dogs are very good at finding the wrapped chocolate under the tree!
- Take care giving your dog leftovers from the BBQ or roast bones, large amounts of fat and onions can all cause serious internal problems for dogs.
- Another food-related hazard is old food that your pet might find in compost heaps, rubbish bins and out on walks. There are millions
 of weird microbes growing in these places that if eaten by your pet (especially dogs) can cause all sorts of symptoms from tummy upsets
 through to poisoning and seizures.
- · Toxic algae are a warm weather hazard in our rivers. It's safest to avoid the rivers in summer and head to the beach instead.
- Heatstroke is common over summer particularly in larger dogs. NEVER leave dogs in the car on a hot day, even in the shade with windows down. Offer frequent drinks/stops on journeys. Restrict exercise to cooler parts of the day. Limit the length of walks especially for young energetic dogs, old dogs and dogs with medical problems. Provide shade for dog kennels and rabbit/guinea pig cages.

- Clipping long haired pets can prevent problems such as overheating, soiling, skin infections and grass seed problems. We often clip the underside/belly of long haired cats, and advise clipping under ears and around the feet of long haired dogs. Some long haired dogs which aren't traditionally clipped (eg Border Collies) are much more comfortable and active, even if they do look a bit odd!
- Check your dog's paws, ears, 'armpits' and groin daily for grass seeds. This is particularly important for fluffy dogs especially spaniels, poodles and all their crosses. It may seem a hassle to do this but it can be an expensive, time-consuming and painful process to find grass seeds once they are inside your dog!
- Warm weather accelerates development of flea eggs and larvae so flea prevention is important. We have many products available to suit your pets and their lifestyle including oral tablets, topical treatments and long-lasting collars. Some products now last six months or more so it's easy to keep your pet and house flea-free.



After careful consideration, the Wakefield School and Community Pool committee has decided that the pool will no longer be available for hire for private parties.


This will take effect immediately. It will still be available for hire to recognised community groups.





South Pacific Benchrest Rimfire Championship

This last weekend, November 8-10, four local shooters, Tony, Bev, Ian and Michael took part in the championship with competitors from Australia, Christchurch, Auckland, Nelson and a large contingent from New Caledonia. This was their second visit so much was expected of them. They did not disappoint.

The competition covered three disciplines. The first, on Friday involved precision shooting at 25 yards in the TSN Saxton Field indoor range. Several of our local Benchrest Club joined in for that competition and it was won by a local woman, with a visitor second. It was a good display of accuracy, although no-one achieved the possible on the second target.

The rest of the competition was held at the Packers Creek range with Ian and Michael taking part. Unfortunately the weather did not co-operate and the anticipated test of skill turned into one of second-guessing the speed and direction of a constantly changing wind. The rain did not help either. The three 25 shot targets did produce some fine results with the winner dropping only six points out of 750. Ian was in 13th place with Michael in 19th.

The competition on Sunday involved shooting five groups of five shots, firstly at 50m and then at 100m. The morning was fairly calm. Johnny was born in Dunedin in 1921. After he became proficient in telegraphy Johnny was enlisted in the Airforce as a trainee Wireless Operator. He was posted to the United Kingdom during the second World War. Later he was posted to the airforce radio station in Ghana, West Africa and then on to Maiduguri, Northern Nigeria. He was joined by his wife and two children during a two year overseas posting to Fiji in the Airforce.

After 30 years of service in the Airforce as a Squadron Leader and as Deputy Director of Signals, Johnny took on a career with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade for the next eight years. He was stationed in USA, San Francisco for 2 1/2 years as well as in Moscow, Russia. Moscow left a lasting impression during the Cold War days, so say no

more.... Johnny learned to speak, read and write Russian and keeps up his practice by reading Russian frequently. Johnny also loved being in San Francisco, where he was Vice-Consul in the NZ Consulate. He called San Francisco a place full of life where he met so many interesting people.

uture is Looking Bright for Young Golfers



Dear Neighbour, we invite you to join the Star Party and BBQ on December the 6th to celebrate with us at Wai-iti Recreation Reserve. (details below) This is a free event, no entry fee.

The Top of the South Dark Sky Committee (The Committee) formed in 2015 with the idea of creating if possible an official internationally recognised Dark Sky Park at Wai-iti Recreation Reserve and Tunnicliff Forest behind it. After four years of negotions with TDC a document has been signed in June this year (2019). It is called a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the TDC and the Committee. This makes it possible for the committee to apply to the International Dark Sky Association (IDA) for a Dark Sky Park to be established there.

We have made contact with most immediate land owners, and they have been invited to join the park area if and when it is established. If they join you may be able to join as well. Before this comes to more public attention we wanted to let you know what has been done and what is planned next, and how it may affect you. The Committee has two years to make application to IDA for the designation over the Council land. The process of application has started. A Matter of Accounts

Tax on Christmas Presents and Parties

[I have run this article before but this time of year it is a handy reminder].

If you're holding a Christmas function or giving work gifts, you may be able to claim tax back. If you don't hold a function but give your employees some sort of entertainment like a voucher that they can use at any time - you may need to pay FBT (fringe benefit tax). You can generally claim 50% of your party expenses in your GST and income tax returns. Party expenses can include things like venue hire, food, drink and entertainment. You can generally claim 100% of the cost of gifts, such as food, wine or event tickets.

Tax deductions on gifts for employees

If you give your employees a gift you can claim the full cost as an expense, as long as it doesn't fall within the business entertainment rules, but you may have to pay FBT. You won't have to pay FBT on the gift if it's less than the general employee exemption and maximum employer exemption.

If you file your FBT returns quarterly there's a \$300 exemption per employee per quarter if you provide free goods, or subsidised or discounted goods and services. If the value of the benefit for an employee goes over \$300 for a quarter, you must pay FBT on the full value of the benefit.

For example, Charlie and Sam are given gifts of mystery weekends. One is valued at \$250 and the other \$350. The \$250 gift is not subject to FBT but the \$350 gift is.

The maximum employer exemption you can claim is \$22,500 per annum. If the total value of benefits for all employees goes over \$22,500 for the current quarter and the three previous quarters, you must pay FBT on the total value of the benefits in the cur-

If you file annual or income year returns there's a yearly exemption of \$1,200 for each employee, with the maximum employer exemption for all employees of \$22,500 per year. If the period covered by the return is less or more than a normal income year, an adjustment per employee is needed as: (Days covered by return ÷ 365) × \$1,200.

Tax deductible party and entertainment expenses

If you provide your employees, clients and suppliers, or prospective clients and suppliers, with any of the following items you can only deduct 50% of the cost because they're counted as 'entertainment expenditure'.

Entertainment expenses that are 50% deductible include:

- corporate boxes, corporate marquees or tents, and similar exclusive areas (whether permanent or temporary) at sporting, cultural or other recreational activities that take place away from your business premises, this includes tickets or other rights of entry
- accommodation in a holiday home, time-share apartment or similar, but not accommodation incidental to business activities or employment duties
- pleasure-crafts, such as a corporate yacht
- food and drink provided or consumed
- at any of the three types of entertainment above, such as alcohol and food provided in a corporate box
- away from the taxpayer's place of business like a business lunch at a restaurant
- on the taxpayer's business premises at a party, reception, celebration meal, or other similar social function like a Christmas party for all staff, held on the business premises
- at any event or function, on or away from your business premises to build staff morale or goodwill, such as Friday drinks at the pub
- in an area of the business premises reserved for use by senior staff, such as executive dining room for entertaining clients.

GST adjustments

If you claim a 50% deduction for a business entertainment expense you'll have to make a GST adjustment so you're only claiming 50% of the GST, if you previously claimed 100%.

What to consider when looking for the lifestyle dream.

- If you do have deliveries made to your home, make sure you're going to be home to sign for them, or have a secure location where they can be left.
- Make sure your delivery instructions are clear, and ask for packages not to be placed at your front door.
- * If you're not going to be home when the parcel is delivered, arrange to collect your parcel from the depot, or have the parcel redirected to the address of someone you trust.
- Be smart when disposing of packaging, so passers-by can't see what you've been buying.
- Report any suspicious behaviour to Police eg if you see a car following a courier van, or an unexpected visitor knocks onyour door asking for someone you don't know.

Make sure your gifts get given to your loved ones this Christmas and not thieves.

As we head in to the holiday season we would like to remind you to be careful and responsible on our roads. The extra traffic and foreign drivers can cause drivers to become frustrated but it is far better to take five minutes longer to get to your destination than not at all. In order to keep you safe on our roads our focus this summer is on the four types of behaviour that contribute most to road trauma:

- Going too fast for the conditions
- Unrestrained vehicle occupants
- Impairment from alcohol, drugs, and fatigue
- Distracted drivers especially mobile phones

If you are traveling with somebody who is doing one of the above things call them out on it – it could save both your lives. We want to see you all get to your destinations safely and you can expect to see us out and about on the roads this summer ensuring that our roads are safe. Remember, if you witness something on the roads you think Police should be aware of please call *555.

Christmas means different things for different people but most of us get the opportunity to have a holiday at some point. Don't forget to take the time to enjoy a break from "normal life," spend time with friends and family and focus on what is important in life. I encourage you to look out for those around you, who may not have family or friends, and invite them to spend Christmas with you. I also encourage you to have a technology holiday at some point too and get out and enjoy the fantastic things the Tasman District has to offer - we truly do live in paradise.

NEW FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR CONTRACEPTION/MIRENA

Recently the government has agreed to fund the Mirena, an intrauterine device used for heavy or painful periods and for contraception. This previously cost \$350 for the device, so many of you might have wanted one but not had it due to cost. Now the device is funded, there is just the insertion charge to pay (around \$150, which is a bargain for five years contraception and better periods).

Some women will also qualify for this to be funded (women with community services card who normally live in Nelson/Tasman area, some other women are also eligible). For these women the whole procedure would be free. And if the Mirena is not for you? Women with a community services card are also able to have a free doctor's consultation about contraception. Feel free to make an appointment to discuss your options.


