


















Wakefield Recreation Reserve

The TDC have just started the first round of consultation on the Moutere-Waimea Ward Reserves plan. One example of a specific topic that they would like our input on is the use of space in the Wakefield Recreation Reserve. This reserve has recently increased in size, with Council's purchase of land between the existing sportsfields and Baigent Memorial Scenic Reserve. Staff have prepared an indicative concept plan showing a possible layout of the facilities and uses of this reserve (see map below). They are seeking feedback on both the proposed uses and layout for this area.

Please see below the indicative concept plan that has been created for the Wakefield Recreation Reserve, showing the location of the proposed McGazzaland pump track and other new facilities.



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

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Helping grow the country

Town and Country Talk

Kittens

Yes it's kitten season again! And here's a wee reminder to think hard about whether to get one for your family or not!

In the last few years, cats have been in the news for the wrong reasons mainly because of uncontrolled breeding. Cats are just being cats - it's up to us humans to look after our cats for their lifetime including getting them desexed to avoid unplanned litters. Rescue centres are usually inundated with homeless kittens and sadly many cats and kittens are dumped in rural areas to fend for themselves. This is bad for the cats, our NZ wildlife and for farmers, landowners and businesses where cat populations take over.

Also beware of getting a kitten "free to a good home". Yes it might be free but the ongoing care is not. If you actually do want to give a kitten a home this season, here are some things to remember to keep your new pet

- healthy and safe:

 1. Nutrition buy a good quality kitten food to ensure optimum growth and development
- 2. Worming is every two weeks initially then eventually every three months for the rest of their life, especially if they are hunters.
- 3. Flea control regular treatment (sometimes every 4-6 weeks) is needed to keep fleas away.
- 4. Vaccinations kittens need to be vaccinated against cat flu twice usually at 9 and 12 weeks. Then again one year later then every two years for the rest of their life. Vaccination against FIV (cat AIDS) should also be considered.
- 5. Neutering male and female kittens should be 'fixed' at 5-6 months old for many reasons but especially population control.
- 6. Time get a kitten if you are prepared to spend time with them every day for the next 10-15 years

Other things to consider include microchipping to identify your cat if it strays, grooming requirements especially if long-haired, and pet insurance for unexpected veterinary bills.

Pre-mating – improved flock performance

The pre-mating period is one of the most critical times on your farm. It determines the performance of your flock for the coming season. If something goes wrong here, it is virtually impossible to correct it for another year as there is nothing that can be done to increase scanning percentages once mating has finished. So plan ahead – this is not something that can be left until the last minute.

There are numerous factors which influence flock performance at this most critical time:

Rams – a pre-mating "WOF" should be done prior to mating to ensure they are fit and ready to do their job. Check to see they have no lameness and are not suffering from any other conditions that may impair their ability to mate.

Ewes – Monitor their weight, condition and nutrition from weaning onwards. These factors will dictate when a ewe will begin to cycle and how well she ovulates. Poor condition ewes can have delayed breeding activity, reduced ovulation rates and reduced overall fertility.

Trace elements – deficiencies can impact on ewe and ram fertility, so it is very important to ensure levels are adequate prior to mating. Selenium and iodine are the most important. If you are unsure whether you need to supplement trace elements then it is best to arrange for either Joe or Roger to take blood samples to determine the mineral status of your flock.





A Matter of Accounts

New Years Resolutions and Reviews

I hope that you have found some time for rest and relaxation over the Christmas and New Year period, even if it was just a few days. January is often a time for reflection, making New Years Resolutions, and thinking about the year ahead; what we want to be different, what we would like to repeat.

The same is no doubt true for your business, you have probably been thinking about the year ahead. The tax year is still a couple of months off but you don't need to wait until then to review the year just gone, start to make some changes, and hit the ground running in the 2020 income tax year.

In order to plan well for the year ahead, you will be starting to think about your financial plan and/or budgets for the next 12 months period. Here are some questions to ask yourself to help get more clarity around your way forward:

- Am I able to access the information I need to analyse my business or am I close enough to operations, and the business simple enough that I know exactly where things are at? If not, maybe it's time to look at accounting software or making changes to the software that you are currently using.
- How has the business performed so far compared to budget, last year, industry benchmarks, or as a % of sales?
- Am I selling the right products or right mix of products? Can I add more products to the range?
- Are there new markets or opportunities that I can look at to grow sales?
- Are there value added services I can bring into my business?
- Have any patterns emerged over the months ie have costs increased each month, or are sales showing seasonality?
- · Do I need to start sourcing product from new suppliers?
- · Can I renegotiate pricing and/or terms with existing suppliers?
- Review your overheads by asking yourself, is this the most efficient way of doing this, or can I find a cheaper alternative?
- · What cash needs do I have over the coming months, is this affected by seasonality?
- Where can I source the additional cash I need, or how can I make sure the cash continues to flow on a regular basis?
- · Do I need to purchase any one off assets or am I better to lease?
- Is my business now in a position that I can refinance for a better interest rate?
- Are my customers paying me on time, do I need to "drop" some non profitable customers?
- Do I have slow moving stock that I need to get rid of urgently in order to make a cash injection to more profitable stock?
- Have I been regularly invoicing out my work in progress, or have I been waiting until the end of the job before invoicing?
- · What profits have I been making on individual jobs or types of jobs?

Hope School Speaks to NASA Astronaut

A small rural school just outside Wakefield, with children from the village in each of its four classes, Hope School has won recognition for its creativity this spring. Hot on the heels of winning first prize at the Nelson Mask Parade in October, where Hope School were dressed as astronauts, the youngest class, Room 3, received the news that they had won a national competition open to all school across the country, Years 0 to 8, run by the New Zealand Space Agency!

The competition invited children to compose a 200 word message to the future and Room 3 did this in the form of a poem. The Space Agency noted that voyagers to New Zealand have navigated across the seas using stars as their guide. The voyagers travelled in state of the art craft using the stars in outer space and the environment to guide them. They were scientists, innovators, astronomers and astrologers. Today, New Zealanders are still looking to the stars and we are creating new opportunities to discover and travel into space. The message will answer the question:

What could be our future in space?"

Room 3's prize was to have a skype call with a retired NASA astronaut!

Our astronaut was Nicole Marie who served as a Flight Engineer on ISS Expedition 20 and Expedition 21 and was a Mission Specialist on STS-128 and STS-133. She was the first person to paint a watercolour in space. She spoke with each of the children, answering a question from each, and the poem was read to her.

The children asked her what her bed was like up in space (apparently they are taped to sleeping bags tucked vertically into an available space) and could she jump as high as a house? - to which she answered that it was great fun and felt like being Superman to launch yourself off one wall and fly down the whole thing!

The children asked if the paint floated off her brush and she said yes it did, so she had to use a very dry paint brush, or balls of water would just break off and float away! The children asked her about food in space where she said she enjoyed food from every culture as the astronauts come from all over the world - and what her favourite planet was. That she answered instantly: Earth, as it is so beautiful and so special.

How Much Is Your Property Worth?

A question we see a lot in the office is people wanting an indicative price of what their property may be worth. Although it may be seen as an easy task, there are a lot of factors to consider when finding out how much your property may be worth in the current market.

The rating value (RV) is one of the values a buyer may use to access the properties value. An RV is the value the local council uses to determine the rates payable on the property. The RV does not necessarily determine the current market value, especially here in the Tasman District, with the current rating valuations carried out in September 2017 by QV.

The next revaluation will occur in 2020, and this will impact rates from 2021-2022. Valuations remain valid for three years unless there is a change to the property through a building consent, subdivision or resurvey.

Market values can change quickly, for example in a property boom or when an area gets rezoned. Thereby a more thorough appraisal can be carried out by a real estate agent, often obligation free. Known as a current market appraisal (CMA), your chosen agent/s will prepare and present an appraisal and proposal for you to consider. The agent will compare your property to others that have sold recently, what's currently on the market and also after a visit to the property they will assess its condition.

Real estate agents also include a proposal of the services the agent can offer and thoughts on how to best market your property. It may be worth speaking with more than one agent. Finding an agent you are comfortable with selling your property, often your most valuable asset.

Another option is to get a registered valuer to provide a valuation for you. Property valuation is a service that comes at a cost, price varying depending on level of detail and provider. Registered property valuers are qualified and experienced in property valuation with a thorough knowledge on the local real estate market, building methods, materials and legislation. Registered Valuers can be found on the Property Institute website.

As always its best to have your home looking its best to get the best price when it's time to sell. Both agents and property valuers are often happy to recommend what areas to work on to optimise the property value. This can help save time and money on unnecessary renovations. A simple lick of paint or declutter may make all the difference in some cases.

Also while I am on this subject remember to check your emergency survival kits and update them if necessary. It's worth having a grab bag if you're required to leave your address in a hurry for any reason. Also consider your pets/animals and whether or not you have sufficient feed and water available for them if you had to leave your property for any reason. You never know what natural disaster could be around the corner be it fire, floods or earthquakes. It's much easier to think and prepare for it now than when it happens.

I was privileged and humbled to be nominated and receive a medal for the Kiwibank New Zealander of the Year – local hero awards. It was a privilege to attend this event with my family and to be recognised. It was also fantastic to see all the other local heroes recognised for the efforts they put in to making their community a better place. A big thank you to Murray Biggs for nominating me for the award. It was also a privilege to be recognised at the Wakefield Fire Brigade Christmas party - thank you to Wakefield volunteer brigade Fire Chief Fritz Buckendahl and his team for this kind gesture.

Previously I've mentioned that a fair bit of work has gone in to fundraising for cameras in both the Wakefield and Brightwater areas. I'm happy to say that sufficient funds have been raised to install cameras in both areas. The Wakefield cameras are scheduled to be installed





Meningococcal ACWY Vaccine Available to Certain Groups 1 December 2019 by Dr Pip de Hamel

Good news for students heading to hostels in 2020

From 1 December 2019 PHARMAC will be paying for a Meningitis vaccine for individuals aged 13 to 25 years in close-living situations. This means that one dose of this meningococcal ACWY vaccine is free for those aged 13 years to 24 years (under 25 years) who: are entering within the next three months, or are in their first year of living in boarding school hostels, tertiary education halls of residence, military barracks or prisons.

In addition, from 1 December 2019 to 30 November 2020, people already living in boarding school hostels, tertiary education halls of residence, military barracks or prisons will also have access to the vaccine.

It is important to note that there are different strains of Meningitis, this vaccine covers the strains ACWY but does not provide protection against meningococcal B disease which is more common. Unfortunately the vaccine against Meningitis B costs \$130.




