Wonderful public attendance was recorded, with numbers up on last year and this coupled with the gold coin donation only for entry, the free rides for all ages, all museums open for viewing and the park grounds looking supreme were certainly huge draw cards.

Many families also took the opportunity to bring their own picnic to enjoy and this truly epitomises this venue – all about community and family enjoying the park setting. All members of the Higgins Heritage Park and Steam Museum teams were certainly "on steam" for the

day to showcase all that was on offer. This yearly event was wonderfully complemented by the Community Craft Fair team, who had in conjunction with the park team members added yet again a very colourful "twist" to the day. Extra colourful flags, decorations and wonderful spinnaker poles of rainbow colours "loaned" to us by Gretchen and Ted Howard of Rainbow Flight and Kite Nelson which gave an added WOW to the day. And also the added attraction of our guest for the event - the West Coast author of "Back in the Day", Moe Bowes, was very special indeed for those able to purchase his two books and have them autographed!

This event is never the same old, same old, with committee members always looking for a "difference" to make these community events special for the park, community and our region. There were 69 sites in total – 10 community and sponsor sites (at no charge), 7 food sites, 48 craft sites and 4 children's chair sized sites. The children's "chair" sites at the cost of \$4 were very popular. Hannah Granger was in great demand at her lemonade stand.

Our funds for donations back to our community come solely from the site holders fees on the day and after expenses were deducted – the amount of \$1,200 has been donated to the following; St Johns Church Community Lunches \$200, Snowden Bush Trust Brightwater \$300, Wakefield Scouts \$600, Brightwater Playcentre \$100.

It was a wonderful family day and we all feel that regardless of the profit that quintessentially it is all about community, both in the venue supplied to us and also by providing the opportunity for many craft folks, community groups and children to come together from throughout the region to participate.

You will find things a little different at this year's Annual Trials of the Waimea Sheep Dog Trial Club. Waimea Sheep Dog Trial Club are gearing up with courses ready to celebrate our 100 years of trialing next year, 2021. So, to that end we will be trialing new and revised courses. Let's hope the weather will play its part by not continuing our



summer drought which caused the cancellation of our trials in 2019.

Our trials will be held at the same venue base as it has been for the last 98 years - 320 Higgins Road, Wakefield on the property now owned by Peter Brown. This is alongside the cycle/walkway that was established a few years back and is now very popular with locals and those from further afield.



We are fortunate and thankful to the property owners, helpers, sponsors and competitors who help stage these events as part of the overall NZ Sheep Dog Trial Association season for competitors to gain points to qualify for both Island and NZ Championships. This year these championships will be held at Leithen Valley Farm, Switzers Road, Greenvale, Southland.

Farming priorities and land use are always changing and this has had the effect that there are not so many local competitors as in the past. It is also finding that there less larger mobs of suitable sheep available for use at our trials. This year we are having to truck sheep from Kohatu to use on two events. Thanks to the sheep suppliers and trucking company.

If you are interested in viewing some of these events come and join us on Friday afternoon 3rd April and all day Saturday 4th April at 320 Higgins Road, just on the outskirts of Wakefield township. On Saturday all four events will be running simultaneously.

I can report that many good knees made light work with a great social chat and cuppa catch-up afterwards.

Do remember that these group days are held on the second Saturday of each month from 10am until noon. If you have the time to spare it would be great for you to join us. Do contact me to go on our telephone tree to receive reminders. All assistance is certainly appreciated and we were extremely grateful to be contacted by Anne Nelson who was doing some visiting with friends in Wakefield and gave us two weeks or so of intense weeding at Faulkner Bush and checking in with me as she progressed to her next area. The dry weather has also meant for us all to be extra vigilant with regards fire in any of our reserves and it was good to have the lookout track at Faulkner Bush closed off for a period during high fire risk as were many other tracks and walking areas in the Tasman District. Thank you also to members of our community who have contacted me with any concerns of "going ons" that seem a tad strange in our reserves. The good thing is I can usually have it checked out immediately or notify the correct authority. If you are unable to contact me always make a choice to contact the Police or the Tasman District Council Reserves Department as if outside the council working hours a message can always be left with their call centre.

### **BIRDS IN OUR BUSH**

The Weka, Woodhen (Gallirallus Australia), common Maori name Weka also has the meaning "valley traverse" referring to its prowling habits of stalking deliberately and confidently through the undergrowth. Its stealthy movements inspired the description te ara o weka, "The Weka Path" for the grim path of war travelled by Maori fighting parties during the long marches of the raiding season. It was a food source for Maori and Europeans in the early days and it was cooked in many ways.

Its flesh was described as white, luscious and tender. It is also another bird that is the "teller" of wet weather. The Weka has an oil feather just above their tails and with their beak they transfer the oil to their coats as a protection against wet.

The West Coast Bushmen noticed when the Weka spent more time than usual in oiling their feathers it was a sure sign that heavy rain was coming - even though the usual sky signs were not threatening. The Weka also has a mischievous and thieving habit of nicking any shiny coloured object left around even if you are only a short distance from it.

There are four subspecies of Weka; North Island, Western Weka of the South Island, Stewart Island and Chatham Island.

They are all fully protected except for the Chatham Island where it can be hunted.

The Weka has been seen in our bush reserves over various times in the last few years and around gardens, normally in pairs. They are a flightless bird about 53cm in length and coloured reddish brown streaked with black.

One warning though - if a Weka wanders into your house, shed or car do not chase them just let them wander out on their own accord or you may have a smelly mess to clean up as if chased they tend to excrete randomly everywhere!!!!



### Have you heard of RWD?

RWD or Retired Working Dogs NZ is a registered charity that finds new homes for old or injured or less able working dogs. It's a nationwide service that's been around since 2012 and connects people who want to rehome working dogs with people who are happy to give a dog a forever home.

It may be an older working dog that can't manage on a large station but can cope with a lifestyle block, or a young dog that's just not interested in stock, or maybe a dog that's had a career-ending injury but is still okay to zoom around at the beach.

All dogs are health checked, vaccinated, de-fleaed, wormed, microchipped, registered, desexed and have a behavior assessment if necessary.

Prospective owners must have a property check and can take a dog on trial. If all goes well, the dog has a new forever home. If not, RWD will foster the dog until they find another owner.

So far, RWD have rehomed about 300 dogs. They have many success stories and happy endings thanks to the volunteers, sponsors and benefactors that help it happen. If you are interested in their work or want to make a donation, check them out at www.retiredworkingdogs.org.nz or on Facebook.

### Do you have a skinny old cat?

If you answered 'yes' then read on... Many of our cats look thinner as they get tecebook.com/ScottMetzgerCartoons older. This can be just the normal aging process where muscle mass is lost due

to being less active (just like people). But if your cat is looking skinnier and skinnier, that's not normal!

There are several common diseases that occur in older cats resulting in weight loss. These are:

- Hyperthyroidism (over-active thyroid gland)
- Kidney disease
- Diabetes

These diseases can be managed and enable our pets to live a good quality life. But left untreated, older cats have a poor quality of life and are likely to be euthanased earlier.


\*Barbara won the C of C Singles for her fourth centre title of the year and 38th overall.

## A Matter of Accounts

### Preparing for End of Tax Year

Well the end of the tax year is drawing close, and you may be starting to think about making sure that you have all of your information available for your Accountant to complete your end of year accounts and file your tax returns.

If you are using accounting software, I suggest that you:

- Make sure all of your bank transactions have been entered and finalised
- Reconcile your bank accounts to 31st March
- Perform a review of your general ledger entries to look for miscoded items and other potential errors
- Take a back up of your software once you have finished entering everything and reviewing and store it somewhere safe. Do this before you rollover the financial year if your software requires a rollover.

Your Accountant may have slightly different requirements, and many will send you a checklist to assist with compilation of your documents, but here are some suggestions for the type of paperwork to get together for your Accountant:

• Bank Statements – for all accounts that cover the full period ie 1st April 2019 to 31st March 2020 inclusive. This is important, especially if your bank statements don't necessarily start on the 1st of each month.

• Loan Statements – if you have borrowing, make sure you provide the statements which show the transactions, repayments, interest added and closing balances as at balance date.

• Resident Withholding Tax certificates – often sent out by banks two or three weeks into April or downloadable from your internet banking.

• Dividend Statements - if you received any dividend income during the year.

• Stock on hand or cash on hand – perform a stocktake or count, as at 31st March. This should be at cost, not retail. For livestock, it will be simply a count of the physical stock numbers, with no value associated, including the age and sex of the stock.

• Copies of GST and PAYE returns that have been filed during the year and working papers that were used to prepare these returns.

• A list of invoices that you have sent out but that haven't been paid including the amounts outstanding – your outstanding debtors.

• A list of the invoices that you have received but haven't yet paid including the amounts you owe – your outstanding ceditors.

• A vehicle logbook if you needed to complete one.

· Home office expense information eg interest on your mortgage, telephone, power, rates etc.

You also need to think about your needs for the coming year and discuss these with your Accountant. Give your Accountant as much information as you can – let them know:

• What has changed, how do you want to go forward for the next year, is business likely to improve, stay the same, or are you forecasting a decline?

• Has your home situation changed? Have you now got children, partner stopped work or working in the business more?

Remember, the more information that you can provide to your Accountant, the less chasing around they have to do, the easier it will be for them, and therefore the less additional cost you are likely to incur.

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## **Team Heyward Property Talk**

### Healthy homes compliance for landlords and tenants

In real estate we see a high percentage of property investors looking to purchase in the area. Their first query is always to do with insulation and if it meets the healthy home standards. With this in mind I thought it would be great to discuss the Healthy Home Standards so both landlords and tenants are aware of their rights and responsibilities when living in a rental home.

New healthy homes standards for rental properties in New Zealand became law on 1 July 2019. The standards will play a significant role in improving the wellbeing of New Zealanders and their families. Also by creating warmer and drier homes landlords are better protecting their investments reducing mildew and mould damage caused by damp homes. By 1 July 2020 landlords must include a statement of their current level of compliance with the healthy homes standards in any new, varied or renewed tenancy agreement. From 1 July 2021 private landlords must ensure their rental properties comply with the healthy homes standards within 90 days of any new, or renewed, tenancy and from 1 July 2024 all rental homes must comply with all the following healthy home standards.

The healthy homes standards incorporate five aspects of a property, which all contribute to a warm and dry home. These are insulation, heating, ventilation, moisture ingress and drainage and lastly draught stopping. Below covers the very basics of standards. There are exemptions that apply, more information can be found at www.tenancy.govt.nz.

Ceiling and underfloor insulation has been compulsory in all rental homes since 1 July 2019, where it is reasonably practicable to install. Some existing insulation in rental properties will need to be topped up or replaced. For the Nelson/Tasman region insulation needs to have a minimum resistance value of R 3.3 for ceilings and underfloor R 1.3. Failure to comply with the insulation regulations is unlawful and may be liable for a penalty of up to \$4,000. All rental properties must have one or more fixed heaters, which can directly heat the main living room to at least 18°C and can maintain this temperature all year round.

Ventilation is also very important with all kitchens and bathrooms having an extraction fan that ventilates externally. As well as at least one door or window (including skylights) that opens to the outside in all bedrooms, dining rooms, living rooms, lounges and kitchens. The windows or doors must be able to be fixed in the open position. Tenants are responsible for ventilating the home. The simplest way to do this is by regularly opening the doors and windows.

To cover the moisture ingress and drainage standards, rental properties must have efficient drainage for the removal of storm water, surface water and ground water, including an appropriate outfall. The drainage system must include gutters, downpipes and drains for the removal of water from the roof. Landlords must block any unreasonable gaps and holes in walls, ceilings, windows, floors and doors that cause noticeable draughts. Open fireplaces must be blocked unless the tenant and landlord agree otherwise.




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## National Rally - Higgins Heritage Park






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## **Health Centre**

### Coronavirus (COVID-19)

New Zealand is prepared and ready to deal with a COVID-19 outbreak should it occur here. The risk of an ongoing outbreak is currently (at the time of going to press) low-moderate, but we are monitoring the situation closely.

### Symptoms

Symptoms of COVID-19 are similar to a range of other illnesses such as influenza. Having any of these symptoms does not necessarily mean that you have COVID-19.

Symptoms include:

- fever
- coughing
- difficulty breathing

Difficulty breathing is a sign of possible pneumonia and requires immediate medical attention.

We don't yet know how long symptoms take to show after a person has been infected, but current World Health Organization assessments suggest that it is 2-10 days.

If you have these symptoms and have recently been to mainland China or have been in close contact with someone confirmed with COV-ID-19, please telephone Healthline (for free) on 0800 358 5453 or your doctor immediately.
