Wakefield Country Players' show was postponed from earlier in the year and I am very glad they finally got to perform. Director Hugh Neill has obviously kept energies intact over the eight month hiatus, to bring us a sensational evening's entertainment.

Kiwifruits – A New Zealand Fairy Tale, loosely based on the Cinderella story, sees Fay Gay explaining to fellow drag performer, Titania, the story of how the ill-fated Crown Road Tavern was saved by her drag show.

BYO picnic theatre at the Wakefield Hall perfectly suits this show set in a working men's pub. It's almost like we are right there with publican Rex Corona (Dean Strasser) as he worries about the fate of his premises.

As the story unfurls, we are treated to an extravaganza of classic drag queen show tunes and hundreds of the obligatory sequins. Yes, the costumes are utterly fabulous! It is clear that Keith Marshall, as the wonderful Fay Gay has a wealth of experience on the drag stage, and the dresses and accessories are apparently almost entirely from his personal collection.

There are some lovely moments between Allison (Krystal Hollis) and her Prince, Ben (Hayden Waller) as their relationship blossoms. Of course, they have artfully played distractions - slutty Serena (Lydia Dunn) and Allison's mother Erica (Rae Strasser), neither of whom help the course of true love, but we do eventually reach a resolution...of sorts.

Special mention to a very convincing drag queen, Adam Stewart as Titania. The subtle flicks of the hair or occasional wink at an audience member had us totally under her spell.

Congratulations to everyone who had to negotiate the steps in six inch stilettos and to the back stage crew assisting with the extensive costume changes!

This modern day fairy tale has all the usual plot twists and villains, and of course a big finale reveal (in more ways than one) but this very special show just has us laughing and applauding from the very first scene.

An utterly fabulous night out was had by all, and I can definitely recommend it, you will not be disappointed.

Country Players next production is The Father, by Florian Zeller. Our next show, performing in March 2021, is an excellent and very moving drama about dementia, and its effects on one man and his family. We need a cast of six people, three men and three women. Auditions will be held on Sunday 13 December, 1.00pm at the Village Hall. 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

In the Bush

It is hard to believe that December is upon us already and of course the weather patterns have kept us all on our toes, especially the heavy rain. Our usual weeding/maintenance day saw us again at Robson's, dealing with loads of weeds. Two of our members doing another intense weeding there during the following week.

During a recent evening, we experienced an extremely heavy downpour, which created issues for us at the Faulkner Bush Scenic Reserve, in that many of the drains overflowed, especially onto the main track, which turned into a stream, which then resulted in some damage being done to the side tracks where there was water run-off.

I went up during the morning with it still raining heavily and cleared many of the drains and their drainage pipes which had been blocked up from the contractors mowing grass into drains. I also cut side drains off the main track to get water to flow out of the low spots.

In the Robson Scenic Reserve, the 88 Valley Stream broke its bank above the Reserve, which resulted in a large water flow through the Reserve. Fortunately no damage within the reserve and a good wet was great for the trees, but not so good for the neighbour who had water flowing through their property.

Also at the Edward Baigent Memorial Scenic Reserve, the 88 Valley Stream broke its banks. Other than some of the bank being washed away no other damage was done. Once we got some drying weather the society refurbished the damaged tracks at the Faulkner Bush Scenic Reserve.

I feel very privileged and humbled to have such a dedicated committee and membership, together with many folks in our community to support us in our endeavours to act as guardians for our Scenic Reserves; Faulkner Bush Scenic Reserve, Edward Baigent Memorial

Scenic Reserve and Robson's Scenic Reserve, so that they will be intact for many future generations to come. To all of you my sincere and personal thanks.

Our last weeding day for the year will take place at the Scout Den area on the 12th December. This will involve releasing plants from our previous plantings which have over time become surrounded by long grass.

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Wakefield Volunteer Fire Brigade

Good morning Wakefield

As you can see below, another very busy month for the brigade with ten calls for the month with an array of skills required for each call out. Well done again team.

Wakefield Volunteer Fire brigade was nominated and has won the FENZ Region 4 Award this year under the category of Manaakitanga – "We serve and support" for the work on making Wakefield community more resilient. Nelson/Tasman Emergency Centre, Wakefield Police, Wakefield VFB and some local community members have been working hard in the background for several years putting plans in place in case we have a major event happening in our area. One good example of this planning being put to the test was when the Pigeon Valley fire started the Police wanted Pigeon Valley residents evacuated due to the fire dangers. By having plans in place for such an event I needed only to make one phone call and in ten minutes the evacuation centre was up and running at the Anglican Church centre. Without any preplanning done setting up and running an effective evacuation centre could have taken hours rather than minutes when time is precious.

Another good example of our resilience program in Wakefield was WVFB ran a public meeting at the fire station talking about the AF8, Alpine Fault Magnitude 8 Earthquake, which over 140 residents turned up to listen to Alice Lake-Hammond from NZ Geology Services explaining what potentially could happen to the South Island and what we can expect to happen here in Wakefield when a magnitude 8 earthquake erupts.

The message here for every house holder in our community and district is that you have a plan in place if any big disaster happens again

- If you and your family are separated, who is going to look after your children?
- How are you going to communicate with each other if the cell phone towers don't work?
- Have you got your emergency food and clothing kit in place?
- Do you all know the meeting place if your house catches fire?

Please talk with your family and put plans in place, if you have no plans the disaster is only going to get bigger!


UPDATE: MORE PASSENGERS NEEDED

The Wakefield Bus has been running now for over a year with some stoppages due to Covid19. The chart below shows the level of patronage up to the midde of November. While the passenger levels were reasonable during last year there has been a noticeable falling off over the past few months.

We have reached the point where it is becoming difficult to justify running the bus and to get further funds which will allow the bus to operate next year. On average the bus needs to be at least half full and currently we are achieving less than 3 passengers per trip.

By running this bus, the Trust is aiming to demostrate to TDC that it is a viable concern which can be eventally be taken over by TDC and run, possibly, as an expanded commuter service. If we can't show that the patronage is there, it is unlikely that this will ever happen. So if you think that a bus service is a good idea, please use it.

SKIN CANCER

Summer is coming and while I don't want to spoil the fun, I would like to remind people about skin cancer. It is the most common cancer in New Zealand and unfortunately we have amongst the highest rates in the world. It is largely preventable - over 90% of all skin cancer cases are attributed to excess sun exposure. It is important to detect skin cancer early, especially melanoma. Early detection gives the best chances of successfully treating skin cancer.

Types of skin cancer:

Melanoma - the most serious form of skin cancer, causing over two thirds of skin cancer deaths. **Squamous cell carcinoma (SCC)** - easily treated if found early but can be fatal if left untreated. **Basal cell carcinoma (BCC)** - the most common and generally the least dangerous skin cancer. BCC can be serious and require surgery if left untreated.

Causes of skin cancer:

The most common cause of skin cancer is too much exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun. People of all ages and skin colours can be diagnosed with skin cancer but those at a higher risk are people who have:

- Fair skin or red or fair hair
- Fair skin that burns easily no matter what hair colour
- Had one or more severe sunburns especially in childhood or adolescence
- Used sunbeds, particularly at a young age
- A family history of melanoma (parent, brother, sister or child)
- Large irregularly shaped or uneven moles
- A large number of moles

Prevention of skin cancer:

If people protect their skin and avoid sunburn throughout their lives the risk of skin cancer is reduced. It is important to be SunSmart in the months between September and April, especially between the hours of 10am-4pm when the UV radiation levels are very high. In winter it is also important to be SunSmart at high altitudes and around snow and water.

Steps to being SunSmart:

Slip - into the shade where possible.

Slip - on some protective clothing ie shirt with collar and long sleeves and trousers or long-legged shorts.

Slop - on sunscreen that has an SPF of at least 30 and apply 20 minutes prior to sun exposure.

Slap - on a hat that protects your face, head, neck and ears.

Wrap - on some close fitting sunglasses.

Symptoms and diagnosis of skin cancer:

Finding skin cancer as early as possible is the key to successful treatment. You should speak to your health professional if you have a mole, freckle or spot that:

- Is new or changing.
- Does not heal.
- Looks different from others around it.
- Has changed in size, thickness, shape, colour or has started to bleed.

Treatment of skin cancer:

This depends on the lesion, location and patient factors. It can include application of special creams, cryotherapy (freezing), shave excisions (without sutures) and full excisions (with sutures). We are well equipped and can treat most skin cancers at the Wakefield practice. We discuss treatment options and costs with all patients and refer both publically and privately when necessary.

Skin Checks:

We encourage regular "skin checks" as an effective way of detecting lesions early and improving outcomes. Both Dr Wayne Hurlow and Dr Mark Fry have done extra training in skin cancer medicine and have been accredited doctors of the Skin Cancer College of Australasia since 2017. They offer skin checks for patients registered with the Wakefield Health Centre and these are booked as a dedicated appointment. The cost for a skin check is \$60 for non community service card holders and \$30 for community service card holders.

Enjoy summer but be SunSmart and if you are worried about a spot then come and have it checked out.


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Wakefield School

On Tuesday 17th of November students of Wakefield School in Rooms 1 and 2 received a visit from Jenny Lines, regarding possible updates for the Wakefield crossings. Here are some of the kids ideas:

- paint the crossing lines and tactile paving brighter
- don't bounce balls while crossing
- make the crossing by Arrow St bigger
- look for a gap in traffic before crossing
- take off jumpers or hoodies while crossing

One of the biggest hurdles is money. Some of the possible solutions would cost a lot of money and we would need the Tasman District Council to fund them so this is a process we need to go through.

We have all been gathering data in our classrooms to share with the council outlining who needs to cross the road and how often. We have also surveyed some truck drivers who have had near misses with students and families crossing the road.

The diagrams below show how to safely cross the road:





Note that the correct green box shows pedestrians waiting for a gap then crossing not trying to make the traffic stop. The red box is confusing traffic by waiting for it to stop and this is incorrect. Please use the method in the green box when you are crossing please.

We have been involved in some pretty interesting learning lately such as organising a Student Volunteer Army to take on any community based projects available. We were lucky enough to have our local St Johns Church reach out as they need a bit of work carried out on site. We have been trying to sort out a dry day as we are all organised and ready to go!. Hopefully the weather will improve and we can go and make a big difference.

We are also going to run an Arcade Day based on a famous story about Caines Arcade. If you have not heard of this you should look it up on YouTube and watch it as it is very inspiring. We will

be creating arcade machines out of cardboard and inviting other parts of the school to come and play.

We also had a cool technology Electives Day where we all got to choose an area to explore and figure out. It was a way of problem-solving and extending our knowledge. A great day was had by all.

Well that is just a taste of what has been happening at the senior end of the school in Term 4...what a crazy year.









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Live Well Stay Well

Our Live Well Stay Well meeting on 27 October took us up to the skies. Not literally, but an extremely interesting presentation given by Ralph Bradley, chairman of the Top of the South Dark Skies Committee, helped us to understand a lot more about the importance of preserving the night sky, not just to enjoy, but also to study for scientific and astronomy purposes.

The more we light up the night, especially with bright LED lights which affect sleep, the greater risk to our health, as well as posing a threat to nocturnal life.

Five years of hard work by the Top of the South Dark Skies Committee resulted in the Wai-iti Reserve and adjoining Tunnicliffe Forest (135 hectares) being officially recognised as a Dark Skies Park by the International Dark Skies Association. This will preserve the natural dark sky, protecting the stars from excess light.

The Dark Skies Committee would like the whole of the top of the South Island

to become a Dark Skies Reserve, especially as with three National Parks and conservation land already contributing to the area having a dark sky.

Ralph posed the question - could NZ become a dark sky nation?

Thank you Ralph for a most informative talk, giving plenty for us to think about.

Our last meeting for the year was on 24 November when we visited the Gardens of the World in Brightwater. Despite it having rained very heavily the day before and through the night, the moming of the 24th was clear and sunny, perfect for our visit.

We are grateful to our two very knowledgeable guides, Jason and Chris, who both work at Gardens of the World, for giving us a most informative tour of the gardens. The gardens are beautiful to just wander through, but having our guides tell us about the gardens' history, and pointing out rare and unusual trees and plants, greatly enhanced the experience. It was also interesting to visit the crematorium and the lovely remembrance gardens.

We finished our morning by enjoying lunch together

at Happyz Cafe in Bateup Road. The food was delicious and the staff friendly and efficient. A great way to finish the year for Live Well Stay Well.

The group will now have a break until next year, so we wish you a very happy Christmas, and after this year, dominated by the horrors of Covid19, I'm sure we all hope for a better 2021. Keep Your Property Safe and Secure These Holidays

Hi All! Hope you are all well and happy heading into the festive period. It has been a strange year for us all and it will be good to see a new year in spite of the fact that our Covid related issues are not yet behind us.

Many people are planning holidays within our lovely country. I believe that accommodation bookings are at an all time high. This is great news and I am delighted to know that you are planning family time. If you are planning on exploring our own beautiful backyard, here are some helpful ideas to keep your home safe while you are away.

Enjoy, have fun and stay safe from the team at Bayleys Wakefield.

Home security to deter burglars:

- · Lock your doors and windows.
- Record the serial numbers of expensive electronic items and photograph these and other valuables, email images to your home email for vault storage.
- Keep valuables out of sight, ie jewellery, cameras and electronic games.
- · Install an alarm system, get sensor lights fitted.
- · Keep garden sheds and garages locked when not in use.
- Keep hedges or plants around doors and windows well-trimmed, don't give the burglar a place to hide.
- Stop your mail and paper if you are going away or arrange for someone to collect it.
- · Keep the house secure when you are out in the garden or yard.
- Note down registrations of any suspicious vehicles, often burglars will scope out the place beforehand.
- · Join or form a neighbourhood support group.

Going on holiday:

- Make arrangements for your mail and newspaper to be stopped or collected by a friend or neighbour.
- Hide valuable items, financial documents and spare keys to vehicles.
- · Lock your garages and any sheds.
- · Set timer switches on lights and/or radios.
- Don't mention on your voicemail you will be away from home for a few days.
- Be aware that burglars have access to social media. If you are going away don't post this publically on your social media.
- Get a neighbour or friend to make regulars checks on the property. They can even close curtains in the evening and turn lights on to give the appearance that someone is home.

Genia Reserve Book Exchange



We agreed that establishing legal status - most likely a Charitable Trust or Incorporated Society - is important for the following reasons:

- Accountability: being transparent to the community at large and other groups
- Longevity: we hope the steering group, as a legal entity, will see the project through to a successful conclusion, and then form the
 basis of a permanent governance structure to operate the completed centre
- · Eligibility for grants: legal status is necessary for most major funding agencies
- Independence: to avoid conflicts of interest the steering group must be independent from all other groups, clubs and individuals that have a stake in the project

GATHER EXPERTISE

The eleven-strong steering group possesses a range of relevant experience and skills to assist the project, and can draw on the support and advice of a wider group that attended the October meeting. For the early stages of the project we also need the help of a lawyer and somebody with skills in communication and media. Can you help with either of these? Please make contact.

GATHER IDEAS

We will contact and visit other local communities that have successfully built community centres in recent years and ask them a hundred questions about how they did it.

We need ideas from all Wakefield groups, organisations and individuals. What do you or your group want in a community centre? Think as widely as possible - this is the

time to get every idea onto the table. Talk about this project at your next club or group meeting, or your next coffee date or catchup with locals

TALK TO OTHER COMMUNITIES

How can we work with people in Brightwater, Tapawera and elsewhere to create a centre that supports their communities' needs as well as Wakefield's?

ESTABLISH KEY PARTNERSHIPS

We will build strong relationships with the Tasman District Council and local iwi.

The TDC's rules require a community to raise one third of the cost of a new centre, so fundraising will be a huge part of the project, meaning key partnerships with funding agencies, business and private donors.




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Town and Country Vet

GETTING PET-PREPARED FOR SUMMER!

Wow what a weird year it has been! Hopefully we will all be able to have time to rest and recharge over summer before getting into a more normal 2021! Here are some things to think about for our animals so we can avoid any unexpected complications and all enjoy the summer:

- If you are going away leave contact numbers for your vet as well as your mobile phone
 number with your pet carer. Have a chat so it's clear what your expectations are for your pet if
 something goes wrong, especially if you are not able to be contacted. If you are taking your pet
 with you, remember all their bits and pieces including any medication.
- Are your pets' vaccinations up to date? Vaccinations for respiratory viruses in cats, and Parvovirus plus Canine Cough in dogs must be up to date in order to stay in boarding facilities. Call us for advice if you're not sure and don't leave it until the last minute!
- Beware of novel objects which could be swallowed by your pets such as Christmas tinsel, strings from the roast, kebab sticks from the barbecue, fish hooks/fishing line (often attached to a fish!) and potentially obstructive food such as chop bones, corn cobs and peach stones.
- Most of us know that chocolate is poisonous for dogs. There is definitely more chocolate around at Christmas so remember to keep it
 out of reach of your dog. Remember dogs are very good at finding the wrapped chocolate under the tree!
- Take care giving your dog leftovers from the BBQ or roast bones, large amounts of fat and onions can all cause serious internal
 problems for dogs.
- Another food-related hazard is old food that your pet might find in compost heaps, rubbish bins and out on walks. There are millions
 of weird microbes growing in these places that if eaten by your pet (especially dogs) can cause all sorts of symptoms from tummy upsets
 through to poisoning and seizures.
- · Toxic algae are a warm weather hazard in our rivers. It's safest to avoid the rivers in summer and head to the beach instead.
- Heatstroke is common over summer particularly in larger dogs. NEVER leave dogs in the car on a hot day, even in the shade with windows down. Offer frequent drinks/stops on journeys. Restrict exercise to cooler parts of the day. Limit the length of walks especially for young energetic dogs, old dogs and dogs with medical problems. Provide shade for dog kennels and rabbit/guinea pig cages.

- Clipping long haired pets can prevent problems such as overheating, soiling, skin infections and grass seed problems. We often clip the underside/belly of long haired cats, and advise clipping under ears and around the feet of long haired dogs.
 Some long haired dogs which aren't traditionally clipped (eg Border Collies) are much more comfortable and active, even if they do look a bit odd!
- Check your dog's paws, ears, 'armpits' and groin daily for grass seeds. This is particularly important for fluffy dogs especially spaniels, poodles and all their crosses. It may seem a hassle to do this but it can be an expensive, time-consuming and painful process to find grass seeds once they are inside your dog!
- Warm weather accelerates development of flea eggs and larvae so flea prevention is important. We have many products available to suit your pets and their lifestyle including oral tablets, topical treatments

and long-lasting collars. Some products now last six months or more so it's easy to keep your pet and house flea-free.

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A Matter of Accounts

TYPES OF ANNUAL LEAVE AND ENTITLEMENTS

All employees are entitled to paid days off for:

- public holidays
- annual leave domestic violence leave

· bereavement leave **Annual Leave**

All employees are entitled to at least four weeks of paid annual holidays. This doesn't include public holidays or sick leave. You must:

- give employees at least four weeks of paid annual holidays, either in full each year on the anniversary of their start date, or building up throughout the year
- · let them take at least two weeks at once if they want to
- consider any request to pay out up to one week of their annual holiday entitlement, unless you have a policy stating you won't cash up any annual leave
- keep good records of all leave to avoid disputes
- give employees at least 14 days' notice before an annual closedown
- give employees at least 14 days' notice if you are requiring them to take annual holidays.

You can also:

- set limits on how much leave you'll let employees carry over each year let them know they'll be made to take leave if too much builds up
- make employees who've built up too much leave take some or all of it if you and your employee can't agree when the leave will be taken, you have to give them at least 14 days' notice before requiring them to take leave
- · let your employees exchange up to a week of annual leave for cash each year (you can't ask or pressure them to do this)
- · decline your employee's request for leave if you have a good reason eg an especially busy sales period
- agree to let employees take paid leave in advance you should ask them to agree in writing that if they leave the job before they've earned back the leave they've taken, you can deduct the outstanding amount from their final pay.

Pay-as-you-go annual leave

Instead of four weeks' annual leave, you can pay your employees on a pay-as-you-go basis at a minimum rate of 8% of their gross earnings if:

- the employee is on a genuine fixed-term agreement of less than 12 months, or
- the employee works so irregularly that it's impractical to provide them with four weeks' annual holidays.

Public Holidays

When a public holiday falls on a day your employee would usually work, they're entitled to a paid day off, no matter how long they've been working for you. If they agree to work anyway, you must:

pay them at least time and a half
 give them another paid day off later (a day in lieu).

Sick Leave

Once they've worked for you for six months, employees are entitled to at least five days paid sick leave each year. You must also:

- carry over unused sick leave into the next year. The maximum accumulation is 20 days - although you can provide more if you want to
- allow employees to use sick leave to care for a sick or injured spouse, partner, dependent child or any other dependent individual
- pay employees what they'd usually earn for the days they're on sick leave.

Bereavement Leave

Once they've worked for you for six months, employees are entitled to paid bereavement leave of:

- three days if their partner, parent, child, sibling, grandparent, grandchild, or their partner's parent dies
- one day on the death of a person outside their immediate family (if you accept that your employee has suffered a bereavement). They're allowed to take their bereavement leave at any time and for any reason that relates to the death.

Domestic Violence Leave

Once they have worked for you for six months, employees affected by domestic abuse can take up to 10 days' paid domestic violence leave. To qualify, at least one of these situations must apply to your employee:

- They have experienced domestic violence.
- They live with a child who has experienced domestic abuse even if the child only lives with them sometimes.

Like sick leave, the domestic leave entitlement renews every 12 months. Employees cannot carry over unused days. You do not have to pay unused days if the employee leaves.

You must:

- Give people domestic violence leave even if the abuse was before they became your employee.
- Consider giving the person flexible work arrangements for up to two months to help them deal with the effects of the violence.

You can:

Ask for proof the employee is affected by domestic violence, eg a letter from a support agency, or talk to someone who can explain their situation and how it affects them.




