It helps us care for you because:


- We have another secure way to contact you no more phone tag!

The value of using an agent

Over the summer break the Real Estate Institute of New Zealand (REINZ) conducted an analysis of private sales compared to those using an agent which showed that those homeowners who use an agent can expect to get on average of 15% more for their property than those who would be selling privately. At 15%, this is the highest premium in 18 years which highlights the true value that an agent can bring to the sales process. The premium slowly increased over the last few years from 8% back in 2015, lifting to 11% in 2016, 12% in 2017, dropped to 5% in 2018, 6% in 2019.

Bindi Norwell, Chief Executive at REINZ says: "One of the questions we get asked time and time again is 'will I get more for my house through an agent rather than if I sell it myself?'. This analysis shows that overall, the answer is yes. The research helps provide the data on using an agent compared to selling themselves. It's interesting to note the research also highlighted that we've seen a decrease in the percentage of people choosing to sell their property privately. Over the years, the data has fluctuated, with private sales making up 23% of all sales in 2014, 20% in 2017, 20% in 2018 and down to 14% in 2020.

"Selling privately works perfectly for those who have the time, inclination, expertise and patience to do so, however, for example, if you're a busy family where both parents work full time, then it might be better to utilise the skills and expertise of an agent," says Norwell.

In addition to the price premium, there are many advantages to dealing with a licenced real estate agent. Some of the skills and advantages an agent can bring to the sales transaction include:

- · Legal protections for vendors
- Significant experience in a sales environment and agents must undergo approved education requirements that focus on their professional conduct
- · Proven marketing expertise including access to experts in their teams who have training in social media, marketing or advertising
- Excellent negotiating skills it can be very awkward talking to strangers about money, but agents have extensive training in negotiation skills
- · A wide network of contacts including buyers waiting for properties to come to market
- Access to the power of their agency's selling network

They are also obliged to act in the best interests of their client and have the market knowledge and networks to ensure their clients get the best possible price - or, at the very least, fair market value.

The Bradford worked hard for three years for Ted Madigan, the Rawleigh Dealer for Moutere/Motueka.

In 1952, Bradford was then sold to Dave Nicholson, painter and paperhanger and it served him well for 15 years for work and at weekends when he would put a mattress in the back for his three young children and then travel to either Takaka or Dunedin.

Dave's painting and paperhanging business, with generation changes has now expanded into Nicholson's Protective Coatings at Tahunanui, managed by Dane Nicholson and his team.

Little grey Bradford van, is on display in the Win Collection at The Park and is proud to be 'related' to Nicholson's Protective Coatings who very generously and expertly refurbished the portable steam engine situated in Wakefield, proudly showing visitors the direction to our park.

The Father centres on the character of Andre, played in our production by Hugh Neill. Elderly, elegant, flirtatious and domineering, Andre is losing his mind to dementia, and as his interactions with his family, caregiver and the world become increasingly confused we witness the toll of his illness upon himself and those closest to him.

In its kaleidoscopic structure the audience lives some of the disorientation caused by Andre's illness. Scenes shift in time and place, circle back on themselves. The apartment (is it Andre's or his daughter's?) slowly dissolves, shedding furniture like the crumbling slabs of Andre's consciousness. Characters merge, their identities unclear. Just as Andre fails to recognise, or doubts his recognition, of those closest to him, so does the audience.

Director, Peter Verstappen, says "Country Players has been eyeing up this play for a couple of years. It's a bit different from our usual offerings to the community but it's not just all grim and dark, there's plenty of humour and a lot to think about".





Wakefield Community Bus

Regional Public Transport Plan





As far as Wakefield is concerned, the plan is to introduce a weekday morning and evening bus to Richmond on July 2023. This would be complemented with a community transport service which would deal with non-commuters.

In July 2026, the bus service would be increased to six daily with the provision of a park and ride facility.

In July 2029 an addition weekend bus service would be provided running six times daily.

TDC are seeking feedback from the wider community to see if there is support for the changes they are proposing. The deadline for submissions is 5pm 17th March. Clearly, in addition to your general support, the more information they receive on your specific transport needs, the better the service they will provide. For example,

- · Are you a regular commuter to Richmond and, if so, what times would best suit you?
- · How often and when do you normally travel to Richmond and how long do you normally spend there?
- Do you have any specific needs (eg restrictions on mobility)?
- · What fare level would entice you to use the transport?

The community transport service component in the form of the Wakefield Community Bus (WCB) will still exist, according to the plan, until 2023 at least, but with greater funding from TDC. The trust hopes to improve this service, and possibly move forward a commuting service before 2023, although this could not be done without demonstrating an immediate demand for it. At the moment the bus has remained underused and patronage needs to be increased for the service to be viable. The Trust would be keen for your feedback, on how the service can be improved. Are the departure times and days unsuitable, for example?

Any feedback the TDC receives regarding the Wakefield component of the RPTP would also be beneficial to the WCB and would help us understand how the service can be improved to attract more passengers.

A Century of Dog Trials

Dog Trialing in the region started with the Nelson Dog Trial Club in 1911 and was based in Tapawera area although many farmers from Wakefield area were actively involved often catching the train to Tapawera and return.

As there was a number of times in that period a dog trial held in association with ploughing, sheaf tossing and other activities it was decided a Dog Trial Club should be started in the Wakefield area and this occurred in 1921.



The Waimea Collie Dog Trial Club, now known as Waimea Sheep Dog Trial Club, was established and today still uses the same land for its courses as it did those 100 years ago. This is quite an achievement and shows the help and support we have had from the different property owners over the years.

Although names may not mean much to many of todays locals, some will remember: Crieghton, Polglase, Johnston, Bird, Smith, Blanche, Brown, Close, Genia Holdings, John Levy - all of whom have let us use their land.

Office holders feature names like – Gibbs, Bill Martin, Jack Borlase, Ross Higgins, Thornton Eden, Guy Evans, Barbara Ryder, and others with Colin Gibbs as current secretary and Eleanor Greenhough as Chairwoman.

Follow the history by purchasing a book that is being produced.

We invite the public to come and view the annual competitions and celebration of 100 years, at our trials at 326 Higgins Road, Wakefield on the 16th and 17th April 2021.

There will be three events going and at the completion of each the top five dogs will compete for Marlborough/Nelson Championship in that event.

Proposed Public Transport Changes

Proposed Public Transport Changes for Wakefield



Over the years Council has received numerous requests for better public transport services around our region. Council has partnered with Nelson City Council to review our bus services and improve it to encourage a substantial increase in the number of people using public transport to get around. The proposal that is being put forward plans to make improvements to existing bus services in Nelson/Richmond, and establish regular bus services to Wakefield and Motueka.

These are the proposed changes to public transport services that effect Wakefield directly over the next 10 years:

2021.

 Working with and supporting the current community transport (Wakefield Community Bus) to continue to provide transport service into Richmond

2023:

- Establish a morning and evening commuter bus that runs weekdays from Wakefield and travels to Richmond via Brightwater, Hope and Richmond South. The bus will then follow Route 2 into Nelson via Stoke, Nayland and Tāhunanui.
- Continue to support community transport for times outside of the regular bus service.

2026:

- · The Wakefield route will change to a regular all-day service during weekdays. It is likely that this will mean six return trips per day.
- For the stretch from Richmond to Nelson, the Wakefield route will then become an express service, only stopping at three key stops in Stoke, Tāhunanui and Nelson.
- · Support for community transport from Wakefield will stop, but support for community transport in other regional towns will start.

2029:

• The Wakefield route will include weekends as well as weekdays (six return trips per day).

There are many other changes that we are proposing as well, and below is a summary of these. There is also a hard copy of the full document in the TDC customer service area (Richmond). We look forward to receiving feedback from your community on the draft plans!

Over the years I have progressed with my swimming from the basic swimming lessons to moving through the different Swim Magic achievement levels and then Squad training at the Richmond Aquatic Centre. I am now in the Age Squad and swim train six times a week, plus two dryland sessions. My day starts at 4.30am and after a stretch session, I am in the pool at either Nayland or Richmond Aquatic Centre by 5.30am.

Recently I attended the Wellington Long Course Champs with 29 other clubs. I achieved five personal best times, two bronze and one silver medal. At the Swimming Nelson Marlborough Long Course Champs I achieved two gold and one silver medal.

My specialised stroke is breaststroke, but as a swimmer you need to be good at all strokes so that you can compete in the individual medley events, which consist of all four strokes (butterfly, backstroke, breaststroke, and freestyle).

Apart from swimming, I like riding my horse, spending time with our animals and hanging out with friends and family.

My goals this year include getting times for NZ Age Group Swimming Championships (NAGS) which is held in Wellington this April, and NZ Divisional II Swimming Champs, which is held in Dunedin in May.

Later in the year I hope I will be at the NZ Schools Secondary Swimming Champs in July in Auckland, and then in August I have the NZ Short Course Championships in Auckland. The cost for me to attend these events will be approximately \$5000-\$8000, so I am looking



FLEAS

Fleas have been rampant this season and can still be a problem well into autumn particularly if they haven't been managed through summer. If your pets have flea problems now, you will need to treat your house as well as your pet/s. There are many products available to control fleas – phone or come in and see us for advice.

FLY STRIKE IN PETS

If it's warm and damp in autumn, fly strike is still a risk in our pet rabbits and long-haired dogs and cats. This is a serious often fatal problem that can occur within hours. Flies are attracted to damp fur, urine, faeces and they lay their eggs on or around the animal's bottom. Maggots will hatch within hours and quickly eat into the flesh as well as releasing dangerous toxins.

Prevent fly strike by checking your pet daily (and rabbits twice daily) to ensure their bottom is clean and dry. Clip fur away if necessary. Remove soiled bedding as soon as possible and keep the surrounding environment clean. Ensure your pet is not fed incorrectly which can lead to diarrhoea and soiled fur. If you find maggots on your pets, phone us immediately. We urgently need to remove eggs and maggots and prevent pain, infection and shock.

RYEGRASS STAGGERS


Ryegrass Staggers is a problem at this time of year on farms particularly when animals are forced to graze close to the ground. This is a disease caused by toxins produced by a fungus present in some types of ryegrass. The symptoms are tremors, jerky movements and staggering. It affects cows, sheep, deer and horses, and alpaca are particularly susceptible. Affected animals are in danger of accidents such as getting caught in fences or falling into streams. They may also eat less and not drink enough. There is no specific antidote – the main treatment is getting affected animals off the ryegrass pasture and onto some other type of feed or safe ryegrass.

There are many other causes of staggering, tremors and abnormal behavior – if you are not sure, it is best to get the vet out – sooner rather than later!

FACIAL ECZEMA

Facial eczema is caused by a fungal toxin in grass and results not only in skin disease but also liver damage and consequent ill-health/poor production. Animals can show no signs at the time of eating affected grass then die from liver failure several months later. There is no specific treatment for facial eczema so remember to prevent disease with zinc supplements or at least do grass spore counts through autumn until the end of May. You can do your own counts or bring your pasture samples in for us to do.

TRACE ELEMENT TIME

Now is the time to be supplementing ewes and rams with trace elements and vitamins to maximize reproduction success. Adequate daily intake of trace elements is required for maintaining good health and resistance to disease in all species. But at times of high demand or stress (such as pregnancy) daily requirements can be greater than what is obtained from feed and the diet should be supplemented. Iodine, selenium and cobalt are key elements for stock health. Zinc and vitamins A, D and E are also important. Talk to Joe in the clinic for more information about supplementing your stock for healthier ewes and lambs this autumn, winter and lambing season.

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
