We located every weed imaginable and as the area had some steep patches, we did linger longer over our cuppa to catch-up and also discuss our own properties and gardens.

Dorothy Hole our planting co-ordinator, mentioned that with many "chance" conversations within our community she has been delighted at the many new folks to our Village, who are planting natives, on their land or as part of their garden landscaping. Also many established gardens, when replacing older trees are also trending this way. Such a buzz, as of course, this also leads to more birdlife visiting.

Doug's Tui Feeder, here at Windlesham Place has on average 12 or more regulars and to watch their antics in any garden can lift the spirits indeed. One morning I had to do a double blink when I noticed the feeder on a very distinct lean, only to find a Kereru (NZ Wood Pigeon) enjoying a rest!!!

The months of October/November should see us busy preparing the sites at Robson's and Faulkner Bush Scenic Reserves for our intended 2023 continued native plantings of these areas. For Robson's (all going well) this should finish off what the society had envisaged for the rejuvenating of this area, to the way it was - "back in the day". But as always we "babysit" checking on all the plantings and of course we do lose a few, so these as time and our funds permit do get replaced. # **Team Heyward Property Talk**

### Selling your Investment Property

with Jilly Perry

We have seen an increase in the sale of tenanted properties lately. So whats the best way to go about the sale of a rental? Do you give the tenants their notice prior to sale or allow them to stay on during the sale process? As always, its situational and worth talking to your trusted advisors about as there are pros and cons to each approach.

### Pros of Selling while Tenanted

An obvious advantage is for the tenants who can stay in their home for longer and may be able to carry on the tenancy with a new owner. It also means you keep your rental income over the sale period. Retaining the tenants may make the property more attractive to investors – it shows it's a viable investment, and they don't need to spend time finding new tenants. Selling a furnished house also gives buyers looking for their own property a good idea of space and liveability of a home.

### Pros of Selling a Vacant Property

If you have any major renos or repairs, it may be easier to do with the property vacant. Open homes and viewings are also obviously easier to arrange in a vacant property which can sometimes make the sale process faster.

### Things to consider if you decide to sell a tenanted property:

\* Communication is key. Tenants will likely find this process stressful especially in an area like ours where good rentals are hard to come by and the lingering doubt on if they can stay or not after the sale will be tough. Ensuring they are informed at every step of the process helps ease the stress. Forming a strong relationship with your tenants is helpful. It's essential to let your tenant know at the beginning of the process, so they are aware of their rights and responsibilities – you must advise them in writing. We recommend you visit the tenant in person if possible so you can discuss the process and answer questions with them. It may be you also consider a rent reduction to recognise the inconvenience.

\* Permission needs to be granted from your tenant for you and your real estate agent to access the property. Tenants can't unreasonably refuse access, but they can set conditions about access to the property. They can limit access to specific times and days, and they can ask to be present at open homes – it is also within their rights to refuse open homes at the property. Most tenants are very accommodating if you are very clear in your communication throughout the process and so long as you give fair notice. You also need permission from the tenant before publishing marketing that includes any photos of their possessions.

\* When the property has been sold, you must tell the tenant the name of the new owner and when they will take over the property. You must also give the new owner a copy of the tenancy agreement. Different rules apply when a rented property is sold by mortgagee sale. Tenancy Services can help further in this situation.

#### What happens if the new owner wants the tenant to stay?

If the buyer wants the tenant to stay, the agreement for sale and purchase should specify this. The new owner, or their property management company, becomes the landlord. If the tenant is staying and the buyer requests a pre-settlement inspection, all parties, including the tenant must first agree to the inspection. You can collect rent until settlement day. If your tenant has paid rent in advance, you will need to pass this on to the buyer. If Tenancy Services hold the bond, you and the new owner must complete and return the Tenancy Services Change of landlord or agent form. If you hold the bond and pass it on to the new owner, you will not be able to make any claim on the property after settlement.

#### What happens if the new owner wants vacant possession?

*Periodic tenancy:* If the buyer doesn't want the tenant to stay on and wants them to leave before settlement, it is your responsibility to give your tenant at least 90 days' written notice to end the periodic tenancy so the house will be empty for the buyer. This may affect the settlement date for the property sale.

*Fixed-term lease*: If settlement occurs during the term of the lease, the property must be sold with the tenancy and tenants in place. The buyer then becomes the new landlord for the rest of the fixed-term. You may be able to sell the property empty if the tenant agrees, in writing, to end the fixed-term early.

Sharyn talked about how she makes her products and what she sells on her online store. After that everyone looked around and made their purchases.





# **Higgins Heritage Park Happenings**

**Monday 2nd January Annual Community Craft Fair** – For stall sites enquiries – please email craftfair@higginsheritagepark.co.nz. This is a fun day for all with museum activities, rides and steam up.

It was very pleasing to see so many people up at the park and enjoying the two days of the Transport Fest including the fantastic demos of the Wakefield Community Police and Fire services; and again on the 28th at the MOPARS National Rally vehicles display.

It is an often-forgotten fact that steam driven machinery and engines were an important and stand-out part of our local Nelson district and New Zealand's history during the 1850's to the 1920's.

Higgins Heritage Park Member Group, Pigeon Valley Steam Museum, proudly displays a large range of steam engines and operates the traction engine trailer rides. Our small 5HP Fowler traction engine was built in 1904 and spent its working life locally in the Moutere district. Traction engines were produced in the early 1900's and used for moving heavy loads, logging, ploughing, providing power to operate machinery such as threshing machines or fitted with broad wheels for building roads. They have a maximum speed of approx. 2.5 miles per hour.

Come and check out some of the steam machinery which was used to; drive milking machines for a 100 cow herd during 1909 – 1922; for the lighting generator, pea machine, jam making at Kirkpatrick's; a number of logging and milling timber operations; and more.

Local companies who used steam machinery included:

• The Union Steam Ship Company with steam driven boats at Nelson between 1878-1894 being a vital link for our developing district and country.

• In 1881 Samuel Kirkpatrick established his food processing company in Nelson. They processed jams, canned fruit, tomato soup, vegetables and meat and later coffee, spices and cartons of hops with its "K" brand on many of its tins and jars until it closed in 1971

• The Anchor Shipping & Foundry Company which operated from 1866 to 1986 as the mainstay of Nelson's heavy engineering industry

# **Town and Country Vet**

Here's some info about a few poisonings that we see reasonably often but not many clients seem to be aware of:

### Mycotoxicosis or Fungal Poisoning

There are many different types of fungal poisoning. For example cattle, deer, horses and alpacas can get Ryegrass Staggers when they eat toxins produced by fungi in grass. Cats are usually quite particular about what they eat so fungal poisoning is rare in this species. However dogs will eat anything and are very vulnerable.

The biggest risk for dogs is access to mouldy food but anything mouldy can be a risk eg compost heaps, mouldy horse poo, old chicken food etc.

This type of poisoning can be seen any time of year but is more common when conditions are warm and wet ie spring, autumn and sometimes summer!

Symptoms include staggering/wobbliness, weakness, restlessness, trembling, panting, vomiting, anorexia and seizures. Onset of symptoms is usually rapid. Dogs can be normal when they are let out and come back wobbly within minutes. We have seen dogs seizuring after only 10-15 minutes. A mild case can last for 12-24 hours, a severe case can last for

several days. Treatment varies depending on severity of symptoms. Most dogs need supportive care in hospital until the toxin wears off.

### Ant Bait Poisoning

Cats are the main species we see affected by ant bait, usually when they are let outside after a house has been treated. There are a variety of ant baits available. Some are more toxic to cats and dogs than others. Symptoms are varied but include salivation, vomiting, wobbliness, restlessness, weakness, tremors and convulsions. Treatment is supportive but can be tailored more specifically if we know which poison it is. If you suspect your pet has been exposed to ant bait, it is really helpful if you know the product's brand name or active ingredient and concentration.

### Cannabis poisoning

Unfortunately dogs are more susceptible to the effects of cannabis than humans. So they can be seriously affected if they eat cannabis or are in a room where it is being smoked.

Symptoms include wobbliness, lethargy, drooling, leaking urine and a very slow heart rate. They are anxious and startle easily. In severe cases we see convulsions and coma.

There are two points to providing this information: firstly it's not fun for the dog so preventing access is important, and secondly let us know asap if access to cannabis is a possibility so we can tailor the treatment accordingly.

Our focus is on helping the animal make a full and speedy recovery, not concerning ourselves with who/how/where they got it from.
