How We Adopted a Kakapo

One day Kobie and Elphine were researching on the Department of Conservation website for our bird feeder design project when Elphine came across a thumbnail for Kākāpō adoptions.

When we showed Ms G she said "Share the link to me, we should look further into it." So we did. A few minutes later we showed the class. They thought it was a brilliant idea but we realised we only had a week, so we got to work.

We worked on it in our spare time and made a slide on why we should adopt a kākāpō. We soon haWd an idea of which one we wanted but we found out the one we really, really wanted was \$500. But we knew we had to be realistic and so we aimed for the bronze and hoped for silver.

We wanted a kākāpō so badly but the question was, how would we raise the money in time?

We were all ready to get some work done and Elphine called and said she had Covid, oh nooo! What am I gonna do without her?!

Luckily Tayla was able to help get us up and running. We went to talk to Ruth, the Four Square Manager, to ask if we could sell gingerbread men outside the Four Square on Wednesday. She kindly offered to help us do a raffle and would supply us with a goody basket. This was such a surprise but it meant we had to hastily put together a raffle sheet.

The next Tayla and Kobie arranged to bake gingerbread men after school to sell the next day along with the raffle.

Elphine got back to school on Wednesday, the day Kobie and Tayla were selling the raffle tickets and gingerbread men so she came down to help. The sale started off strong and carried on for a while but it slowed soon after. But we still managed to sell all the tickets and a lot of the gingerbread men.

After a long week, we had successfully managed to raise \$610 (oh my gosh!!), with a combination of raffle tickets, gingerbread men and generous family contributions. It also meant that we were able to purchase a gold level kākāpō.

We decided on Rahotu because as a chick he had been affected by a fungal respiratory infection, called aspergillosis. This adoption is now being processed by the Department of Conservation and we are looking forward to receiving confirmation of this and the rewards in the post next year which include updates on how Rahotu is doing.

The remaining money we are donating to the bird cafe project for the school.

Thank you to everyone who supported us with this project.

Community Centre Steering Group

Needs Analysis Underway [almost complete]

The Waimea South Community Facility Steering Group is a local initiative to build a new centre to replace the village hall and serve the needs of Wakefield/Brightwater and surrounding comunities into the future.

The Steering Group was set up after a public meeting in November 2020, with currently ten members, all Wakefield locals. Our impetus for the project is a commitment in the TDC's Ten Year Plan to create a new community facility 'in the Brightwater/Wakefield area'. This will only become a reality with the backing of the communities themselves.

The group meets monthly and between meetings members work on various aspects of the project.

Work over the last year includes:

- 1. Becoming an Incorporated Society and a Charitable Trust; the Waimea South Community Facility Incorporated Society Charitable Trust Board. Among other benefits, this allows us to raise tax deductible donations, and is a pre-requisite for applying for large grants.
- 2. Talking to local groups and individuals about what they'd like in a new community facility. We're determined to listen to as many locals as we can if you want to have a say, contact one of our members (details below)
- 3. Commissioning a Needs Analysis, a necessary first step towards getting the project off the ground. We are partnering with the TDC and Brightwater Community Association, and have contracted Global Leisure Group to do the work, which has now been completed with the report due out in the New Year.
- 4. Linking with the Brightwater community. We've established a positive partnership with the Brightwater Community Association and look forward to working with them to get the best for the wider community.
- look forward to working with them to get the best for the wider community.

 5. Taking on the management of Window on Wakefield. From October Window on Wakefield moved from the Community Council to the Community Facility Charitable Trust Board. This is the best vehicle to move the publication forward as being a charitable trust with tax exempt status, we are not required to pay tax on profits. This also has a great fit with the objectives of the Trust as we are looking to create a "hub" for the community and we hope that the Window on Wakefield provides that communication "hub" already.

Other work continues to establish the Trust's presence in our community, and you'll hear a lot more about us, and this excellent project, in the months ahead. If you have suggestions or ideas for a new community facility, we'd like to hear from you. Contacts are:

Health Centre


Happy New Year to all our patients. We hope you have had a restful time over the festive period and have been kind to yourself if you have set any resolutions for 2023.

GARDENING SAFELY!

Gardening is a popular pastime here in Aotearoa New Zealand. It keeps you fit, it gets you outdoors and lets you grow your own food however, there are a few hazards that can spoil your enjoyment. Here are a couple of top tips for staying safe in your garden.

Legionnaire's Disease

Legionnaire's disease is caused by an organism that lives in moist conditions and can cause a type of pneumonia. Legionella can be found in compost, potting mix, soil and mulches and you can catch it by breathing in airborne particles.



- · Always read the warning label on bags of compost or potting mix carefully.
- · Gently dampening soil-type products with water helps reduce the amount of dust.

Tetanus

Tetanus is caused by bacteria called Clostridium tetani. These bacteria are commonly found in soil, and the manure of animals such as horses and cows and can enter your body through a wound. Once in your body, the bacteria can quickly multiply and release a toxin, affecting your nerves and causing symptoms such as muscle stiffness and spasms.

- It's important to check with your doctor to make sure you're up to date with your tetanus vaccination.
- Wearing gardening gloves protects your hands from cuts and abrasions and reduces the risk of infections such as tetanus. If you do cut yourself, clean the area thoroughly with warm water. If you return to the garden, ensure the cut is completely covered up. Covering the wound prevents bugs from getting into it and causing an infection. Most cuts, scratches and grazes will heal by themselves after a few days but if you notice signs of infection such as pus, swelling and redness talk to your doctor or pharmacist.
- Closed shoes (not sandals) protect your feet from cuts and scrapes and reduce the risk of injury if you accidentally stand on a sharp gardening tool.

A Matter of Accounts

Happy New Year - I hope that you managed or are managing, some time out for rest and relaxation with whanau and friends.

New rules on GST invoicing apply from 1 April 2023. These changes have been designed for 21st century business record-keeping and modernise invoicing rules in place since 1986, based on paper-based record-keeping systems.

The rules are permissive, so businesses can issue current tax invoices without falling foul of the new rules. However, this doesn't mean you can ignore them. Your suppliers and customers may introduce changes to their systems stemming from the new rules. You need to be ready to cope with receiving 'taxable supply information' in different formats, as opposed to a 'tax invoice'.

What's Changing?

It's important to note there are no changes to the imposition or calculation of GST - these new rules only relate to information requirements.

A major component supporting the GST system's integrity is the provision of prescribed information about taxable supplies contained in a tax invoice. Considerable changes have occurred in business practices relating to transactional information and technology since GST's introduction over 35 years ago, and the new rules reflect this. They are less prescriptive, allowing the way supply information for goods and services is created, provided, and retained to be determined as part of normal record-keeping processes.

From 1 April 2023 businesses must retain a minimum set of information relating to transactions, and are no longer required to issue a 'tax invoice' for GST purposes.

Don't forget, however, that normal commercial and contract law still require invoices and record-keeping requirements. Invoices must still be used to notify the customer of their obligations for a taxable supply, but from 1 April 2023 an invoice will not need to meet the old prescriptive requirements such as displaying the words 'tax invoice'.

What information do I need to keep?

'Taxable supply information' is effectively replacing tax invoices and must be retained and able to be provided.

The information required is dependent on the value of the transaction:

- Requirements around credit and debit notes are similarly revised. Formal GST credit and debit notes will no longer be required, however information known as 'supply correction information' must be retained. This includes information on inaccuracies corrected such as incorrect descriptions of goods or services, places/times of supply or suppliers/customers.
- You must provide supply correction information where the taxable supply information previously provided to a recipient has an incorrect amount of GST, or where you included the incorrect amount of output tax in a GST return. You must provide this information by a date agreed between you and the recipient, or if no date is agreed, within 28 days of the date of the taxable supply information that contained the mistake.

Where the GST shown in the taxable supply information is greater than the eventual GST charged due to a prompt payment discount or an agreed discount which are part of usual business terms, you won't have to provide the supply correction information.

- * Recipient details require the name of the recipient and one or more of the following:
- · Address of a physical location
- Telephone number
- Email address
- Trading name other than the name of the recipient
- New Zealand business number (NZBN)
- Website address

transaction, i.e. whether it's less than \$200, or up to \$1,000 etc. More importantly, you no longer need Inland Revenue approval to use buyer-created taxable supply information (previously required for buyer-created tax invoices). However, both parties to a buyer-created taxable supply arrangement st agree that only the recipient will provide buyer-created taxable supply information and you must record the reasons, if they are not part of the mal terms of business between the parties.

Note any existing Inland Revenue approvals to use buyer-created tax invoices are not affected.

What do I have to do before 1 April 2023?

Even though the new rules still allow 'tax invoices' to be issued after 1 April 2023, it is important to make sure you think about:

- Your accounts payable processes. Do your systems or staff automatically reject invoices which don't have the words 'tax invoice' on them? If so, review this as your suppliers (and customers) may update their systems for the new rules. You may receive invoices after 1 April 2023 which don't have these words on the invoice. The same will apply for credit notes, debit notes and buyer-created tax invoices.
- Your information management systems. Review your systems to ensure supplier and customer databases can handle the taxable supply information requirements, especially recipient information (e.g. physical address and NZBN options).
- Reviewing arrangements with suppliers and customers where buyer-created invoicing is more appropriate. Where you are entering into new buyer-created taxable supply information arrangements, you will need to retain the correct records (including copies of the agreements).
- The time of supply rules. Certain transactions will have a different time of supply to the date the invoice is created. From 1 April 2023, the time of supply must be included in taxable supply information.
- Training your staff on the new rules, including what is required to support GST input tax deductions. As well as a refresher on GST, it will also give you the opportunity to review supplier/customer arrangements and ensure all business/trade terms are current and comply with the new rules.
- Progressing towards if you haven't already. These new GST invoicing rules have been introduced to cater for technology and business processes. More efficient invoicing processes could benefit your business.

April 2023 is not that far away. Please contact us to help you assess what your business may need to do before then!
