Top of the South Dark Sky Committee

Residents of Wakefield and the rural area will be interested in the following presentation to the TDC full Council Meeting on July 20th at 09:30am. I was speaking on behalf of the Top of the south Dark Sky Committee:

"When the International Dark sky Park was established at the Wai-iti in July 2020 it was on the basis of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Tasman District Council (TDC) and the Top of the South Dark Sky Committee, and shown community support. The MOU was signed by Council in June 2019 and would fully come into force on ratification of the Park. That Ratification happened 3rd of July 2020. The council agreed to recognise the designation over the reserve and include in the management plan, policies that would protect the dark sky status.

The Dark sky committee agreed to maintain a measurement programme to follow the evolution of light pollution in the area and assert that the night sky quality is not degrading. In the 2022 report submitted to the International Dark Sky Association in January 2023, the Committee recorded a rise in light pollution for the first time in the six year measuring programme. Light pollution had risen from a steady 21.52 to 21.47 for the 2022 year. While a small drop it is a significant percentage of growing light pollution at the park.

The area of greatest concern is this years readings to date are indicating a much larger drop to around 21.00- 21.10 and sometimes lower. The drop in reading by .5 that we are now looking at this year is 1.5 time lighter than in 2020, an increase of 150% in just three years. If this trend continues the park will lose its Dark Sky status in the next few years. That would be a catastrophic failure.

We are yet to establish the source of the growing light pollution but we assume it is the community growth in Berryfields, the industrial area and Richmond south, Brightwater and Wakefield. And the use of 4000k LED's in growing street lighting.

We are calling on the Council to urgently remedy this situation by the following:

- 1. To help us identify and remedy any and all sources of this growing light pollution in the area.
- 2. To introduce urgently the management plan to protect the park as agreed.
- 3. Retro fitting fully shielded 2200k Amber Phosphors LEDs that are night friendly lighting in areas mentioned.
- 4. If you can give us any guidance, help or support it would be appreciated.
- 5. We are aware of the lighting report done for Council by Rueben Peterson, on Light. It would be very helpful if those recommendation could now be implemented urgently to protect our night skies. This is happening so quickly that if it is not mitigated now the Dark Sky Park will be lost. Please help us with this urgent and quickly growing problem in any other way you are able. Thank you.",

While this report was made to council, it is of interest to all the community in and around Wakefield and further north. Lights 25km away affect the quality on the natural night sky above you.

To help us preserve the Park, and its international reputation:

- · Think carefully if your outside lights, spotlights, yard lights are necessary.
- If so, then please use as little light as possible to do the job.
- Choose any soft or amber coloured light.
- Fully shield the light so all light is directed down.
- · Switch the light off or use a timer so they are only on when needed.
- To use light for art or for aesthetic reasons is only adding to light pollution.
- If you go outside on a clear night and can't see the milky way from your place you have a light pollution problem.

Join the dark sky movement, switch off the lights and look up and enjoy the amazing view.



Waimea South Historical Society

On 25th July a group of Historical Society members were welcomed onto the premises of Stonehurst Farm in Haycock Road, Hope, by Xavier Birch, a son-in-law of the Max Family who have owned Stonehurst Farm since about the time of the marriage of Albert Edward Max and Clara Stanfield Haycock in 1905.

Xavier is a Leather Craftsman and his workshop is situated in the loft above the original stables that were built in the 1860's. Xavier is passionate about history and traditional methods and was proud to inform us that his children are the seventh generation of the Max family to have lived on Stonehurst Farm, as his wife Chloe is the daughter of the current owners Laurence and Suzanne Max.

Xavier explained that his interest in leathercraft began when, as a young man, he took up Falconry as a sport in both Australia and England and upon his return to New Zealand, as the Manager of the Falcon Breeding and Falconry Centre in Marlborough, where New Zealand's native falcon, known as Karearea, are used to control pests in Marlborough's vineyards.

Whether it be for work or sport, each falcon is required to be fitted with a specially crafted leather hood which is made from very soft leather and are designed to be removed with one hand and one's teeth whilst the falcon is perched on the other gloved hand. The craftsmanship required to make these hoods is an artwork and from these humble beginnings, Xavier has developed a leather workshop that produces a wide range of leather goods, such as belts and bags and much more, to a very high standard. He makes goods to order as well as selling them at the Nelson Markets.

The workshop itself is a neat display of rolls of leather, mostly sourced within New Zealand, and rows of old specialist tools as well as heavy duty sewing machines, one treadle machine being 122 years old. The machines are Singers and an Adler, which is a German brand.

The tools and machines have been purchased or donated over a period of time and Xavier uses them all just as the Master Craftsmen from times gone by have done and he is one of only a few leather craftsman still operating in New Zealand.

A trip to these unique premises is like taking a trip back in time and leaves one with a deep sense of nostalgia for the past as well as admiration that these skills from a bygone era have not been forgotten.

Thank you Xavier for allowing us a glimpse into your special world.





Live Well Stay Well

Amy Paterson - Career Firefighter in Nelson and Volunteer Firefighter in Wakefield: Talk about her experiences

On Tuesday 22nd of August a group of twelve members of the 'Live Well Stay Well' group were mesmerised with a presentation from Amy Paterson, a career firefighter from the Nelson Fire Station as well as a volunteer with the Wakefield Brigade. Amy was accompanied by her four month old son Angus and while his mum talked he was attended to by several volunteer Nanas. Amy grew up in Greymouth on the West Coast and then began her working life as an Outdoor Instructor at the Boyle River Outdoor Education Centre in the Lewis Pass region. Following this she travelled to the USA for kayaking and rafting experience.

Upon returning to New Zealand she trained to be a Primary School Teacher and taught at Amuri Area School then Brunner Papanui School in Dobson near Greymouth. While there she was asked if she would consider joining the Dobson Volunteer Fire Brigade. They not only dealt with fire brigade duties but also competed in 'inter-fire brigade' competitions, the physical nature of which appealed to Amy. She enjoyed it so much that in 2018 she decided to apply to become a career firefighter. After moving to Wakefield she also became a Wakefield Volunteer Fire Fighter.

After filing an application the applicant is asked to provide examples of life experiences where they have had to deal with stressful situations. They are then given an 'on-line' Logic Test followed by a physical test, including dealing with a 'black-out' situation, in either Wellington or Christchurch. This is followed by a thirty minute exam and a 'PAC' day concentrating on team building and communication.

Successful applicants attend a twelve week course in Rotorua as part of a 24 person group from throughout New Zealand. As well as hands-on training, they must take weekly exams. Firefighting skills are taught as well as learning about fire behaviour. It takes two more years of study and experience before an officer can be called a Senior Fire Fighter.

Nelson is the only fire station in the Top of the South that employs career firefighters. All other stations are manned by volunteers only. Volunteers are also required to attend a seven day training course and must attend weekly practices and pass regular exams. Some stations are also trained as First Responders and although Wakefield fits into this category, Nelson does not as their premises are next door to the St John's Ambulance Nelson base.

The Nelson Station operates four watches with 10 people in each watch with a combination of night and day shifts. When on night shifts they can sleep between calls and each has their own room. During day shifts they continue with study, training, maintenance and gear checking, home and fire safety visits and school visits. Fire fighters operate in teams of two and there are 10 women based in Nelson who are on an equal footing with the men. The first professional woman in New Zealand was in 1981.

A volunteer brigade cannot leave the station to attend a call unless there is an Officer as well as a trained Driver for the Fire Engine. Retired volunteers often provide a crucial support role and will make sure the station is secured after it has left to attend a call and will often deliver refreshments if the crew are away for a period of time. Amy was thanked on behalf of the Live Well Stay Well Group for her very interesting,

professional and informative presentation.














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


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Town and Country Vet


Wow we're back into lambing and calving already – where has the year gone?!

So here are some tips on calf and lamb rearing...

Calves

The majority of death and disease occurs in the first few weeks of life. The key to successful calf rearing is good hygiene.

- Make sure the calf pen/shed is freshly cleaned and sanitized before putting any calves in it. Many microbes that cause disease can stay in the environment for a long time so make sure they are cleaned away before calves are exposed. Get rid of old hay, bedding and spray with an effective sanitizer that is safe for calves and people. Continue to spray weekly.
- If you breed your own calves, make sure you spray the navel with 10% iodine as soon as



- Provide clean, fresh water at all times. And keep any calf feeding equipment clean and hygienic with regular hot washes.
- Make sure there's enough space for calves to spread out at least 1.5m square each. This helps to reduce chance of sickness and spread of disease.
- Make sure the shed/pen is ventilated but not draughty. Lots of hay makes great warm bedding and jackets are great for keeping calves warm.
- Wearing gloves and disinfecting boots before entering and after leaving the calf pen can help to keep calves disease-free.

- Scours – most often milk/feeding related eg overfeeding, feeding too fast (check teat speed – milk should drip when a bottle is held upside down), new type of milk, different concentration, temperature. Scours can also be caused by infection – often viral. Scouring calves die of dehydration and lack of energy. Electrolytes alone will cure 95% of scouring. We usually alternate electrolyte drinks with milk feeds so calories are still going in.

- If you have really sick calves, high temperatures, blood in faeces or other symptoms such as head tilts, swollen joints, breathing problems, conjunctivitis, call us for advice or a visit.


Lambs

The same general rules apply for lambs:

- Colostrum is very important, ideally within 12 hours of birth. Freezedried colostrum powder can be used. Lamb revivers or stomach tubes can save the life of lambs that are too weak to drink.
- Spray the navel with 10% iodine as soon as possible after birth.
- Make sure lambs are warmed up and kept warm. They will use up all their energy trying to warm up. Bring them inside near a fire or heater but don't overheat them. Lamb jackets are available. It is important that lambs are fed before warming them up.
- Common problems are navel and joint infections and pneumonia. Check navel, joints and breathing and rectal temperature regularly.

Wakefield Fire Brigade

Of the fires we attend 80% do not have working smoke alarms or escape plans

Living rurally, we must be more resilient and better prepared as help is usually further away. Occupants have only three minutes to escape a house fire. Homes in the 1950's took 10-15 minutes to reach fatal temperatures, today it's 3-5 minutes.

Creating a 3-step plan to save your life and that of your family is quick and simple to do. A 3-step plan consists of.

- 1. Have an initial plan for escaping your house.
- 2. Have a second plan in case the first is not possible due to blocked exits or fire preventing your escape (if you have deadlocks, keep the key in them at night)
- 3. Have a dedicated meeting place (often this can be the letterbox or a neighbour's house)

You can create an escape plan by visiting wwwescapemyhouse.co.nz. The plan takes only a few minutes to create and is sent to your email for printing and displaying in a prominent place. It's a great idea to have a practice run blindfolded, this helps to understand how disorientating black smoke is.

Early warning of a fire is directly related to surviving a fire, working smoke alarms are key. It's important to consider your hearing, can you hear the alarm with your hearing aids removed at night? This is an important question, it's easy to run your own experiment by removing the hearing aids and standing behind a closed door, get someone to activate a smoke alarm in another room and if you can't hear it, you are likely to qualify for a Hearing Assistive Technology alarm system (HAT). HAT systems have pillow shakers and strobe lights to alert you to fire and funding is available to supply and install HAT systems, call 0800693473 for an assessment.

As we are still in the clutches of Winter there are some simple steps we can take to prepare ourselves and others to prevent or survive a fire.

- Keep a minimum distance of one metre from a heater. This includes drying clothes, warming, or having a heater too close to curtains or furnishings.
- Keep looking while you're cooking. 1 in 4 house fires start in the kitchen, typically from unattended cooking.
- · Don't be an over-plugger. Overloaded power multiplugs and power points can overheat and easily cause a fire.
- Be careful where you stash your ash. Disposal of fireplace or brazier ash is a common cause of fire, store ash out of the wind, away from your house and in a metal container, preferably with a sealed lid.
- Get your chimney cleaned. Chimney fires are avoidable, cleaning your chimney each season not only prevents fires, but your fire will burn more efficiently and use less wood. Book your sweep before the Winter rush, it's a good idea for locals to combine and get their chimneys swept at the same time to share travel cost especially in remote locations.
- · Turn your electric blanket off before bed.
- Clean the lint from your dryer every cycle.

I hope you all stay warm and safe this as we push through the last of Winter and please don't think you are an inconvenience by asking us to come a do a FREE Home Fire Safety Visit, we love visiting and supporting our community, call 0800693473 to book.



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Homes for Wakefield

Homes for Wakefield (H4W) committee members were surprised to find out on 23rd August that there was a proposal before the Tasman District Council's Strategy and Policy Committee meeting to be held on 24th August which could directly impact Wakefield's future housing development, in terms of housing density, infrastructure and timeframes for development, through the Future Development Strategy.

Our committee is disappointed at the TDC's lack of communication with either Homes for Wakefield or the Wakefield Community Council. We made a submission to the TDC on the proposal in October last year and have been actively keeping in touch with Council to find out when we can have a date to speak to our submission, but were given no opportunity.

Following our discovery, Sonja Lamers (on behalf of H4W) was able to make a presentation to the 24th August meeting asking the Strategy and Policy Committee to defer approval of the proposal until their following meeting on 5 October. Committee members acknowledged the Council's failure to communicate fairly and they approved our request. Several councillors spoke supportively of the need for genuine community engagement prior to making decisions such as these which impact strongly on communities.

H4W's questions and concerns around the proposed change to the Future development Plan are:

- Lack of communication from Council staff
- Lost opportunities for requiring developers to create medium density housing on future housing development in Wakefield, such as the Pitfure Road development
- The TDC deferring improvement in infrastructure necessary to support medium density housing in future housing developments
- Does the TDC want to create a wider zone change in Wakefield (not just for the Pitfure development) and what would that mean for our village?

We would like the TDC planners to explain in layman's terms what the proposal to withdraw the plan means for current and future housing development plans in our village.

Our 2020 H4W survey showed that there is a growing desire amongst Wakefield residents, especially older people, for smaller homes, and that medium density housing would enable this. We are concerned that the proposal currently before the TDC's Strategy and

Policy committee will remove that opportunity and seriously disadvantage our community's future housing options.

TDC staff have scheduled a public consultation session on this matter, which will take place during a meeting of Wakefield Community Council on a date yet to be determined in September 2023.

Homes for Wakefield members urge you to attend the meeting and have a voice in this important matter for our community.






Playcentre's are registered charities run by volunteers so support like this means so much. This is also wonderful timing as we have started doing a lot more cooking on session.

Higgins Heritage Park Happenings

Where has the year gone? Our Higgins Heritage Park Community Craft Fair on the 2nd of January 2024 is just around the corner. Have you booked your site yet?

Our next open days are: 17 Sept, 1 Oct, 15 Oct, 5 Nov, 19 Nov, 3 Dec

Our heritage machinery story this month is about our 14 HP Marshall Dredger Boiler. This unfortunately did not pass certification this month and therefore is in need of a refurbishment – translated, "an expensive overhaul (any donations greatly appreciated)".

Our team are preparing a smaller unit as an interim measure to keep the steam machinery going for this season.

The operational steam driven machines on display at the park include:

- 1. Large Tangy horizonal steam engine, built in the UK. Ran the Karamea Dairy factory.
- 2. Small Tangy horizonal steam engine, built in the UK. Runs the A&T Burt pump via a flat belt. Pump was built in New Zealand in 1880.
- 3. Tangy horizonal steam engine pump, built in the UK.
- 4. Bryan Donkin horizonal engine, built in the UK.
- 5. Bryan Donkin horizonal engine. This engine drives the old workshop machine tools.
- 6. Josehp Evens horizonal steam driven pump. Built in the UK
- 7. Lee Howl horizonal steam driven pump. Built in the UK.
- 8. Anderson vertical steam engine. Operated milking plant on a farm in Maruia area.
- 9. S Kirkpatrick and Co Ltd. Horizonal steam engine. Ran the Nelson jam factory plant.
- 10. Anchor Foundry horizonal steam engine. Built in Nelson.
- 11. Weir Steam Pump. Built in the UK. Used for boiler feed water make up.

The Marshall Dredger Boiler, number 33195 was made at the Marshall, Sons & Co factory in Gainsborough, Lincolnshire, UK. In 1900 it was registered with the official New Zealand boiler number SD10018 by the Southland District Marine Department.

The first NZ owner was the Waikara Forks Gold Company. Gold had been discovered in the north-east Gore area. Over 1 million pounds of gold was reportedly recovered between 1897 and 1926 from the area.



The second owner was a Gore identity, Adam Speden. The Otago Daily Times, issue 20014, 3 February 1927, page 10 wrote "Fingers Severely Injured" "Man and Boy Suffer", that "A man named Adam Speden, a well-known Gore building contractor, was holding on to one of the (Earnslaw's) iron stanchions on the aft of the ship with his left hand, and as the steamer listed against one of the piles of the wharf, Speden's four fingers were caught".

Other owners of the Dredger Boiler were: • Patrick's Soap Works in Christchurch with the boiler being operated at 120psi until 1977 when the plant was then shut down.• Steam Scene at McLeans Island Christchurch • Harry Holmwood Museum at Patons Rock, Golden Bay • Pigeon Valley Steam Museum since 2013.


