

The Addams Family Musical opened on Friday 8th September at the Wakefield Village Hall. It was a joy and a hilarious treat for all who attended. The characterisation was cleverly observed by the entire cast.



The entire cast gave a wholehearted performance. John Amosa as Gomez Addams delighted the audience with his masterful performance and strong singing voice; his comedy timing was superb and had me snort giggling throughout. I particularly enjoyed the acting, singing and screaming, from Sofia Ching as Pugsley. The younger actors playing Wednesday (Loren Martin) and Lucas (Shenae Speedy) did an excellent job with a fairly tricky musical score.

Well-rehearsed and artfully directed, this company knows how to stage an excellent production. The stunning stage set and the quality of the lighting and sound was as good as any you would see in professional theatre. The antics of the chorus, as the ancestors, are well worth watching closely - not least for their imaginative and well-made costumes; they absolutely enhance every scene they are in. Watch out for the cleverly designed torture props and you will love the table decorations - such attention to detail.

The Wakefield Country Players have an excellent reputation for quality theatre, if you don't live nearby, it is well worth the journey into the countryside for any of their productions. I'm told the next show on the horizon is another cracker, Our Man in Havana, a comedy directed by Hugh Neill. It's bound to be worth booking early.

Waimea South Historical Society

Rediscovering the Reay's A presentation by Warwick Johnston

Reverend Charles Lucas Reay was born 25 March 1811 in Liverpool, England, the son of Surgeon William Lucas Reay and Charlotte (nee Robinson). He had gained an MA from Queen's College, Cambridge University in 1834 and had been the Vicar at Swanburne, Buckinghamshire, before travelling to Auckland in 1842 and then continuing on to Nelson with Bishop Selwyn.

Charles' wife Marianne Draper (nee Cook) arrived the following year with her daughter Jane Essex (from a previous marriage to James Henderson Essex) and their adopted son Robert Charles Lucas Reay (son of a friend), and a piano. Their journey out was thwarted by problems with ships which caused a delay in their arrival to Nelson.

Charles travelled to Auckland to investigate but unknowingly Marianne and the children had boarded another boat and were on their way to Wellington. They eventually reunited in Wellington and by the time they reached Nelson Marianne, the children, and her piano had experienced five ship transfers. Marianne was known to have given performances on this piano. Jane Essex was married in Nelson, by her father, to Dr Daniel Pollen and Robert, who returned to England with his mother after the death of Charles, later returned to New Zealand and became a well-known Surveyor.

In Nelson, Charles' mediating skills were put to immediate use and by October 1842 he had been the mediator in four different disputes in Golden Bay. Another dispute involved Maori Chief Paremata Te Wahapiro from Wakapuaka. Paremata disputed the legality of the New Zealand Company land purchase in the Wakapuaka area, known as Happy Valley, and took Marianne Reay, wife of Charles, as a hostage until the dispute was sorted out.

Charles Elliot, a Nelson newspaper editor and local politician, who, as part of the New Zealand Company Settlement Scheme in Nelson, was anti-missionary, incited anger amongst the settlers and organised a large group of armed men to march onto the disputed ground. Meantime Charles Reay had arrived on site by boat and was eventually able to placate both sides which lead to the release of his wife.

Bishop Selwyn appointed Charles as the Resident Minister and Anglican Clergyman for the Nelson Province. He travelled extensively throughout the region by foot, whaleboat, clipper, canoe and horseback visiting such places as D'Urville Island, Golden Bay and Marlborough. In Wakefield, Charles approved the payment of twelve pounds ten shillings from Church funds to support the running of Wakefield School, which had earlier been established by Marianne Baigent.

Marianne Reay became known as New Zealand's first female Architect when she supplied a suitable design for the building of St John's Church in Wakefield. Marianne was not popular with many of the women in Nelson, or the wives of other missionaries, because she was strong-minded and had her own servants.

Before a large congregation on 11 Oct 1846, Rev Charles Reay read the opening sermon at the new St John's Church in Wakefield.

Charles had also been involved, along with Bishop Selwyn, with the establishment and later administration of the Bishop's School in Nelson, though this is rarely acknowledged.

Charles took an unauthorised trip to Sydney to help out a troubled nephew and upon his return received a six month docking of his pay. During this down-time the locals provided the family with food. However this act had enraged many of the Nelson dignitaries and Bishop Selwyn re-located Charles to Rangitukia, East Cape.

He succumbed to an infection and died there on 31 March 1848. His body was buried in secret, close to the mouth of the Waiapu River because the local Maori population did not want his body removed.

Marianne returned to England and had a headstone made and shipped to New Zealand for his gravesite. However it went missing and was located in 1914, in a damaged state in an Auckland garden. It was eventually sent to Rangitukia and it remains beside the Church to this day.

Unfortunately errors have occurred in the recording of Charles' death. Firstly, he was a few days short of his 37th birthday, not 67 as the records show and secondly his place of burial is at Rangitukia not in the Hallowell Cemetery in Nelson. Work is currently underway to rectify this error.

Although he does not receive the accolades he deserves, his place in the history of the Tasman District can be remembered by Reay House in Nelson and in the story of our own Wakefield School and St John's Church.

Megan Riddell - Project Lead for Home Share for Her

The Live Well Stay Well group welcomed, social worker Megan Riddell, who is the Project Lead for Home Share for Her, to our meeting on 26th September. This is a not-for-profit organisation, started by women from Nelson Tasman, in response to the increasing needs of women in our region. Housing in Nelson Tasman is unaffordable for many single women. Home Share for Her aims to connect women with homes, to women who are looking for housing and to support them to establish an affordable, safe, secure, medium to long term tenancy.

Megan said women living alone often experience loneliness, financial insecurity and struggle with the practicalities of managing a large property. Many women like the idea of sharing their house with another compatible woman, but find the process of advertising and interviewing for potential housemates daunting.

Home Share for Her is a safe and secure website about to be launched very soon, for women to connect with each other. Owners and seekers will be able to put their profiles up. They also provide useful advice, resources, and templates you can use to help with reference checking, interviews, and setting up your home sharing agreement.

I can only say that 23 years ago when our Society was the new kid on the block, we had, and still have, an incredibly amazing team of volunteers. Sadly, many of the "old" team have passed away.

Looking back, Doug South, our President, set goals for short and long term plans in 2018:

Doug's vision, for achievable working project plans, to hopefully, future proof our three Scenic Reserves, for many generations to come. Today you can but marvel at these visual supreme efforts.

Chris Tonkin - Consultant - Where to from here? (ie semi retiring gracefully)

Two major factors have prompted a review of the voluntary work typically undertaken by the Society over the past 23 years. First is the fact that volunteer numbers have both declined and, on average, aged. The reality is that while Wakefield Scenic reserves are highly valued and receive huge public use, nowadays, for a variety of reasons, fewer younger community members are willing to volunteer their time on a regular basis.

Secondly, with planting at the three local reserves now largely completed, the establishment phase has switched to maintenance in the form of weed control, track maintenance and associated minor works. Tasman District Council administers the reserves, and with future proofing in mind the Committee sought a Memorandum of Understanding to clarify 'who does what' going forward.

The council declined the MOU approach but did provide a written commitment to the management and maintenance requirements that will be necessary to conserve these valuable community assets.

As to the Bush Society's future. Members will be free to volunteer their time on minor maintenance without the unrelenting pressure to keep up with seasonal tasks. At the same time the regular social contact that is an important consideration for long-term participants will be preserved, leaving the Society's main priority to be keeping the Council up to its word.

Gowan Simpson - Vice President - 23 Years On - An Overview

23 years on from the inception of the Wakefield Restoration Bush society, it is timely that we step back and look at what has been achieved over those years. Under the inspired guidance of Doug and Evie-Joy South and many other long-standing members [some of whom are unknown to me as I've only been involved with the group for six years], the three scenic reserves have flourished.

This year saw the final planting over the winter months of Robsons Scenic Reserve and Faulkner's Bush Scenic Reserve. Robsons in particular has been most satisfying for me personally as I recall the barren state of the reserve when we first began. The understorey had

Where do we go from here you may ask – we carry on looking after all we have planted and hope the Wakefield community and others enjoy and treasure the three wonderful reserves we have.



Just recently Margaret umpired at the World Championships held in Queensland, Australia.


This is a great honour for Margaret as well as the Wakefield Bowling Club.

Well done Margaret, world famous in Wakefield!









Fleas - again!

Spring has arrived! Unfortunately spring also brings those nasty little pests we know as fleas.

Though fleas can survive the winter under the right conditions, there is no doubt that the increased temperature in spring causes an increase in the numbers of these pesky insects.

Prevention is better than cure when it

comes to fleas. If you wait to see fleas on your pet then there is already an established population of fleas (and eggs and larvae) in your house and garden.

Remember when you treat a pet for fleas, the product is not only killing any fleas on them but prevents more fleas jumping on board. We now have flea products for cats and dogs that last for three months and even longer, so it's easy to keep pets protected and your house flea-free throughout the year with very little effort.

Getting the right treatment for your pet is best sorted at your vet clinic. We can help you understand the flea life cycle and give you the best advice and products to stop it. Over time some older products have become less effective but there are many alternatives available including topical drops, oral tablets, sprays and collars. Fireworks

Move your pet into a familiar room and close curtains before sunset. Then play music or turn on the TV before fireworks start. Having another pet in the room that isn't fearful can help a scared pet relax. And if possible, it is better to remain relaxed and matter-of-fact yourself rather than stressing about your pet's behaviour and behaving anxiously.

"Before you criticize someone,

walk a mile in their shoes. That

way, you'll be a mile away and

you'll have their shoes."

If you plan ahead, Adaptil and Feliway are very helpful for reducing stress but have to be started at least a week or two before they're needed.

Rescue Remedy, Calmex and similar remedies may also help when started ahead of time. Thundershirts are effective for many pets. Sometimes we prescribe medication to help calm pets – this requires a checkup in the clinic and should also be done ahead of time.




The risk and impact of wildfire is increasing in New Zealand due to climate change, but also how and where we are living. We are seeing an increase in the frequency of significant wildfires in New Zealand over the last 3-4 years.

Large wildfires like the 2017 Port Hills, 2019 Tasman, 2020 Lake Ohau, 2021/2022 Waiharara fires occur every 1-2 years, resulting in significant impact and losses. In addition, many of these significant wildfires are happening in the shoulder months rather than the typical summer period.

We have seen plenty of evidence of the devastation in 2023 overseas with fires in Canada, Spain, Maui, Greece, and Algeria. Now is the time to start looking at your own property and seeing how you can be safe before the oncoming summer season. Over the next few months, we will give you some tips and information to help you out.

Fire Safety Tips

- Create safety zones around your house to act as a barrier against fire.
- Plant low flammability plant species around buildings.
- Keep your lawn mown and well irrigated, your gutters and roof clear of debris, and choose low flammability plants.
- Make sure your driveway clearance is at least 4 meters wide and 4 meters high to allow access for emergency vehicles.
- Ensure there is easy access to water for firefighting.



• Check the wildfire risk regularly, and think about when you do particular activities to reduce the risk of an accidental fire. Ensure you have working smoke alarms in the house and garage. If you need some help with installation or advice on where to place them, we can help. Call 0800 693 473 and one of our local team will call back and arrange a time to visit.

Landscaping for Wildfire Safety

- · Landscaping with low flammability plants can reduce the impact of wildfire around your home and other buildings.
- Choosing less flammable plants can starve a wildfire of fuel, reducing the fire intensity and helping protect your home and buildings from intense heat.
- Avoid using pea straw and bark mulch in gardens especially around the home and other buildings as these mulches are easily ignited and can help a wildfire to spread.
- · What is a low flammability plant? Low flammability plants aren't fireproof but are less likely to catch fire. They generally have moist, supple leaves,

low levels of sap or resin, and watery sap without much smell. They also have little dead wood or dead material inside the plant. A number of New Zealand's native tree and shrub species have low or low-moderate flammability, and are therefore ideal for planting around your property.



There has been a greater need for urgent care and acute appointments, and we continue to be full up with patients and tightly manage who we can see.

We triage (manage) many of our appointments through our clinical team so we can best respond on a clinical need basis. This will involve getting a call from a doctor or a nurse and it is important that you have your phone available and answer our call which will show as "Private Number" on your phone.

We have also seen an increase in the number of patients who do not turn up for their booked appointments, which in view of our lack of appointments will certainly mean we could have seen someone else. If you are not going to be able to make it, please call us with as much notice as possible and we will be able to see another patient. Even if you can only give us short notice, an hour for example, please still call us.

Some clarification for Repeat Prescriptions. Once we have received your request it will take up to 48 working hours to issue the prescriptions. If you request an urgent prescription this will take up to 24 working hours. By far the best way with your medication is to put a request in a week in advance of when you will need it. This can be done by phone or through the portal or even come and speak to our receptionists at the Practice.

Wakefield Village Kindergarten



we have seen many tamariki setting themselves challenges and persevering until they achieve their desired outcome.



Our heritage machinery story this month is from the Nelson Vintage Engine & Machinery Club, and features Barry's immaculately restored Lister CS3/1, 3.5 hp @650 rpm diesel engine.

The CS engine is a water-cooled single cylinder indirect injection diesel with a 3.75" bore, 5.5" stroke with a 1000cc rating. It was manufactured in 1949 and it is believed that it had originally been operating a water pump in the Christchurch area.

Lister stationery engines were built by RA Lister & Company of Dursley Gloucestershire, UK between 1926 – 1965 and are well known as slow running, reliable and durable engines.





The Lister engines are very suitable for driving electric generators / lighting plants and irrigation pumps and are traditionally painted in a midrange of Brunswick Green.

Barry's restoration included a complete strip, clean and overhaul with new rings, valves, bearings etc along with a new trolley, this restoration earning him a first place at the recent Vintage Engine & Machinery Club show.
