

Gas BBQ, Cooker and Heater Safety Tips

Planning to use your Gas BBQs, cookers or heaters?

- Check the weather: Light your gas burner on a day when the fire danger is low, and the
 weather forecast is for little to no wind.
- Check your local council rules and bylaws: there may be additional rules about gas BBQs, cookers, and heaters on public conservation land.

Setting up and lighting your BBQ, cooker or heater

- Check for damage or debris: Before using your gas BBQ, cooker or heater, check for any signs of damage or wear, and for gas leaks.
 Make sure it is clean.
- Set up on a stable surface: Put your BBQ, cooker or heater in a sheltered spot on a flat, stable surface outside, well away from anything that could catch fire.
- Keep a method to extinguish nearby: Have a suitable way to extinguish the fire within easy reach, such as a fire extinguisher.
- Use in an open, well-ventilated area: Using a BBQ, cooker or heater in an enclosed or confined space can cause carbon monoxide to build up, which is extremely dangerous.
- Keep unused gas bottles or canisters five metres away: Any gas storage that isn't being used should be at least five metres away from the source of heat.
- · Keep kids and pets away: Have a no-go zone for kids and pets.
- Refuel gas cookers in a safe area: When refueling your gas cooker, let it cool down, move it to a safe, well-ventilated spot (away from anything flammable) and refuel it on the ground.
- · Never leave it unattended: Stay with your BBQ, cooker, or heater until you turn it off.

Putting out your BBQ, cooker or heater

- · Cool down completely: Give your BBQ, cooker or heater time to cool down completely before moving it or putting the cover on.
- · Turn off the gas bottle first: This allows gas to clear from the hose.
- Store the gas bottle upright: Keep it connected to the BBQ, cooker or heater.

The Wakefield Community Council has been busy these last few months, engaging and liaising with the Tasman District Council as well as the Wakefield community. Projects include the Faulkner Bush playground, and working in partnership to get a rubbish bin installed at Robson Reserve. Tasman District Council is currently undertaking early engagement on three bylaws; Public Places, Dog Control and a proposed Cat Management bylaw. These will be active until 14th December. TDC are hoping to have a wide range of feedback to help inform the draft bylaws, which will then be made available for consultation in mid 2024.


Also, the Brightwater-Wakefield Catchment Management Plan is open for feeback and discussion. The study is to look at stormwater issues in both of these communities, as well as potential solutions that can be put in place to address them. We'll look at stormwater flooding, water quality issues, development pressures, environmental protection, and other similar issues as they relate to stormwater. Patronage on the eBus network has continued to grow, with October patronage increasing 6,721 from September. The Wakefield route increased by 56%. All routes 1 - 6 have increased month on month - eBus patronage has increased 71% in the first three months. It's good to see bus patronage continuing to rise month by month since the launch on 1st August. This reflects the fact that people are liking the new eBuses and increasingly using the service.

We would like to thank the Wakefield Community for your ongoing support in seeing Wakefield blossom in our proactive, driven and open Community Council. With the strength of love we stand together. With greater numbers of people, we can achieve more.



Town and Country Vet

Getting Pet-Prepared for Summer!

Yippee, summer is here! Here are some things to think about for our pets to avoid any unexpected complications and enjoy the summer:

- If you are going away, are your pets' vaccinations up to date? Vaccinations for respiratory viruses in cats, and Parvovirus plus Canine Cough in dogs must be up to date in order to stay in boarding facilities. Call us for advice if you're not sure and don't leave it until the last minute!
- If you are going away leave contact numbers for your vet as well as your mobile phone number with your pet carer. Have a chat so it's clear what your expectations are for your pet if something goes wrong, especially if you are not able to be contacted. Phone us if you would like to add any details to your client record. If you are taking your pet with you, remember all their bits and pieces including any medication.
- Most of us know that chocolate is poisonous for dogs. If your dog eats chocolate, phone us promptly for advice. Remember dogs are very good at finding the wrapped chocolate under the tree!

Little do people know. Santa first tried cats

- barbecue, fish hooks/fishing line (often attached to a fish!) and potentially obstructive food such as chop bones, corn cobs and peach stones.
- Take care giving your dog leftovers from the BBQ or roast bones, large amounts of fat and onions can all cause serious internal problems for dogs. Grapes, raisins and sultanas can be poisonous for dogs so no Christmas cake either!
- Another food-related hazard is old food that your pet might find in compost heaps, rubbish bins and out on walks. There are millions of weird microbes growing in these places that if eaten by your pet (especially dogs) can cause all sorts of symptoms from tummy upsets through to poisoning and seizures.
- Toxic algae are a warm weather hazard in our rivers. It's safest to avoid the rivers in summer and head to the beach instead.
- Heatstroke is common over summer especially in short-nosed dogs. NEVER leave dogs in the car on a hot day, even in the shade with windows down. Offer frequent drinks/stops on journeys. Restrict exercise to cooler parts of the day. Limit the length of walks especially for young energetic dogs, old dogs and dogs with medical problems. Provide shade for dog kennels and rabbit/guinea pig cages.
- Clipping long haired pets can prevent problems such as overheating, soiling, skin infections and grass seed problems. We often clip the underside/belly of long haired cats, and advise clipping under ears and around the feet of long haired dogs. Some long haired dogs

which aren't traditionally clipped (eg Border Collies) are much more comfortable and active, even if they do look a bit odd!

- Check your dog's paws, ears, 'armpits' and groin daily for grass seeds. This is particularly important for fluffy dogs especially spaniels, poodles and all their crosses. It may seem a hassle to do this but it can be an expensive, time-consuming and painful process to find grass seeds once they are inside your dog!
- Warm weather accelerates development of flea eggs and larvae so flea prevention is important. We have many products available to suit your pets and their lifestyle. Some products now last six months or more so it's easy to keep your pet and house flea-free.

Step Out - A Guided Historic Walk

On Tuesday 24th October 2023 an enthusiastic group of between 65-75 people gathered on the Village Green to hear stories about some of Wakefield's interesting and colourful history.

The Wakefield Historic Walk was part of a vibrant festival titled 'Step Out' which was jointly conceived by Tasman District Council, Nelson City Council, Te Whatu Ora, Neighbourhood Support, and Health Action Trust, with the aim

of getting people out and about within their communities to enjoy a series of guided walks and other activities.



Peter Verstappen acted as the Master of Ceremonies and did an excellent job of keeping things running to schedule. Four members of the Waimea South Historical committee, namely Roger Batt, Margaret Clark, Kathleen Dearnley and Yo Tye, had researched and prepared presentations in advance for the selected places of interest.

First on the list was the Rose Shepard Sculpture on the village green. In 2004 Rose, an artist and a resident of Wakefield from 1987 until about 2013, was asked by the Wakefield Ratepayers Association (a pre-curser to the Wakefield Community Council) to create a sculpture that represented the character of the village. The stunning artwork fittingly displays named depictions of the native podocarp forest that once covered the entire region, examples of which are still evident in our many parks and reserves. Rose was assisted by local potter Meg Latham who made and fired the tiles for the structure.

Next were the old Railway yards and Railway Station, once located in the Whitby Way Car Park and in the area of the Police Weighbridge across the main road. The construction of the railway line began in Nelson in 1873 and in 1876, the line, running through Wakefield to Foxhill, was opened, after which the line was continued on to the Gowan River, beyond Glenhope. The extension required to join this line to the rest of New Zealand was never completed for a number of reasons and the 68 kilometre gap is still a sore spot for many. The line ceased operation in 1955.

Next was the story of the sombre and dignified marble statue which is Wakefield's Soldiers Memorial. After WWI a committee was formed to fund raise for its construction. It was originally placed in the Wakefield Domain and was unveiled on 5 Aug 1922. However in 1993 it was relocated to its present position to be alongside the War Memorial Plunket Rooms, and was rededicated on ANZAC Day in 1994.

The history of the Plunket Rooms was next. In 1907 Dr Truby King founded the Plunket Society in New Zealand and a branch was established in Wakefield in 1913 with a group of local women forming a committee which organised fundraising and speakers to address the local meetings. The meetings were held in various premises including the old St John's School Building, the old Library and the Temperance Hall until after WWI when it was decided to demolish the original old Painton's Store that had since become Hodgson's Store, and to build the War Memorial Plunket and Rest Rooms on the site. They were opened on ANZAC Day 1955. In 1990 the Plunket Rooms moved to the new Wakefield Health Centre and the old building became the Wakefield Community Library.

The Wakefield Community Hall then took centre stage. It too has an interesting history that involved two fires. An Oddfellows Hall, opposite the Hotel and Sweetbites, was built pre 1871 but burnt down in 1898. A new one was built but the old Temperance Hall beside the Hotel, part of which remains as the Sweetbites building, was also used as a community hall. In 1936 George Robertson ran the re-built hall as a recreational building until post WWII when the Manchester United Oddfellows bought it. In 1965 the Wakefield Public Hall Association purchased the Hall and added a supper room. In 1968 the Hall burnt down again, but the second Painton Store, which still stands today, was saved from the same fate by a firewall having been built to fulfil Council regulations when the hall was being altered.

The present site was then purchased and the new hall was opened in 1971 after a tremendous fundraising effort within the community. In 1988 the ownership of the hall was transferred to Waimea County Council which later evolved into Tasman District Council. Unfortunately this hall does not meet the current earthquake building standards and plans are underway to build another community hall facility.

The Villa, at 14 Whitby Way, was built as a house in the 'Villa' style in 1910 by the McPherson family who were a large and successful building company in Wakefield at the time, and McPherson family names remained on the Title until 1985. Since then several other people have owned the building. It served as a home then became an Antique Shop. The building in front was then built and



served as an Art Gallery which sold artworks, giffware etc. In 2016 Michael Meissner, a talented German born chef, took up the leasehold and now runs a very successful Café business that serves as a popular community meeting spot as well as a place for cyclists on the Great Taste Bike Trail for replenishment.

The YMCA building was opened in 1922 and activities such as boxing, wrestling, billiards and ping-pong were practiced there until about 1932 when it was used as a hall which held Flower Shows, Ballroom Dancing, and such things as Ballet and Tap Dancing lessons. It then became a clothing and dressmaking business run by Bill Hedley and Mrs Brooks. It later became a Picture Theatre in which Maurie Lark showed movies until the late 1960's though the last movie was shown in 1972. The small building attached to the western side, now La Niche Hairdressing Salon, acted as the theatre tea rooms and a servery was used to hand out the pop-corn and other confectionary. The Blue Bird Tea Rooms were once also located in this building. McPherson's Building Company eventually purchased the YMCA building so it could used as a timber storage facility.

Next the McPherson Building Company buildings were discussed. John Gordon McPherson was born in Scotland in 1837 and completed a Builder's Apprenticeship there. He had visited New Zealand first before deciding to return. In 1868 he married Lydia Squire, daughter of Wakefield's first government appointed school teacher, and set up a Wheelwright and Carpentry business just south of Wakefield in 1869. The business moved to Whitby Road (now Whitby Way) in 1884.

Many of Wakefield's older homes were built by the company and remain to this day. In 1913 John was called into action to cut through a building (now part of Sweetbites) to sort out a boundary dispute between the Hunt and Hodgson families, an incident that has become one of Wakefield's better known historical stories.

In 1923 John Gordon McPherson died and his son John Squire McPherson continued on with the business.

When the section for the new Wakefield Community Hall was purchased, it necessitated the removal of two buildings, one of which had been the Bell Bird Tea Rooms. This building was re-located and became the new Office for McPherson's and still remains there to this day.



46 Whitby Way is a two storied cottage built around 1915 next to McPherson's Builder's Workshop and alongside the Railway Yards. Its first owner is thought to be Sydney Lewis Higgins followed by Reginald George Sutton then Stephen and Alice Mockett. As well as taking in lodgers, Alice acted as a Midwife and expectant mothers from outlying districts stayed with her so she could care for them before and after the births. They also raised six children of their own in the cottage.

Emily (nee Street) and her husband Alfred Chipperfield purchased the house in 1924. Emily was born in Nelson in 1871 and she trained to be school teacher. She taught at many schools within the district and throughout the South Island. In 1909 she visited her brother in Canada and married Alfred Chipperfield in Seattle the same year. They returned to New Zealand in 1912 where Emily continued her teaching career, ending up at Wai-iti School in 1924. Alfred was a seaman and a builder but his health deteriorated and he became bedridden. On 16 Feb 1932



Alfred used a Smith and Wessen Revolver, which had been displayed on the wall, to commit suicide in the early hours of the morning in the back yard. Local farmer and milkman, Clement Martin Burnett, helped Emily locate Alfred, who was found dead beside the fowl-house. Wakefield's Police Officer, Constable Harraly Carlyon Fitzsimmons and Dr James Robert Closs, were also called to attend this tragic event. The coroner's Inquest concluded that Alfred had died from a self-inflicted revolver shot to the neck while suffering from temporary insanity.

Peter Verstappen then guided the group through McPherson's Way and onto Arrow Street where the first stop was at number 27 Arrow Street. This was another of the McPherson Houses that was built between 1910 and 1920. In 1944 William (Bill) Douglas purchased it from the McPhersons. Bill and his father William were painters and painter-hangers. Bill used his skills as a painter to highlight the ornate features of this house and old photos pay testament to this. Bill also drove buses for Black and White Buses who later sold to NZR Buses, which in turn was sold to Richmond Suburban Buses. Bill drove for all three companies clocking up 38 years of service. The buses were parked alongside McPherson's Way and many older Wakefield residents remember catching a school bus from there and much later Residential Flats were built on the site. In 1968 Keith and Val Inwood purchased the property and Keith, being a descendant of Appo Hocton, New Zealand's first naturalized Chinese person, means there is even more to the story of this house. In 1992 the house was sold again and since then it has changed hands several more times.

24 Arrow Street actually began its life as part of a Public Hall that had been built in 1877 in Wai-iti. The 18 X 9m building was used for concerts, musical performances and for the popular sport of Indoor Roller Skating. However in 1883 William Painton purchased it after it was decided it was not paying its way. William on-sold it and the new owner cut the building in half and transported each half to Arrow Street by traction engine. One half became known as 'Canny Cot Cottage' and was first owned by Mr Humphreys and later purchased by Marion Hastilow, who died there in 1912. Marion has an interesting story of elopement and consequent removal from her father's Will. This cottage was later demolished to make way for the construction of Bastin Terrace. The other half was owned by Francis and Julia Gapper. Julia ded there in 1906 and Francis in 1911. Francis had been a survivor of the Wairau Affray in 1843, an event that holds a significant place in the history of New Zealand. Their daughter Julia married Wakefield Bootmaker James Thomas and their grand-daughter Teresa (Tina) married Ralph Hodgson who together became proprietors of Hodgson's Store (now Four Square).

17 Arrow Street was built between 1940 and 1950 in the Art Deco style. This style had been popularised in France in the 1930's to represent a new fashion statement. However post-depression materials were difficult to come by and concessions were made to the original style. For example this one is constructed out of timber rather than stucco. Flat rooves tended to cause leakage problems and the positioning of the hot water cylinder header tanks on the roof, because of lack of ceiling space, caused pipes to freeze and crack during winter. The first known owners were Phil and Dawn (nee Lammas) Walker. Phil and Dawn had no family of their own but transported Wakefield Primary School pupils in two mini-buses from the eight-eight and Pigeon Valley areas. Phil also drove for 'Black and White Buses' and later drove the 'Workers Bus' to Nelson and back, which was popular during the days of petrol rationing. He was also a car painter and his work area was to the side and at the back of the section. Dawn worked at Hodgson's Store in the Drapery section and together with Phil, was instrumental in reviving the Wakefield Ladies Hockey Team in the 1940's. Dawn died in 2001 and Phil in 2003. They are both buried in Richmond.

13 Arrow St was built in 1940 in the Californian Bungalow style. In had been owned by Leslie Wallace Hodgson and Sydney George Higgins and in 1952 it was purchased by Dr Curt Sally Meyer, a German Jew born in Berlin in 1892. He qualified as a Paediatrician and practiced in Dresden where his assistant/ receptionist was Johanna Marie Boettcher, who was later to become his wife. In 1937 he was imprisoned in a Nazi Concentration Camp. Johanna was able to move to Glasgow where she continued to work as a Doctor's receptionist, and his parents George and Elsbeth were able to move to Sweden. In 1939 Curt was lucky to be sponsored by a doctor in Auckland. This was most likely Dr James Robert Closs, who had likely met Curt whilst furthering his studies in the UK and was later responsible for finding a Doctor's position for Curt in Wakefield. Curt initially practiced from Dr Closs' surgery at Fellbridge House on Pitfure Road but later moved to his own premises at 13 Arrow Street where a room out the back served as his surgery. It is thought he rented this house before purchasing it. Unfortunately, because of the world wars, Curt suffered some discrimination because of his German nationality which caused some distress amongst the local medical fraternity. Curt's father George died in Sweden in 1940 and his mother Elsbeth (Else) moved to live with him in Wakefield. Else died in 1948 and is buried in St John's Churchyard. In October 1947 Johanna migrated to New Zealand and was met in Wellington by Curt. They married in the Wellington Registry Office on 17 June 1947 before returning to 13 Arrow St. Curt died in 1956 and Johanna in 1978. They are buried together in St John's Churchyard.

12 Arrow St was another of the McPherson homes built in the early 1900's and may have served as a 'Show Home' to advertise some of their ornate features such as decorative corners on the roofing iron. Another interesting feature of this home is that it was built across two Blocks, namely Block 5 and 6, the central hallway acting as the dividing line. This home is the perfect property to finish with as it encompasses much of the early history of Wakefield.

Waimea was divided into Sections and Section 85 at Wakefield extended from the Wai-iti River to Pitfure Road and was 210m wide. Many of the early settlers initially 'occupied' areas within this section as the land surveys had not been completed. In 1855 R L Wynyard, a Government Officer, awarded John Norris the title of the land he occupied which included the site of this house. It was then about 2.5 hectares. His daughter Lucy, who arrived as a 10 year old in 1842 on board the 'Bolton' with her family, married Henry John Tunnicliffe in 1852 and was widowed in 1877. The Title for this property, now down to 1.6 ha, was transferred to her name in 1885.


Arrow Street was initially a legal right of way and did not become a legal through road until 1932. Lucy sold off pieces of her property and some of the purchasers have surnames that we have already come across during today's walk such as William Painton, James Thomas, Ernest McPherson, Francis

One does not have to dig deep to discover how the Wakefield Community has been established and built upon. It is a fascinating story that cannot easily be summarised so these stories will appear on our website in greater detail. We

hope you have enjoyed hearing some of our colourful history.
