
#### **Wakefield Kindy**

#### How do we build community resilience?

In 2019 Wakefield experienced one of its most notable disasters when a Wildfire broke out and continued to burn over 2400 ha of land and went from the 5th of February to the 6th of March 2019. This event tested systems from multiple agencies and the Wakefield residents especially when it came to being evacuated; people and animals, causing a great deal of stress for all involved. It doesn't have to be this way.

With all events, reports bring to a head about what went well and what we could do better. Having systems in place for yourself, your family and your animals working alongside a community plan has been the driving force for having the Rural Resilience Expo. This is a chance to listen to guest speakers throughout the day as well as gather information from a variety of exhibitors so you can make informed choices going forward. This will be a relaxed fun day out for all ages.

Some of our Exhibitors: Age Concern, Outpost Supplies, Mini Shakey House, Civil Defence, Climate Forum, Park Rides, Museum sheds open, Nexus Solar, Community Patrol, Fire & Emergency NZ, Food trucks, NZ Defence Force, Kelly Country, NZ Safety Blackwoods, St John, NZ Police, Community water project, Neighbourhood Support and still more registering...

Talks throughout the day: AF8 presentation, Civil Defence - community plan, Food Resilience, NZ Police - safety & security, Sanitation options, Business Resilience, home kill - food safety and possibly a couple more to come.

These will be time-tabled and the schedule available on the Focus Wakefield FB page. We will also have the Wakefield Community bus running throughout the day from the village green.

#### 2019 Tasman fires in numbers

- · 0 human lives were lost
- · 1 helicopter pilot was injured
- · 1 home and shed were destroyed
- 35km fire perimeter
- 65% irrigation allowances for some Tasman growers and farmers is cut by 65% due to the severe drought
- 100 applications for money from the Mayoral Relief Fund
- 150+ firefighters
- 260 Wakefield School children evacuated and set up in a temporary school at Hope Community Church
- 300-400+ volunteers and workers involved in a community support operation based at Saxton Field, Stoke
- 700 livestock and pets were evacuated
- 2400ha Fire Area
- 3,000 people evacuated
- 14,000 animals remained on properties exposed to the fire risk. Although many animals were rescued, some were hurt and had to be euthanized including around 50 sheep
- \$2.3 million donated by the government, the Lottery Grants Board, businesses, communities, groups, and individuals to the Tasman District Council Mayoral Disaster Relief Fund

After four years of no visits, due to Covid 19, it was wonderful to welcome 6 visitors and 8 students from Fujimi Machi back to Tasman District. This Friendly town link is a long-term relationship between the two Councils.

Fujimi Machi is a town in the Nagano Prefecture, Japan. Fujimi is located in a very mountainous area within the Suwa region of east-central Nagano and includes the Akaishi Mountains, including Mount Nyukasa (1955 metres) partly within ins borders. The town has an average altitude of 977 metres. The

average annual rainfall is 1411mm with September being the wettest month. Mayor Natori had requested a visit to a farm in the area and enjoyed getting close to the animals. The visit included seeing the beef cows and calves being fed, watching sheepdogs both Heading

and Huntaway dogs, working sheep, and visiting the woolshed to see lambs being belly crutched.



#### **Menopause Part 2**

#### **Treatment**

At menopause, changes in hormone levels can cause symptoms for many women – for example, hot flushes, mood and sleep changes.

The severity of symptoms varies hugely with about 20% of women having no symptoms at all, 60% having mild to moderate symptoms and the remaining 20% having severe symptoms that interfere with their daily life. The average length of time women suffer these symptoms is seven years.

If symptoms are mild, starting with lifestyle changes may be enough to improve symptoms. If symptoms are more bothersome you may wish to consider medical treatment.

#### Lifestyle changes:

Improving diet, regular exercise and stopping

smoking improve overall wellbeing and can make symptoms easier to tolerate. Some psychological treatments e.g. cognitive behavioural therapy (CBT) and mindfulness may also help

#### **Menopause Hormone Therapy**

Menopausal Hormone Treatment or MHT (previously known as Hormone Replacement Therapy or HRT) is the most effective way of improving menopausal symptoms. MHT can also benefit your health by improving bone density and reducing the risk of fractures.

- MHT can help to reduce a lot of menopause symptoms including hot flushes, night sweats, tiredness, sleep issues, anxiety and vaginal dryness
- MHT is safe to use for most women in their 50s or for the first 10 years after the onset of menopause.
- The added risk for blood clots, stroke and breast cancer while taking MHT is very small, and similar to that for many other risk factors such as being overweight.

#### Non Hormonal Therapy

If you still need treatment, but are unable to or do not want to use menopausal hormone therapy (MHT), there are non-hormonal prescription medications available.

Prescription medication options can help with hot flushes, night sweats and changes in mood and sleep patterns.

#### **Town and Country Vet**

#### **Poisonings**

Here's a reminder of some common poisonings we see, especially heading into the colder months:

#### Rat bait

Most rat baits act by stopping blood from clotting, so the animal bleeds internally. Symptoms depend on where the bleeding occurs but they will always become lethargic and their gums will be pale or white – this may take several days. If you suspect your pet has eaten bait, it is important to bring them in ASAP to induce vomiting and/or do some blood tests before starting treatment with an antidote.

NB often dogs are poisoned when the rat bait box falls off a shelf in the garage or the lid isn't replaced firmly. We urge you to use a proper bait station which is pet-proof and secure the storage area.

#### Antifreeze – ethylene glycol

Antifreeze is extremely toxic rapidly causing kidney failure in cats and dogs. It is sweet-tasting and attractive to animals - they usually find it on driveways leaking from a radiator or in a puddle. Symptoms include drinking more, vomiting and being obviously not well. Prompt treatment is the only way for pets to survive poisoning. Once kidney damage occurs, the prognosis is poor.

Store your antifreeze well away from children and animals. Choose de-icers that don't contain ethylene glycol. Wipe up any spills and rinse thoroughly with water.

#### Slug and snail bait

Slug bait poisoning is extremely serious and often fatal. Within minutes dogs will be anxious, panting, salivating, wobbly, may vomit, have diarrhea and start seizuring. It is imperative that your pet is brought to the clinic ASAP for treatment. There is no specific antidote so we have to get as much bait out of your dog as possible (by vomiting and enemas) and start treatment with IV fluids and medications to manage the symptoms. Even with treatment pets can still die or suffer ongoing liver problems.



Always keep slug bait away from dogs and children. Try to use poison-free methods in your garden or safer products such as Quash.

#### Grapes and raisins – and fruitcake and hot cross buns

This is a tricky one! Some dogs can eat grapes all day without any problem. Other dogs could eat one sultana and get irreversible kidney failure. The cause is not yet proven but tartaric acid in grapes plays a role. There may also be a genetic component in dogs. The safest approach is to not let your dog eat grapes or dried grape products as we don't know which dogs will be ok and which ones won't. If your

dog has already eaten grapes and been ok, it's probably still safest to prevent further access, after all they don't need them!

#### Chocolate

Many of us know dogs that have eaten chocolate and been fine but it is a fact that eating too much of specific compounds found in chocolate is fatal for dogs. The darker the chocolate and the smaller the dog, the higher the risk. If your dog finds some chocolate, it's best to phone us immediately for treatment advice based on their weight and how much of what type of chocolate they have eaten.

We as a Society, also do spend the money, time and energy, researching the better ways for planting natives, not only their location requirements, but also with each tree getting a slow release fertiliser tablet. And again I must mention that over the last 3-4 year planting programmes that these have been generously donated by our members; Evie South, Sally and Duncan Gordon and Gowan and Jeff Simpson.

Each planting (since 2000) has given us all steep learning curves and now after 24 years I think we can safely say we have it pretty fine-tuned. And again this fine tuning had come from many of our volunteers who in my opinion have very specialised knowledge and are willing to share, not only their time, but equipment, my absolute favourite being the automated hole digger!!

Our March maintenance day saw us back at Robson's Scenic Reserve, just finishing off the checking of our 2021 plantings. We did an earlier start time, but in truth could have stayed the whole day, the catch-up cuppa and eats were as always a highlight and lots of fun, hearing of everyone's holiday adventures.

Our April/May maintenance days will see us head to Faulkner Bush, where weeds are evidentially rampant.

Thanks again to Eric Palmer (our volunteer on the ground at Faulkner Bush) for your remedial actions on keeping the creeks cleared of debris, as this water is so essential to flow into all our existing and new plantings. Also your pot hole repairs are so appreciated.

Thanks also to Uta for contacting us with concerns about the lookout track. Particularly where water has sadly run off with the gravel that kept the track to a good height. This is especially evident around the step areas. Sadly the Reserves Department do not have the funds to quite stretch for any remedial work here.

Gowan and I visited the track with Uta and friend to actually get a "feel" for the difficulties being encountered. However we do have some experts in this area, so we will re-visit this and see if something can be done, to suitably repair for all parties.

However just a caution to PLEASE be sure footed when using this track, especially after rain, or even frosts, as it can be very slippery and your own walking safety should be paramount. If unsure do keep to the tracks on the flat ground.

Great to see the Doggy Do receptacle installed at the Robson's Scenic Reserve and on checking last month, it was pretty full. GREAT "evidence" that it was indeed SO needed.

However, personally I do wish that the rubbish receptacle had not been removed from the barbecue area at The Edward Baigent Memorial Scenic Reserve, to be re-located to Robson's. Ho Hum.

#### **Waimea South Historical Society**

On 27th Tuesday February at the Holy Trinity Community Church Hall on Dorset St, Richmond, Bo Hensley was the speaker at our monthly meeting and gave a presentation about the new Wakefield Maps she has created which are titled 'Discovering Wakefield and Surrounds' and 'Self-Guided Historical Walking Trail'. These maps are printed either side of a colourful A3 sheet and are available at 7 outlets in and around Wakefield.

Bo and her husband Norman immigrated to New Zealand from South Africa in 2003 and arrived in Wakefield in 2021 from Auckland. Looking for a new venture they purchased Redstone Golf Park and Disc Golf Park along with Armageddon Paintball in Wai-iti Valley. The idea of a map to promote Wakefield Village and the surrounding district grew after Bo had been inspired by a 'meander map' she was familiar with in Natal, a province in South Africa.

Bo set about by seeking sponsorship from local businesses to produce a map that not only promoted their businesses but highlighted activities, accommodation, food outlets, Churches and garages as well as Historical Sites in the Wakefield district. Bo put this idea to the Wakefield Community Council and the Waimea South Community Facility Charitable Trust, and with the help of Peter Verstappen and Sonia Emerson, who acted as sounding boards and proof readers, Bo's project was underway.

Steven Smith, with his website business 'Slightly Different', who had designed the original wakefield.org.nz website, was able to upgrade the website and this is now administered by Bo.

Rawinia Greider whose business is called 'Ake Creations', did the design work and grants from Tasman District Council and Waimea South Community Facility Charitable Trust funded the design work and the first printing. A second printing is planned in the near future and three more businesses have since offered to contribute financially.

The maps will also be available at the Richmond Library after the second printing. The Richmond Library had sought references for the photos on the wakefield.org.nz website and these are now included as links on the Nelson Tasman Tourism Site and the Great Taste Cycle Trail along with the Cemetery Map at St John's Church, which was created by Val Crouch and Doug Burrowes. Sarah Arnold's Memory Post project will also link in as it develops.

Bo's exciting initiative is an example of how it has been possible to liaise with different groups within our community in order to create an image of Wakefield as a place well worth visiting whether they be cyclists, tourists, people passing through or locals wishing to learn more about their unique environment. Bo was warmly applauded for her very relevant and interesting presentation. Margaret presented her with a voucher as a token of our appreciation.
