

## Waimea South Historical Society

#### **GENERAL MEETING**

Margaret Clark acted as convenor for this 'Show and Tell' meeting whereupon twelve members told stories about an item they had brought along or told an interesting historical story.

Before introducing each speaker in turn, Margaret acknowledged the enormous distress caused by the recent flooding in our district. Marilyn Gibbs was the first speaker and she provided many interesting stories about some of her husband Colin's ancestors, in particular his great uncle James William Eves, who had been farming in Dovedale, but because of the disastrous floods there in 1877, had moved to Wakefield and purchased what is now part of the Totaradale Golf Course in Pigeon Valley. On the farm they had 8-10 dairy cows whose produce was delivered to the small creamery which still stands by the Jimmy Lee Bridge over the 88 Valley Stream.

Evan Thomas was the second speaker. He displayed a jewellery box, thought to have been made out of olive wood and inlaid with marquetry which was passed onto him by the sister of an uncle, William Douglas McLaughlin, who had acquired it during WWII where he had served in Africa, Syria, Libya and Crete before eventually being captured in El Alamein in July 1942. He was on board the Italian troop transport ship 'Nino Bixio' which was transporting Prisoners of War to Italy. It was bombed by the British with the loss of 275 POWs, 118 of which were New Zealanders, including W.D. McLaughlin. The ship did not sink so personal items were able to be retrieved and forwarded to family members.

Sue Thomas was speaker three. She told us about her great grandfather John Savage, who immigrated to Nelson in 1862 after being sponsored by his sister. He married Harriet Ann Biggs in 1865 and by 1870 he had a paint and paperhanging business in Hardy St Nelson. In the front of the shop was a picture framing section and gallery. Although John Savage did build a house in Bronte St, it was rented out and the family lived above the shop in their 11 roomed home. John died there in 1902 of Typhoid. Following his death, Harriett and her two unmarried daughters moved to the home in Bronte St. The business stayed within the family until the 1970's.

Geoff Trow was the fourth speaker. When Geoff was 10, his father, a British Soldier, served in Egypt, in present day Ismalia, where he pursued an engineering career. For his 11th birthday Geoff was given a meccano set (a precursor to Lego). Political unrest increased and the families of the British soldiers were ordered to return to England and they were only allowed to take one suitcase each. Geoff was only able to bring one small steam train out of this set and had to leave the rest behind. Geoff displayed his special meccano train to the spellbound audience.

Val Trow was the fifth speaker. Her grandfather Henry William Rogers (1860-1954), aged 20, arrived in New Zealand in 1878 on the Edwin Fox, the remains of which can be viewed at a special museum at Picton. In 1891 Henry married Jane Hopgood in Blenheim. Val's father Leslie Bernard Rogers was the 11th of their 12 children. The Rogers family had been publicans and brewers in Bedfordshire and had the 'Buffalo Inn' at Leighton Buzzard. Val displayed a small glass mug encased in a silver frame from this Inn which had been part of a punch bowl set. Unfortunately it was dropped whilst being cleaned and the glass was cracked but has stayed within its framework.

John Sowman, the sixth speaker, brought along two photographs. The first was a stunning south facing panoramic view taken from Pitfure Road in about 1970. Pitfure House and the home of Andrew and Wendy Gibbs are visible in the distance.

The second photo was taken in 1951 outside what is now the Wakefield Fish and Chip Shop. John's father Eric Sowman had his hair dressing business there which he had purchased from R. A. Sutton in 1946. Eric was also Wakefield's first milkman.

He started his milk run in 1948 with a horse and cart. He collected the raw milk from Roy Simpkin's dairy farm, which is now the site of the Wakefield Christmas Tree Farm. Using a dipper hanging in his milk can, Eric filled the milk billys or jugs, which had been left at the gate or front porch of homes.

In later years he continued his milk run using a Bradford truck followed by a Dodge until the business was purchased by Lloyd Cederman in 1962.

Marise Perry, the seventh speaker displayed a silver Calling Card Case containing its original calling cards, which she had inherited from her father. It had belonged to Mr David Haining a Scottish immigrant from Dumfries who arrived in New Zealand in 1908 aboard the SS Tainui. In 1918 David married Henrietta Blakie and they farmed in Mariri but did not have any family.

Marise's father, had arrived in New Zealand as a 13 year old. In 1936 having lost his job in Christchurch during the depression, he rode his motorbike to Nelson and gained employment with David Haining, though had to live in a tent before proving he was worthy of living in one of the farm baches. Marise's father served with New Zealand's 26th Battalion.

He was captured and spent time as a POW in Italy. Mr Haining died in 1943 and Marise's family remained on the farm.

Arnold Clark, the eighth speaker, displayed a Scottish rugby top emblazoned with the logo 'Arnold Clark'. This Arnold Clark being Sir Arnold Clark, a Scottish billionaire businessman, owner of Arnold Clark Automobiles Ltd, one of Europe's biggest car dealer groups. Sir Arnold sponsored the national Scottish Rugby Team who recently played and beat the Maori All Blacks team for the first time ever in a game played in Whangarei.

Yo Tye, the ninth speaker displayed the Mourning Brooch of her great great great grandmother, Mary Ann Lees (nee Lowder). Mary Ann Lees was born in 1780 and died in 1830 in Fairfield near Manchester, England. Although mourning brooches were common before 1830, they became popular during the Victorian Era and commemorated the death of a loved one, often with a sample of the deceased's hair, as is the case with this one. This brooch had been handed down to the oldest son of each generation, accompanied by a handwritten letter. It is mounted alongside a portrait Mary Ann.

Warwick, the tenth speaker, displayed books he had acquired from a combined Christchurch Library and Rotary Club book sale. Amongst them was a fascinating book about the history of gnomes, the petty cash book of the Wellington Harbour Board as well as historic passenger lists from the Cook Strait Ferries. Some had come from an antique dealer in Wellington who had disbanded in 1989.

Kathleen Dearnley, the eleventh speaker, displayed a prayer book which had belonged to her great grandfather William Alfred Hounsell (1825-1906) who came from Sussex, England in 1842 along with his brother Emery on board the 'Mary Ann'. William took a job with the New Zealand Company and in 1845 he became a member of the 1st Volunteer Corps. He later worked for Fells and Seymour, early land agents in Nelson, before becoming a hop grower, working for Mr Harley, and later still he was a gardener. He and his wife Sarah Durrant had 14 children. The cause of his death in 1906 was described as shock following a self-inflicted wound to his neck that had occurred a few days earlier. William was buried in the Wakapuaka Cemetery.

Roger Batt was the final speaker. His great uncle, George Batt (1854-1931), was a brother to Roger's grandfather William Batt. George spent 53 years as a drover and bullocky, ranging over the Nelson back country to destinations such as Wairau, Christchurch, via Top House, and down to the Buller. He also carted loads of wool, hops, timber and even gelignite, which was used in the construction of the Nelson to Glenhope railway. George remained a bachelor and in 1883 he purchased a 100 acre block of land at Glenhope and lived there in his self-built 2 roomed whare. He eventually retired in 1926. For display, Roger had a piece from one of George's old wagon wheels. After his death in 1931, he was laid to rest close to his parents in the Foxhill Cemetery.

The next meeting will be at the Holy Trinity Anglican Church supper room on Thursday 28th August at 1.30 pm. Robyn Parkes, a



## Town and Country Vet

Happy Spring! Hopefully the crazy winter weather and destruction is behind us and we can look forward to a more settled spring and summer.

#### Pet poisonings

We have had a run of poisoning cases in our hospital so here's a quick reminder of the common ones:

Rat bait – this is the most treatable because we have a specific antidote. So if you know your dog has eaten rat bait, or you find a half eaten box and your dog/s could have had access, phone us for advice. The sooner we make a plan the better the outcome and the cheaper it is for you. If dogs have eaten rat bait recently we can make them vomit and follow it up with a single blood test. If nothing is done, dogs will bleed internally, get very sick and need intensive hospital care.

Prevention is always better – store your rat bait securely away from dogs.

Antifreeze – fortunately this is less common but carries a poor prognosis unless treatment is started early and aggressively. Interestingly alcohol (vodka) given intravenously is a partial antidote if we can start it in time. Antifreeze damages many internal organs but it is damage to the kidneys that results in irreversible kidney failure and euthanasia. One of our staff members has recently lost two cats to antifreeze poisoning despite our best efforts over a few days of intensive hospital care. Unfortunately she still doesn't know where her semi-rural cats found antifreeze. It is usually in a puddle under a car or spilt in a garage and is palatable enough that cats and dogs will drink it. So if you spill it, clean it up!

Slug bait – this is a treatable poison but there is no antidote and treatment must be started extremely quickly and aggressively.
Seizures and coma happen very soon after a dog eats slug bait so they always need to be admitted to hospital for intensive care to manage seizures and prevent organ damage. We also try to get any slug bait out of them using stomach pumps and enemas.
Fortunately our recent hospital case managed to pull through after a few days.

Again prevention is always better – use dog-friendly slug bait (e.g.Quash) or none at all and ideally prevent roaming so your dog doesn't find your neighbour's slug bait.

#### Lifestyle block news

We are really excited to welcome our new lifestyle block vet Sarah on board! Sarah is from Auckland where she has been working solely on lifestyle blocks with sheep, goats, alpacas, pigs and poultry. She carries a unique passion and level of expertise in lifestyle block species and is great at sharing her incredible knowledge.

Did you know that most health issues in these animals are easily prevented? Looking online at Google and Facebook for advice provides a lot of conflicting information that is not always relevant or safe.

## Live Well, Stay Well

#### HATO HONE ST JOHN

On 20 August 2025 our group came to listen to our guest speaker Kylie Beckers, Community educator for St Johns, talk about the 3 Steps for life.

If you find someone unresponsive and not breathing--

#### STEP 1

**Call** 111

Put it on speaker phone to send the right help for your emergency.

#### STEP 2

Put patient on hard floor. Start CPR. It is easy and vital for anyone in cardiac arrest to have a chance of survival. CPR is better than no CPR, so try.

- A Airway open, tilt head back
- B Breathing
- C Circulation

Push with both hands, 30 times (hard and fast) on chest and blow 2 breaths mouth to mouth. Kylie said the song 'Staying Alive' by The Bee Gees is the right music to keep the rhythm going. This is the most important step to get the blood flowing.'

Remember 30 to 2 no matter who'. One person can do compressions and one person

to go and get AED or defibrillator.

#### STEP 3

Use AED or defibrillator to deliver safe electrical charge. Free First Aid mobile phone apps are available and provide easy to follow advice on a range of scenarios including

CPR, diabetic emergencies, choking and allergic reactions. These mobile apps could help you make a life saving difference in a medical emergency. They are the CPR, step by step app with AED defibrillation steps 1 - 10 which are voice assisted. In an emergency the faster someone gets help the better.

There is a AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) Location App to find the nearest one to you.

The Good Sam Responder App. This alerts people that a patient suspected to be in cardiac arrest is nearby, allowing them to possibly save a life by providing CPR and using an AED prior to emergency arriving. You need to register for this.

Kylie finished by saying that St John provides emergency and non emergency services for approx 90% of NZ's population. Applying CPR and rapid defibrillation can increase survival by 40%. Every minute without CPR or defib, a patients chance of survival falls by 10 - 15%. Kylie showed us all how to do CPR and defib on her fake models and we all had a go at doing it as well.

Kathleen thanked Kylie on behalf of the group and gave her a donation for Hato Hone St John.

# Higgins Heritage Park Happenings

We are again in full swing with organising our popular Craft Fair & Steam Up, to be held on Sunday 4 January, featuring traction engines on steam, honey barrel, old school bus & rail jigger rides along with craft stalls, food, ice creams and children's activities. For stall sites, please email craftfair@higginsheritagepark.co.nz

"Gordon", our 1/3 scale Burrel steam traction engine is now in the final stages in preparation for open day operations. The following is an overview of the construction, principles and fitting & fettling required for the assembly and painting of "Gordon".

Importantly, it still requires engineering to meet all the certification standards of our grand full-size engines. A job which blends mechanical skill, technical considerations, historical appreciation, and patient craftsmanship. A big thanks to Tasman District Council for a grant towards the certification costs which have just been completed, now enabling training & operations to start.

Steam traction engines, once the backbone of agriculture and industry, used steam power for mobility and heavy tasks. A 1/3rd scale version, though miniature, retains all the complexities and functionalities of the original. From the boiler to the wheels, from the intricate valve gear to the gleaming brass fittings, each component must be meticulously crafted and assembled.

There are a big number of elements that make up the assembly process, including:

- Planning & Preparation
- Kit documentation & diagrams
- Boiler & testing the boiler is the heart of any steam engine and requires utmost care. Before installation it was hydrostatic
  tested to ensure integrity and safety.
- Mountings: Safety valves, pressure gauges, and water sight glasses are installed.
- Testing: The boiler is filled with water and pressurized, tested above its working pressure to detect leaks or weaknesses.
- The chassis and running gear form the backbone of the model, supporting the boiler, engine, and wheels. Assembling the
  chassis involves mounting bearings, axles, and frames, followed by fitting wheels. Attention to alignment ensures smooth
  running and accurate steering.
- Steam engine components the cylinder, piston, crankshaft, con rod & valve gear. The Stephenson's valve gear was assembled and timed.
- Various ancillary systems, critical for the operation and safety include, water feed injectors, fuel system coal firebox, coal bunker, ashpan & smokebox & chimney were all assembled
- Fittings & Detailing included paint and finish.
- Cold water and steam testing. Testing and certification
- Operator training along with frequent checks of boiler integrity, pressure systems and the moving parts.

Now finished, "Gordon" will complement our full-size engines. It is not just a machine but a celebration of tradition, imbued with the spirit of steam which provides a living relic of a bygone era to delight our visitors.

Steam machinery was used in NZ from the 1880's primarily for transportation and agriculture. By 1919, there were over 1200 traction engines or portable steam engines in NZ, and over 700 stationary engines on farms.






